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Faulders retire from Kumeu Show

Derry and Jenny Faulder are retiring from the Kumeu Agricultural and Horticultural Society and its long-running Kumeu Show at the society's annual general meeting on August 9 after more than 80 years' combined service.

The move also marks a change of lifestyle for the couple who have been actively involved in the local community for many years.

Derry and Jenny are moving from their home of 20 years in Kumeu to the Country Club Huapai this month, a Hopper Living and Cabra Village complex on the former Nobilo Estate winery.

They'll not only be among many friends at the village but almost literally across the road from where they first met when Jenny was a dental nurse at the Huapai District School and Derry was the local electrician.

Derry has been involved with the society and the show about 52 years, while Jenny has been active in them for more than 30 years – the couple granted Honorary Life Membership several years ago for services to the society.

Both have been involved in nearly all facets of the society and aimed to retire around the 100th Kumeu Show, delayed a year or two by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Growing up in the Kumeu district, Derry has been associated with many local organisations, including Kumeu Brass (then with a longer name) which he joined at the age of 11, mainly playing cornet, and played at the show in his younger days.



Times have changed, with weekends generally free back then and allowing people to participate in various service clubs and organisations.

Many in this area were farmers or growers - hence the history behind the area and the Kumeu Show featuring in a book Derry helped author Deborah Dunsford with called "Doing It Themselves: The Story of Kumeu, Huapai and Taupaki".

The Faulders reckon the Kumeu Show has changed considerably too, matching the area's demographics and altered land use.

Many of the older identities, farmers and growers have gone (Derry's dad Jack was a Jersey cattle breeder at "Derry Downs" farm, for instance).


The Kumeu Show has changed too.

The carnival side (Mahon's Amusements) remain popular with children (Derry used to know Roy Mahon and then his son John) and while many farm animals such as pigs and cattle are no longer at the show (mainly because of various diseases over the years), the Farm Zone petting zoo is a big attraction.

Woodchopping, shearing, giant pumpkin contests and special attractions remain a hit.

The annual show is increasingly popular with city families and newcomers to this area.

But the Faulders say recent issues (especially COVID) reveal the Kumeu Show cannot be the sole money earner for the Kumeu A and H Society, which can cost a lot to run.



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Governed by its own Act of Parliament, the showgrounds have long been a favoured venue for the likes of the Auckland Folk Festival, Taupaki Monster Fireworks Display, Kumeu Classic Car and Hot and Rod Festival, and is now also home to many other events and even used for filming.

It's not council-controlled, so the showgrounds can be used for a wide variety of activities and are expected to remain largely intact (although talk of using parts bordering Access Road and the like for future traffic corridors rattle some).

Land values in the area have skyrocketed in recent times, much of the land use now changing for housing developments.

The Faulders still feel the society and the Kumeu Show itself will continue, probably with changes.

In the meantime, the couple say they've had a lot of fun and made many friends through their involvement.

Their three children have been there too, and Derry and Jenny can pass on stories to their seven grandchildren.

Consultation open on Local Board plans

Residents in the Rodney Local Board area are invited to speak up and help shape the future of their community.



Rodney is among Auckland's 21 local boards releasing their three-year plans for feedback.

Each board has prepared a draft plan and wants to know if it's right.

Fill out the online form at www.akhaveyoursay.govt.nz/localboardplans by August 14.

The plans will guide local board decision-making during the next three years on things like parks and playgrounds, community funding and group support, as well as events and programmes.

This consultation has the potential to have significant impacts across Auckland, says Auckland Council General Manager Local Board Services Louise Mason.

"Everyone knows budgets are tight, and that council has been making some tough decisions with impacts on local board funding - so understanding what local priorities you value most is going to be really important in the coming years," she explains.



"The local board plan is the key document for each board and the decisions it makes in each local area, as well as guiding input into the wider regional plans and long-term budget decisions. So, it really is a significant piece of work we are asking for feedback on."

The consultation enables local boards to identify and prioritise the key outcomes, initiatives and projects that are of most value to their communities.

This information will be considered as each of the 21 local boards draft their plans for the 2023-2026 period, for publication at the end of this year.

