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LICHELLE'S FIGHT

Lichelle Tanner is fighting for her life.

The 38-year-old Taupaki mum is trying other treatment options after learning her cancer, non-Hodgkin lymphoma, cannot be cured under normal medical circumstances. But that doesn't stop Lichelle trying alternatives, all of which come at a cost. Told her cancer has spread, is now "untreatable", and that she may have a year to live at most, the upbeat mum is determined to live every day as best she can. That Lichelle can remain so positive and maintain her lovely nature is amazing considering the adversity she has faced in her life.

She got hepatitis b as a teenager, lost two children – one to an accident and the other stillborn, suffers from a chronic autoimmune condition called lupus, and nearly lost her partner of 20 years, Shannon Bingley, to a hit and run in nearby Waitakere township about three years ago.

Shannon was seriously injured but is now back working at his quarry job. Much as he'd like to spend more time with Lichelle, he has to work to pay off their Waitakere Rd home, meet living costs, as well as help pay for Lichelle's treatment. Friends wonder how Lichelle keeps her

bright outlook after such difficult times. Events like getting married in June to Shannon before about 65 family and friends, a trip to Waiheke Island (a wedding present), and a \$3000 grant from the Mike Pero Foundation towards her treatment costs continue to inspire her. She's started on a course of intravenous vitamin c twice weekly at between \$167 and \$260 a shot, which the Mike Pero grant will help towards.

Alternative therapies cost plenty too.

Lichelle visits an Albany healer who uses sound waves to target cancer sites. She's also taking detox and immune boosting supplements and has a diet based on her blood group (no cheese, bread, cabbage, tea or coffee – drinking ionised water instead).

"I'm trying all sorts of different things," Lichelle says. "I've got nothing to lose."

Any money raised – including through a Givealittle page and an Australian friend's similar GoFundMe page – goes towards her vitamin c treatment at this stage.

Anything left over could be used for a family holiday somewhere in New Zealand, as Lichelle is not up to travelling far. She just wants more time to spend with her family.

"We may go to Rotorua or a place with theme things, perhaps day trips, just

doing things together and getting good photos and memories." Lichelle can still drive and, when she's up to it, a bit of lawn mowing. "But I have to be careful." It's difficult for the once keen gardener, and Shannon has to keep the place tidy now. Some weeks Lichelle may have three or four good days in the week. On others she can hardly get out of bed, and gets bruising and lumps which bring considerable pain.

She's very appreciative of all the help and offers of support from people. "A big thank you to all my friends and family who've been so supportive." Lichelle has had offers from people to sit with her while on hospital visits, but she doesn't like putting others out, especially when some visits fill a whole day.

What happens to her affects her family. "It's hard enough for the adults to deal with, let alone the children."

But Lichelle is a determined woman and she's not about to give up, especially after all the hardship she's been through.

INTRODUCING GEOFF DOBSON



Hello again. I'm back in the Kumeu district writing for the Kumeu Courier about people and places in the area I love.

I've ended a 36-year career with Auckland Suburban Newspapers, during which time I extensively covered this part of the



region.

It included 13 years with Norwest News (Newsbrief when I started there) and eight years on the Rodney Times.

Now I'm a contributing writer and photographer for the Kumeu Courier, which means renewing contacts with many of the good people I've come to know in this area.

When I first covered Kumeu and its surrounds the district comprised mainly farms and orchards. In the early 1990s the Kumeu sale yards were literally down the road from my office above the Kumeu Garden Centre. A highlight was watching people chase escaped stock down State Highway 16. One sheep eluded pursuers by going through the Huapai Tavern's back door and out the front, cornered in a Matua Rd resident's garden by myself and the Kumeu police community constable "Choc" McGrath. I often wondered if the owner's immaculate garden survived the day with the sheep.

These days a bolting animal would be skittled by passing cars at the sale yard gate. Traffic seems to have increased 10-fold since the yards closed. Who would have thought Kumeu would have traffic congestion? Even weekends can bring difficulty negotiating the highway, with Aucklanders heading for Woodhill Forest, Muriwai Beach and other places in their droves.

The landscape's changed dramatically. Matua Rd, Riverhead and other pockets of home building remind me of suburbia, with more to come. Commercial development is increasing too. I don't think this area has lost its essential character though. There's still a rural flavour with vineyards, equestrian facilities, the Kumeu Showgrounds, lifestyle blocks with stock, horticulture, and much more.

What I'm also enjoying is some great eating places, many providing a level of sophistication and high standards you would associate with top central city dining.

Winter used to be the quiet time in this area. Not anymore. It's the restlessness of a growth region like here that I thrive on.

Some of the old identities have gone, but there's a backbone and new challenges to keep things going

PAT BOOTH

Pat Booth is best known as an investigative journalist, particularly for his work on the Arthur Allan Thomas case. But the Kumeu Village rest home resident has another fascinating side few have seen. He's had a keen interest in Japanese culture, particularly their World War II history, for nearly 50 years.