NZTA temporarily pausing SH16 improvements

Stage Two of the SH16 Brigham Creek to Waimauku project is being paused by Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency for a six-month to one year period in response to a significant increase in forecasted costs.



Labour List MP Marja Lubeck has confirmed the pause after receiving information from NZTA Regional Relationships Director Steve Mutton.

Material supply issues, labour shortages and rising inflation are contributing to increased project cost estimates, and further work over the following months is necessary prior to being able to confirm decisions about funding and scope, she heard.

As a result, the Auckland Council has accepted Waka Kotahi NZTA's request to extend the timeframe for the Notice of Requirement application for a six to 12-month period. All Public Works Act land acquisitions have been suspended for the same period.

Construction of Stage One work will continue as planned to improve safety for road users on the stretch of State Highway 16 between Huapai and Waimauku.

Guy Wishart of Kumeu Community Action (KCA) has indicated the Northwest community will be unsurprised by the delay but will be deeply disappointed and frustrated by Waka Kotahi NZTA's inability to keep to its own time schedule.

"The community has been crying out for the safety upgrades and

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extra lanes on SH16 for years," says Guy.

"Locals are also aware that Auckland Transport is 'kicking the carriage down the track' when it comes to utilising the existing rail track running through Huapai, Waimauku and Helensville. "

The whole situation is extremely problematic for the community and made worse by the potential release of future urban land in the Northwest with no improvement to the existing transport network, Guy explains.

A public drop-in meeting with Auckland Council planners at Huapai in mid-July was very well attended with about 70 people turning up, he adds.

"Planners are assessing the community's views on potential changes to the zoning of future urban areas in the Northwest and heard a wide range of opinions from the attendees, for and against."

Hay in short supply

The 'big wet' has compounded stock fodder problems.

While summer and autumn rain encouraged pasture growth, it also meant a difficult hay making season.



That's now being realised with hay shortages for feeding out in winter.

It's not only the equestrian set looking for grazing with those farming cattle especially seeking more supplementary feed.

The summer has been difficult for haymakers, with rain from November on causing problems, says livestock agent Duncan McNab.

He says a short burst of good weather in early December allowed some hay to be made.

Others have said the bad weather since has meant what would normally be three hay cuts turned into just the one.

The hay shortage is reflected in prices with bales usually being sold for more than \$20 each, some reaching \$30 or so.

That compares with around \$10 to \$20 a bale last year.

Not only is stock fodder difficult or pricey to get, but continuing wet weather has prompted many to destock or risk pasture pugging and have fences pushed over by hungry stock.

Many with horses and other stock are hoping for an improvement

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come spring (officially around September) when grass usually begins to flourish again and temperatures warm up.

Clean Up Week in September

Keep New Zealand Beautiful is asking Kiwis to 'Do the Right Thing' and clean up their local communities, with registrations now open for its annual Clean Up Week, September 16-22.

Following the results of Keep New Zealand Beautiful's 2022 National Litter Audit (NLA), Clean Up Week provides a proactive approach to tackling New Zealand's litter problem.

"The results from the 2022 NLA



were alarming, with the total number of items, volume and weight of litter all increasing since our initial audit in 2019," says Keep New Zealand Beautiful CEO Heather Saunderson.

"Clean Up Week is a great opportunity for New Zealanders to turn their attention to the issue and take a hands-on approach to solving it.

"We're encouraging families, schools, businesses, community and youth groups or even just individuals to 'Be a Tidy Kiwi' and 'Do the Right Thing', get together, get involved and make a difference in their local neighbourhood."

Last year, about 67,400 volunteers joined together throughout Clean Up Week to help remove around 655 tonnes of litter across an area equivalent to 5751 rugby fields.

"We'd love to break this record again in 2023," says Heather.

Clean Up Week is supported by Keep New Zealand Beautiful ambassadors Hayley King, Stacey Morrison and Muriwai's Michael Van de Elzen.

The week starts on World Clean Up Day, a global movement that unites millions of volunteers, governments and organisations across 191 countries.

Keep New Zealand Beautiful is also offering the opportunity for those involved in Clean Up Week to take part in the organisation's citizen science programmes, "Upstream" and "Backyard Battle", which allow individuals to contribute to a national and international data set while gaining experience in data collection and analysis.

"The effects of climate change are becoming all too prevalent for



New Zealanders and for some it can feel like a helpless situation," says Heather.

"However, getting out in nature, in your community and making a visible difference collecting and cleaning up your patch can make you feel great.

"Taking action can ease climate anxiety, especially for our tamariki, and it's good to know you're doing your bit," adds Heather.

"Litter as a problem can seem small when you come across a piece here and there walking through your local neighbourhood, but collectively it's a huge issue nationally, not only to our environment, but also to biodiversity, our own health and climate future."

Clean Up Week registrations at www.knzb.org.nz close on September 22.

The week is supported in partnership with Waste Management, Enviro NZ and some councils, who provide participants with the opportunity to dispose of the rubbish they collect for free at selected transfer stations.

With the help of the Mars Wrigley Foundation, free reusable cleanup kits will be available on request for some groups (including ECEs, schools, youth groups, Keep New Zealand Beautiful's community and educational branches, individual/family and not-for-profit members) who don't have access to their own clean up materials, and haven't requested a kit before.

People can also purchase reusable clean-up kit resources at a cost from KNZB's online shop.

To access free resources, participants must register their Clean Up Week event at www.knzb.org.nz to get resources such as event guides, posters, health and safety forms and certificates.

Muriwai progress continues

Red and yellow stickered Muriwai homes may get help.

Residents of such homes damaged during North Island weather events (like Cyclone Gabrielle) are eligible for accommodation support once their insurance rental payment help runs out, says the Muriwai Residents Stickered Group (MSRG).

These payments are not means-tested, are not taxable and do not affect Working for Families payments, the MSRG explains, adding the payments will go a long way towards supporting displaced homeowners while they await news of their property categorisation and the future of their homes.

The group says terms and conditions apply, "but most importantly if you are red or yellow stickered please make sure you register with TAS (Work and Income's Temporary Additional Support) in order to



receive the accommodation support".

MSRG says that as the Auckland Council continues to work through Muriwai's geotechnical assessment, engineering firm GHD has now identified a group of properties able to have their placards changed and, in some cases, removed.

"This is great news and no doubt those homeowners are getting organised to move back in once they have their homes back in order - which after five months will be a big job!"

Work is continuing on the Muriwai water treatment plant and Watercare hopes the plant and reservoir could be back operating ready for summer.

Meanwhile, water tankers will continue to replenish the temporary reservoir and pump station, says the MSRG.

Government aims to reduce small business financial stress

The Government's Business Payment Practices Bill, which will reduce the stress and costs to small businesses of long payment wait times, has passed its third reading.

"This new transparency regime will encourage larger businesses to improve their payment times, which are a significant problem for many small businesses," says Minister for Small Business Ginny Andersen.

"Long payment terms create cashflow problems for small businesses, because they do not have large financial reserves to tide them over while they wait for large firms to pay their bills.

"Small businesses make up over 97% of all businesses in New Zealand and it's important they are well supported, particularly following the impacts of the pandemic, Cyclone Gabrielle and other severe weather events," says Ginny.

"The Business Payment Practices Bill will require large businesses to publicly disclose their payment terms and how long they take to pay their bills.

"By introducing more transparency from large businesses on a public register administered by MBIE, small businesses will be able to factor in payment times when they're looking to do business with them.

"Having access to this information will help small businesses to identify and avoid those firms which are slower to pay than others," Ginny explains.

"There will be real reputational risk to large business who refuse to



pay their bills on time.

"Not only do late and overdue payments cause uncertainty for small businesses, they also hold back investment and job creation.

"Big businesses often use small businesses as a credit facility, and that's not OK."

The new system will be rolled out to the largest organisations first - those with 100 million or more in revenue.

The first reporting period for this new system will begin 10 months after the Bill has passed, and the first disclosures will be made seven or eight months after that.

Muriwai firefighters' deaths report suggest hazards not fully identified

Fire and Emergency New Zealand's independent investigation by lead investigator Paul McGill and specialist health and safety investigator Andy Evans into the deaths of volunteer firefighters Craig Stevens and Dave van Zwanenberg during February's Cyclone Gabrielle has found landslides were not identified by Fire and Emergency as a hazard that could harm its firefighters.