Pat, 86, is finishing a 10-volume set of Pacific war stories titled



"Hirohito's War" (after Japan's emperor), which he hopes to publish soon. He's researched some amazing tales, such as the kamikaze pilot who took his wife along on his final flight into a Russian tank convoy. It's part of "Prayers for the Bride of the Sacred Crane", the first in the series.

Then there's the first Fijian Victoria Cross recipient who so badly wanted to serve that he built a boat to get to where he could enlist. When his platoon was ambushed he sacrificed himself that others could escape.

"The really bad aspect of the Pacific War is that it has just faded away," Pat says. "This has the makings of a significant set of books for New Zealand where a generation or two do not have the faintest idea what the war was."

Pat's war stories are shaping up to be among the finest in his 16 books on a variety of topics. An early one was "The All Black Book for Boys" in 1960, a compilation around legends like Don Clarke, Wilson Whineray, George Nepia, Colin "Pinetree" Meads, Ron Elvidge and more.

He's unsure how or why his Japanese interest developed, even taking martial arts kendo (swords) and aikido (similar to jiu jitsu) for around 40 years. Pat's interest led to some amazing scenarios. He helped repatriate Japanese war items like swords and flags with families of the fallen.

One stands out. Pat asked an Auckland militaria shop proprietor if anything new had come in. A Japanese war flag had arrived, but it had been "spoiled" with messages across it and was destined for someone's billiard room wall.

"No it's not," Pat replied, recognising the flag's significance and buying it for \$50.

In an uncanny coincidence, he learned the flag belonged to a teenage soldier named Eizo Wada, who took it to war in 1942, the same year he died. This matched the theme of Pat's then just completed fourth novel "Sons of the Sword" about the Pa-



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cific war.

Pat traced Eizo's family and, with friend David Lynch, travelled to Japan in 1992 to return it.

They were heading for a train to take them two hours north of Tokyo when Pat noticed a camera crew on the platform. "I asked David what the TV crew were after and he said 'it's you."

The flag, placed in a Japanese wooden box, was opened by Eizo's brother Eishiro who had been a prisoner of war. "All the family's heads went down straight away when the box was opened," Pat recalls. It lies on the family altar beside Eizo's photo.

People he has returned items to have been "absolutely ecstatic". "They've said it was like a miracle."

Pat had two flags he was unable to find families for, and his collection of Japanese items has largely gone.

Eizo's flag has, however, been preserved in an oil painting featuring Pat. Painted by nurse Helen Howitt, it has pride of place on Pat's Kumeu rest home wall.

PAST THE FRONT DOOR

Melba and Michael Brajkovich get a cellar door view of SH16 traffic.

Brajkovich family members have been watching traffic for years. They can't help it, as their Kumeu River Wines business looks straight on to State Highway 16.

"Fifty-eight years ago we'd be lucky to see one car in an hour," matriarch Melba Brajkovich says. Now there are thousands daily.



But few want to break out of the traffic line to visit the cellar door, such is the congestion outside the front gate, Melba says. "People sometimes ask'what's going on?' but I tell them it's just normal traffic. I can't turn right across the highway anymore; I have to go left into Kumeu then turn around."

As Kumeu River Wines is the picturesque Auckland city side gateway to Kumeu, the Brajkovichs take a keen interest in planning proposals around their area. None more so than son Michael. He sends submissions in on various proposals too, like



Auckland Transport's "Transport for growth in north-west Auckland" document. With good reason. Talk of bypasses around and even through Kumeu River Wines has been going for years, still without resolution.

It's getting desperate, particularly with Kumeu's growth. The Maddren development proposal at the back of the Kumeu Village, with 150 residential units plus commercial and retail facilities, would add significantly to the traffic count, as would Special Housing Areas like those at Station Rd and Burns Lane. It could end up with transport in the area being "a dog's breakfast", Michael says.

Alternatives proposed include a bypass south of Kumeu between Westgate and Waimauku. One earlier proposal even included a road straight through Melba's home, continuing on from Riverhead Rd opposite, soon ruled out. She's expecting to eventually lose her lounge to highway widening though.

Michael wonders if better use could be made of the northern railway line through Kumeu. Electric trains stop at Swanson, mainly because of the narrow Waitakere tunnel, but an extension to Kumeu is under investigation.. A public transport group proposes a shuttle from Kumeu to Swanson, while Michael already drives his school-age children to Swanson train station to get to their city destinations.

A busway to Westgate is a good idea, Michael says. Although he thinks suggestions to extend it to Kumeu would ruin some of the district's best rural land to create a wide enough corridor. Improving bus services between Kumeu-Huapai and Westgate, especially using proposed arterial routes, would be better, he says. Options abound, although coming up with the right ones in time worry not only the Brajkovichs.