The two firefighters died after the house they were in was hit by a landslide during a rescue and recovery mission on February 13 at night.

The report suggests Craig and Dave started a task "without knowing they were exposing themselves to imminent and catastrophic risk".

The investigation alleges Fire and Emergency New Zealand's lack of risk management to identify landslides "resulted in a lack of landslide related procedures and training for firefighters".

While Muriwai firefighters knew about Muriwai's general likelihood of landslides, the report adds they didn't recognise warning signs indicating an imminent landslide threat.

The investigation says search and rescue operations for Craig and Dave was quickly mobilised and well resourced, the report explaining everything practicable was done to rescue the firefighters in arduous conditions.

Four recommendations for Fire and Emergency New Zealand (FENZ) include reviewing policy, procedures and training programmes to lift awareness of hazards and warning signs associated with landslides, thinking about integrating local landslip susceptibility risk profiles when planning station risk, reviewing the Fire and Emergency New



Zealand risk management standard and reviewing the organisation's critical risk management programme and developing a clear and robust definition of critical risk.

FENZ has developed learning modules regarding landslides and is reviewing its safety management approach.

Dale Wallace of Kumeu has organised the parade for many years and is thrilled it's back in 2023.

"Generations of Kumeu children have attended the parade and in recent years our local kids have missed out," she says.

"The Kumeu Rotary Christmas Parade is for our children.

"It builds the excitement around the lead-up to Christmas and is a great way for the community to come together at the end of the year.

"With lots of new residents, new businesses, and businesses which have been hit hard with recent events, the parade is a great way to celebrate local."

The last year Kumeu locals saw the parade down the main street was in 2019.

A journey of compassion


Our story starts in the heart of New Zealand and centres on the birth of End of Life Planning ("EOLP"), a business that stands out for its unique approach to celebrating life.

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Property market report

Housing sales are lumpy, prices up slightly, fewer listings and buyers hesitant.

Latest data from the Real Estate Institute of New Zealand (REINZ) delivers very mixed messages, with sales volumes inconclusive but prices firm.

The REINZ recorded 5629 residential property sales nationally in June, down 4.1% compared to May, suggesting market activity remains at a low ebb.

The national median selling price was \$780,000 in June, unchanged from May, but down 8.2% compared to June last year.

However the REINZ House Price Index (HPI), which adjusts for differences in the mix of properties sold each month, was up 0.4% nationally in June compared to May.

There was less stock on the market, with a total of 24,676 residential properties available for sale at the end of June. That's down 7.5% compared to May, and down 6.1% compared to June last year.

New listings were also down, with 6218 received in June. That's down 15.5% compared to May, and down 21.2% compared to June last year, suggesting vendors remain hesitant about selling.

Salespeople continue to report increased first home buyer activity with the easing of LVR [loan-to-value ratio] restrictions that came into effect on June 1.

Although activity has increased, caution remains as interest rates, an election and further financial strain caused by the cost of living tempers investment.

In the three months ending June 2023, 15,934 sales have occurred, a 1.2% increase year-on-year.

A lack of listings and the challenge of navigating the current economic climate are putting.

The Median price point in Auckland is static showing down 22% from peak, but still almost 3% up on 2018 prices.

Take stock of those around you and the rules and values that you will operate by. Be aware that friends, family, and your pets may seem to act a little differently. What-ever the mood, be present and be mindful and engaged. A hug can solve a host of questions and a request for help and assistance is natural and common. In order to maintain control around how people feel and are effected, some simple measures should be considered.

Understand and commit to: a) Individual bank accounts, b) Payments for essential goods and services, c) Agree to historic daily or weekly activities, d) A standard of behaviour and communication

If you set the ground rules early it makes the more challenging aspects, like selling the family home a little easier. Certainly the more you can agree on the better the outcome and the less you will spend with your solicitor. Sometimes things can get confused and mixed up very quickly. If you can't settle disputes, try and work through an independent person that can arbitrate. Failure to arbitrate a solution will come at both a time and a financial cost to both parties as the dispute generally finds its way into the Family Court who can make a decision on the balance of fairness for both parties based on the facts. Sorting out your relationship property

The Property (Relationships) Act 1976 ("PRA") applies to couples who are married, in a civil union partnership, a de facto relationship, as well as same-sex couples. The PRA presumes an equal contribution by each partner and aims to achieve a just division of relationship property when the relationship ends. A partner's contribution is not limited to financial contributions but also other things such as looking after the children, the household or property belonging to the couple.

Couples may prefer that the PRA does not apply to all or some of their relationship property. This could either be in anticipation of or during a relationship, or at the end of a relationship. A contractingout agreement would then be necessary to achieve this. The PRA sets out certain formalities which are required for a valid contractingout agreement. These requirements include that:

• each party must have independent legal advice before signing the agreement;

• the signature of each party must be witnessed by a lawyer;

• the lawyer witnessing the signature must certify that he or she explained the effect and implication of the agreement to that party.

It is important that these requirements are met to have a valid agreement. Otherwise, you may have to approach a court to validate the agreement (which can be expensive). It can also result in assets being exposed to creditors which you may have thought were taken out of their reach.

What happens when a buyer can't settle?

You've secured an unconditional sale on your property, booked the moving truck, and got your ducks all lined up, in contemplation of a smooth move on settlement day. But what happens if the Purchaser throws a spanner in the works and defaults? Although the vast majority of transactions we see go without a hiccough, there is always a risk of a buyer not completing the purchase. So what options are available to you, should you end up in this position?



An Agreement for Sale and Purchase

is used to buy and sell property and is a legally binding contract committing the buyer to completing the purchase on the agreed settlement day. The Agreement includes a clause which outlines what happens when the buyer does not complete (in lawyer-speak, this is called defaulting). Should this occur, the seller is entitled to

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charge a daily penalty until the buyer completes the purchase. This penalty interest rate is calculated on the unpaid purchase price at the interest rate on the front of the Agreement (usually 12% - 16% pa).

If the Purchaser does not settle, then we can issue a settlement notice. This means the Purchaser will have 12 working days to settle. After that, you have the option to cancel the Agreement and keep the buyer's deposit (up to 10% of the purchase price). This is why a larger deposit is ideal from the seller's perspective, as the deposit can cover any real estate agent commission that is due and then the balance is yours. You don't have to cancel the Agreement, you could go back to market and see if the first Purchaser can settle before you sell to someone else. You are then in a position to sell your property to an alternative Purchaser. You can also claim any loss on the subsequent sale from the original Purchaser - for example if the property sells for less.

There is also another remedy - suing for specific performance. This means going to Court, seeking an order for the Purchaser to complete the settlement. We find most often that the reason Purchasers don't settle is due to lack of funds, so going to Court may not be the best option and will involve significant time and money.

It is highly stressful when a buyer defaults, but you can rely on us to advocate on your behalf to achieve a successful outcome for you. The what, why and how of mediation

What is a mediation actually like? What can you do to best prepare for it? Where do things go wrong? And when you are both so far apart, is it worth even bothering?

We talked to high profile mediator Tony Lendrum in episode 4 of the Divorce Café podcast, to find out how he goes about mediating a dispute, why he thinks it's worth doing, and what are its the limits or risks.

What is mediation? Mediation is a dispute resolution process that provides an alternative to going to Court, whereby parties engage in a structured and semi-formal discussion with an independent mediator who assists them to resolve their dispute.

If parties can reach an agreed settlement of their dispute, at the end of the mediation an agreement is prepared documenting its terms, and is signed by the parties and the lawyers.

Why mediate? There's a lot to like about mediation:

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- Employment Law Estates
- Debt Collection
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• it is one of the most efficient forms of dispute resolution, and can enable parties to avoid the stress and expense associated with court proceedings.

• it is a confidential process, which enables parties to deal with important and sensitive issues privately.

• there is no obligation to settle - it is a voluntary process - meaning that the parties decide whether any of the proposed solutions meet their needs.

Mediation lacks many of the adversarial parts of litigation - for example you will have an opportunity to speak if you would like to, and you will not be cross examined. Because it is voluntary and aims to reach a consensus, mediation can also improve relationships in a way that litigation rarely can.