Future urban zones in the area, possibly up to 30 years away from fruition, still essentially retain a rural buffer between Kumeu and Westgate, which pleases Michael.

A modern concept plan for the area has been lacking, but that's something town planner and Kumeu-Huapai Residents and Ratepayers Association chairman Pete Sinton and others have now prepared.

Meanwhile, land is becoming more valuable here. Melba says real estate agents continue knocking regularly on their door. But she has the same answer. "It's not for sale." She would like to see her grandchildren take over the family business, which is doing very well.

Michael says they're producing 300,000 bottles annually now. If people are not stopping that often at the cellar door because of traffic congestion, then they're certainly buying Kumeu River wines big time in New Zealand and overseas.

So much so that Michael needs to find extra land for vineyards, and is considering bringing more grapes from Hawke's Bay. Kumeu River Wines looks set to retain its gateway profile, despite some other wineries disappearing from the area.

As teachers, we have always been concerned at the number of children, in the classrooms where we have worked, who have under-developed fine motor skills. This usually means they do not hold their pencil in the best way to produce neat, legible and efficiently produced handwriting. What are Fine Motor Skills? Motor Skills are divided into two categories: Gross Motor and Fine Motor. Gross Motor Skills are the coordination of movements that are required for large movements: crawling, running, jumping, throwing, climbing, etc. These are the skills that develop first. Fine Motor Skills are the coordination of movements that are required for small muscle movements: cutting, writing, opening water bottles, tying shoes, etc. Both sets of motor skills work together to help us function through our day, but fine motor skills are the more detailed of the two skills. Why Develop Fine Motor Skills? Do you really need to focus on Fine Motor Skills? Won't kids just pick up on them? To a certain extent, yes, kids will develop them as they go through life, but I'd argue that they might not be fully developed without some intentional practice. If we truly want to set up our children for success, I think it is important for us to set up opportunities for them develop. Fine motor skills are important because they directly impact how well a child can write and cut paper. In this digital age, this skill is often neglected as children spend so much time on touchscreen devices from an early age.



THE FACTS ABOUT WATER COLLECTION TANKS

An estimated 10% of New Zealanders obtain their drinking water from rainwater collected from the roof.

Safe drinking water is vital for good health, if your water comes from a water collection tank, it is up to you to keep your water safe and reduce the risk of water borne illness from contaminated tank water. Tank water can be collected from: rain off the roof, natural water (from streams or lakes), a bore or a spring.

Contamination of tank water collected from your roof may be caused by: Animal or bird faeces entering at the source of supply. These can carry harmful germs and can cause serious illness. Dead animals and insects in the gutters or the tank itself. Leaves, soil and other debris entering the tank. Lead flashing on the roof causing high lead levels in the collected water. Volcanic and wood ash, chemical spray drifts, cracks or holes in partially buried tanks. A number of actions can be taken to prevent contamination: Ensure the roof surface is suitable for collecting water. Keep the roof clean and free of debris. Keep the roof catchment area clear of overhanging branches and therefore away from birds, rodents, possums and cats. Avoid installing television aerials or other fixtures that may provide roosting for birds on the roof. Install mesh guards over gutters. Install leaf screens over downpipes. Install a first flush diverter to divert the first flush from the gutter away from the tank. It is also advisable to fit a filtration system, there are a number of systems available. Point of use system, where the filter is attached to the inlet supply, a tap or plumbed in with a dedicated faucet. Point



of entry system which is centrally installed system to treat all water. There are a range of filters available including: Mesh filter, Carbon filter, Reverse osmosis filter, UV sterilizer. It is important that inspections and maintenance are carried out regularly: Every 3 to 6 months - Inspect and clean gutters. Before cleaning be sure to disconnect the pipes feeding the storage tank. Every 12 months - Check the roof, remove debris as required and prune any overhanging tree branches. Check tank inlets mesh covers and leaf filters, clean and repair as necessary. Check the exterior of the tanks and pipes for any leaks or seepage and repair or replace as necessary. Check for evidence of access by animals, birds or insects and the presence of algal growth and accumulated sediment. Tanks and pipework should be disinfected every 18 to 24 months to reduce algal growth: Adding chlorine the Ministry of Health guidelines state that it is acceptable to add half a teaspoon of plain household bleach for every 10 ltrs of water, this process will kill most germs, it is important to be sure the product contains no added perfumes, colorants or detergents (surfactants). LAND COVENANTS

Land covenants are rules on the title to your land which restrict against certain materials and certain land uses such as non-residential use. They are usually intended to create a uniform high-quality subdivision neighbourhood. In practice, they are written by the developer usually according to the developer's tastes. For this reason, there are different land covenants in different subdivisions. However, they have become the norm in almost all of the new subdivisions in Auckland. Accordingly, it is helpful and important to get legal advice about the nature and content of any land covenants and the means by which they are enforced. Also, make sure that your builder is familiar with the



covenants and takes any special restrictions into account. This may make your building your dwelling more expensive than would have otherwise given that you do not have the freedom to use the cheapest materials including second-hand materials. Problem covenants which may be relevant as to the future include covenants which restrict you to one residential dwelling. This may have the effect of reducing the value of the land in the event it was ever rezoned for intensive housing including multi-storey housing. 