An effective mediator can also bring the interests of children into the mediation, including in certain instances hearing from the children in advance. Tony Lendrum says that he will sometimes use the following approach:

"[I] ask the parents to imagine that their children are, for the day's purposes, all between 14-16 years old and that they will be listening closely to what their parents say to each other, and more importantly, how they say it over the course of the day."

Tony's top tip for people preparing to go to mediation is not to "anchor" to a particular position, but to be open-minded to a range of outcomes. Crucially, parties should consult their legal representative and ensure they have all the information they need to make in informed choice to settle, or not.

It's a legally binding settlement - Among the many benefits of a mediation for resolving a dispute, are risks that arise from the fact that people are different, in their priorities and the power they wield in the relationship. These are factors discussed in the Court of Appeal's decision in what Tony Lendrum considers a pivotal case: Hildred v Strong. Mediations need to be handled by experienced mediators and lawyers because despite those power imbalances, Hildred confirms that in the absence of some fairly extreme bad conduct, the parties will be considered to be "able, adult parties who are separately represented" and the agreement will stand.

Hildred v Strong showed that that agreement is a contract that is effective to alter what would otherwise be the legal rights of the parties – even if: the parties later change their minds, the agreement isn't what a Court might have given them, or they later consider they didn't have all the information they needed from the other to properly agree anything.

Either party may walk out of a mediation without an agreement if the process isn't serving them. That's important because if a party does stay, they will be considered to have stayed and settled for their own rational reasons.



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Central's Tips August 2023



The fruit and vegetable garden

- Plant alyssum at the base of fruit trees to ensure the bees will visit. Specific seed blends for aiding pollination are also available
- Use snail bait or organic snail and slug control amongst maturing cabbages and cauliflowers and around new seedlings of lettuces and herbs
- Raised beds tend to sink over the time, so add fresh Garden Mix and dig it in. If the existing soil hasn't been conditioned in a while add compost and Dave's Growth Booster Sheep Pellets
- Harvest time for all the winter vegetables – carrots, cabbage, broccoli and cauliflower, beetroot, and silver beet
- **Plant new seedlings of fennel** they will take the baked vegetables to the next level. Put in globe artichokes, but pick off snails regularly – they live in the big, pleated leaves
- **Hardier herbs** such as thymes, oregano, coriander sage and parsley can be planted. Cos and head lettuce varieties will start the salad patch
- In frost free areas, sprouted potatoes can be planted. Dig a trench and plant them 40cm apart covering lightly with soil as they grow

The ornamental garden

- **Prune hydrangeas and hibiscus,** taking out dead or old branches at the base. Thin out congestion in the centre of the bush and cut back branches to a double set of leaves
- For blue hydrangea flowers, apply 'blueing tonic' (Aluminium Sulphate). For pink flowers, apply lime. White flowers remain the same in any soil
- Plant hedges in soil that has been enriched with compost. To encourage good, thick growth in a new hedge, it's best to cut the bushes back by a quarter at planting
- Look for dormant perennial plants beginning to shoot through the ground and place a marker stick beside them, so you don't pull them out by mistake
- **Repetition planting:** add groups of the same plant around the garden to give it a sense of continuity. Reliable shrubs or tidy strap-leaf plants for this look include loropetalums, and coprosmas, dietes and lomandras
- Make lavender a big thing for summer: if you're brave enough, cut back lavenders that are beginning to show bud or flower – this will increase their bushiness and overall size for a wow summer flowering
- It's too early to fertilise roses and other showy summer plants, but adding sheep pellets around the garden releases nitrogen slowly into the garden soil



Invest in a growth fund

Nothing appreciates like a garden where the soil has been conditioned and improved to get the best out of the plants. Early spring is a great time to add plenty of compost, sheep pellets or liquid seaweed to moist soil, so that your garden will thank you when the soil warms up (dries out) to enable planting.

Why does my dog put its paw on my arm?

As a dog owner, when your furry companion puts their paw on your arm, it's likely their way of communicating and expressing their emotions. Dogs have a rich repertoire of body language, and this behaviour can convey a variety of meanings:

1. Seeking Attention - Dogs often use their paws to get your attention, especially if they want to be petted, played with, or simply acknowledged.



It can be a gentle and non-verbal request for you to engage with them.

Lemon Verbena Oat Slice

This recipe is based on a ginger crunch recipe where lemon verbena replaces the ground ginger. Lots of variations can be made to the recipe to suit your taste or what is in your pantry; try adding ½ cup of pistachios to the base, or perhaps ½ cup of pumpkin seeds, dried apricots could also be added in place of the currants - the options are endless.



The lemon verbena adds a complex, lemony-grassy-earthy flavour to the slice which is really delicious. Use a highspeed blender, coffee grinder or mortar and pestle to powder the lemon verbena.

Base Ingredients: 150g butter, 2 tablespoons golden syrup, ½ cup sugar, ¾ cup desiccated coconut, 1 ½ cups rolled oats, ¾ cup flour, 1 ½ teaspoons baking powder, 2 tablespoons ground lemon verbena, ½ cup currants, grated zest of 1 lemon.

lcing Ingredients: 4 tablespoons butter, 8 tablespoons icing sugar, 4 teaspoons golden syrup, 2 teaspoons ground lemon verbena, plus desiccated coconut to sprinkle over.

Method: Preheat the oven to 180C. Line a rectangular sponge roll tin with baking paper. Melt the butter with the golden syrup in a small saucepan. Mix all of the remaining base ingredients together in a large bowl, then pour the melted butter mixture over the dry ingredients and mix well. Press into the tin and bake for 15-20 minutes or until golden in colour.

To make the icing, melt the butter and golden syrup together in a small saucepan. Remove from the heat and add the icing sugar and lemon verbena and mix well. It may take a minute or two of mixing to incorporate the butter into the mixture. Pour over the base and spread evenly with a spatula. Sprinkle over the coconut. Allow to cool completely before cutting. Store in an airtight container for up to 5 days.

Hormone replacement therapy for menopause

I'm nearly 60 years old. So the subject of topping up your hormones is dear to my heart (literally because good hormones are good for heart health).

Women's Hormone Top-up Therapy (HTT) has really come out from behind the curtains in the last few years. While previously it was thought that the risks (such as cancer) far outweigh the benefits, nowadays most doctors would say the opposite. Plus, there are strategies to reduce the risk of hormone-dependent cancers including taking aromatase inhibitors like DIM which comes from broccoli.

What about the Blokes? Men's HTT is a little less common. However, there is a condition called "Grumpy Old Man Syndrome" that is related to declining hormone levels in men. The low hormone levels can cause men to become grumpy, impotent, and to sweat a lot (not the kind of thing I aspire too). Testosterone supplementation



is either via oral capsules, creams to apply to the skin, or more commonly IM injections every 1 to 3 months.

Like women, men should take an aromatase inhibitor to stop their body turning testosterone into estrogen.

I experienced anxiety as a girl but wasn't aware that's what it was. I self-medicated with food, alcohol, smoking and drugs. When I stopped drink and drugs at 24, I then suffered extreme anxiety until 40.

Then I started having these 'allergic reactions' when I wasn't eating and finally understood they were panic attacks. I felt like my throat was closing, I couldn't breathe, my heart was racing, and I thought I was going to die. I would call an ambulance only to be told it was a panic attack.

I was diagnosed with Generalised Anxiety Disorder, Panic Disorder and Social Anxiety. I was on and off anti-depressants for 16 years and told I would have to be on them forever.

Now I can't recognise the woman that I was to the woman that I am today. I am medication free, living a full happy life with a man I love, and I have ways of managing any anxiety that crops up. I am free from the excessive anxiety and panic that ruled my life.

I love what I do, helping others to become their most confident and healthiest selves.

Nobody cares how much you know, until they know how much you care

A concerning pattern is coming from older clients needing help from our volunteers at Citizens Advice Bureau Helensville.

Lonely older people in our community are lacking support from family or friends and practical advice on a number of issues including elder abuse.



Referrals have been made for them to our amazing local organisations Kindred Services and Age Concern Rodney.

Other enquiries range from understanding benefit entitlements particularly with age-related health issues, applying for a Total Mobility Scheme card and superannuation eligibility to how to deal with a neighbour, finding a job and navigating the Tenancy Tribunal.

Scams and spams are another red flag for older clients.

"Our active listening volunteers provide current, correct information on how to recognise, report and deal with any harassment," says manager Rani Timoti.

Guy Wishart Kaipara ki Mahurangi Labour candidate

Isn't it interesting just what issues are most irritating to people?

The prevalence of potholes across northwest Auckland (and all around the countryside, to be fair) has been a major talking point for a couple of years now.

Every now and then someone who follows my Facebook account



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will ask me why I bang on about potholes so much. Invariably, such people aren't from around my electorate. Everyone living in this area know just how frustrating the phenomenon has become. It's a subject bound to come up when I host National's transport spokesperson for a public meeting in Westgate, Simeon Brown MP, later this week.

The many implications of potholes include vehicle damage and safety risks (especially when cars cross the centreline to avoid them), along with arbitrarily lower speed limits being justified by reference to the poor condition of our roads.

Potholes also contribute to a general sense of malaise, thanks to the constant visual reminder of disrepair they provide.

For all these reasons, road rehabilitation and repair is a major priority for my constituents. I was pleased that National recently announced that, if we are elected in mid-October, we'll establish a national pothole repair fund. The key aspects of this policy include an additional \$500 million over three years - above the existing funded amounts - allocated to address potholes.

The funding will be available to the local government entity (in our case, Auckland Transport) and Waka Kotahi (also known as NZTA).

Another element of the policy is that we'll introduce a new directive to NZTA to undertake renewal and rehabilitation work on at least 2% of our roading network each and every year. That's more than double the current rate.

Finally, we'll also introduce new rules for pothole repair on state highways (think SH16, in this part of the world), requiring a standard response time of 24 hours.

Obviously other political parties will have their own policies in this space. I'll let them explain those for themselves and simply invite everyone in the area who cares about the issue to take note of what's on offer. After all, that's the point of an election in a democracy.

In other words, this is a particularly good time to talk about issues of the most importance to you, whether potholes or other transport infrastructure needs or any other issue under the sun.

Healthy Families

For people everywhere, food is the great connector. Being able to share food in a culturally appropriate way plays a significant role in our physical, social, and emotional understanding of the world around us.

As access to nourishing, affordable kai becomes further and further out of reach for many people in Aotearoa, people are looking back at past practices to inform a new pathway into the future.



The Mana Motuhake o te Kai - food secure communities' framework - was created by the West Auckland Kāhui Māori Collective for people who want to learn how mātauranga Māori principals can inform growing, sharing and preparing kai.

The framework is bringing a fresh perspective to projects that are led by the Healthy Active Learning (HAL) team at Sport Waitākere. Improving the wellbeing of tamariki and rangatahi through kai and nutrition is a key focus for the HAL team, who work predominantly with schools.

"The HAL team has strong connections to schools and extensive knowledge of school curriculum. I've been helping to familiarise them with the framework, and together, we've identified several areas where schools might be able to use it alongside their learning plans", explains Giuliana Sewell, Systems Innovator for Healthy Families Waitākere.

Several schools in the Massey area have expressed their eagerness to include more agricultural education in their curriculum.

"We presented the Mana Motuhake o te Kai framework to the teacher leads from three schools in Massey and they gave us some great feedback. The next step for us will be one on one sessions with the schools to map out how they can use the framework as a guide for their kai initiatives", says Sewell.

Mana motuhake o te kai was designed from an ao Māori point of view but also supports the inclusion of ideas and practices for all people.

Facebook trading scam

A Facebook trading scam is when a person poses as a seller on a 'buy and sell' Facebook page or group, or sets up a fake business page. They then pretend to have goods or services for sale, but once they receive payment they don't follow through with the deal. Often a fake Facebook page



will look legitimate. If they have a Facebook page you should look at the reviews on the page to see if previous customers have had problems with them. You can also look out for blue or grey 'ticks' on the page which are given to pages or profiles verified by Facebook. There are risks when trading on all online platforms. Facebook buy and sell pages and groups are not moderated by Facebook. The safest option is to only pay the seller after you have inspected the goods in person. However, if this isn't possible it's important to remember that if the deal looks too good to be true, it probably is.



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Unfortunately, it can be difficult to get money back that has been lost in one of these scams. The usual way to deal with this kind of dispute in NZ is to go to the Disputes Tribunal. Please note that you will need to have an address for the seller and there is a fee to apply.