GROWING FRUIT TREES

It is the time of the year to plant fruit trees, and at Awa Nursery we have plenty to choose from, with more to come. Planting now ensures they have the rest of winter and all of spring to establish before their first summer.



You will want to choose a sheltered, open sunny spot for your fruit trees, with good drainage. Once you have chosen your tree or trees (remember some trees need a pollinator), prepare your site well. Dig a hole that is slightly deeper than the root depth of your plant and partly fill with a good garden mix. Place some slow release fertiliser tablets in the bottom as well. Most of our fruit trees are recently bagged having come to us bare rooted. The soil in the bags will be loose and the roots of your fruit tree must be kept moist. Hold the bag over the hole and cut it open

so you do not lose any soil and disturb any new roots developing. Before back filling the hole, position the tree stake so you don't damage any roots. Firmly compact the soil, making sure your tree is no deeper than it was in the bag. Water well. Watering is very important when growing new trees, and regular watering in dry periods over spring and summer is a must. PHELAN'S RODNEY LOCAL BOARD UPDATE

Over the last two months the new fortnightly wheelie bin recycling service has been rolled out across the parts of Auckland that didn't already have this service.

The large green and yellow bins are a change for Rodney residents, everything; paper, plastics, metal, go into this bin and at 280lt it's a lot bigger than we used to have.

I visited the recycling plant run by Visy through a BOOT agreement with council, 'build own operate transfer' enabling a state of the art facility to be developed and run privately at limited cost to ratepayers.

I was pretty impressed at how thorough the process of extracting every bit of recyclable material was.

A combination of machinery, technology and staff sort through the waste as it goes through a massive plant, spitting out graded glass, plastics and paper for on-sale around the globe to various manufacturers.

Visy processes over 500,000 cubic meters of recyclable materials a year and this is expected to grow with the new service.





Council wants to reduce the amount of waste we send to land fill and the new bins are part of that strategy.

The new bin system has been a big change, and these things never seem to occur without teething issues. By the end of June 200,000 new bins had been delivered out. Unfortunately some people have missed out for a variety of reasons and are still waiting for bins. Council now has some measures in place to deal with this temporary issue and hopefully by the time you read this those still waiting for bins will have them.

WHAT STOCK FOR MY BLOCK

Choosing which stock and in what numbers you can graze on a particular block of land is dependent on a number of factors. The Waimauku, Huapai, Kumeu area is fortunate to have some of the most fertile soil in the Rodney District. This will allow you to stock at a higher rate than other areas. Stocking rates are based on an old method, Livestock units (LSU) or Ewe Equivalents (EE), these standards are what other classes of stock can be compared. This area has the potential to allow stocking rates of between 7 and 13 LSU's per hectare, depending on the quality of your pasture. Now comes the fun bit, how many LSU's are your target stock. I hope I am not making this too complicated as I am unaware of any other method of ensuring your lifestyle block is grazed in a sustainable manner.

Alpaca are 1 unit Ewe - 55 kg at mating is 1 unit Hogget – 40kg is 1 unit Weaners – 135 – 270kg are 3.50 units Heifers, steers, bulls – 200 – 400kg are 3.70 units

These rates are based on a pasture only diet. Pregnant stock and horses in work will require more grazing and possibly dietary supplementation. WINTER VEGETABLES AND SALADS

So, should a winter gardener grow different crops depending on the climate?

Not necessarily. Winter has always been a good season for a wide array of vegetables including lettuce and spinach. You can grow some of the same varieties that you would in summer through the winter months with the help of a winter-protection device to broaden your garden's productivity. This might be a cold frame, a simple greenhouse, the quick-hoop system, or just a layer or two of floating row cover, often called a plastic house of sorts. All of these season-extension devices capture some of the earth's natural warmth, especially at night, and block the chilling, drying effect of wind. The results that you can achieve will surprise you. So before you give up on soggy soil, consider a growing shelter. Hoop systems can be purchased for around \$80 from the Warehouse and will provide years of service.

quicker and their core temperature can plummet easily leading to hypothermia. Your pet may not have been swimming but if they have been out in the cold snow/ice make sure you dry them off too. Take special consideration of their feet as they will have been in direct contact with the cold ground...imagine going out in the snow without shoes on. Brrrrrrr! How to know your pet is getting cold - Pets can show the same signs as we do when we get cold. You might see them shivering and they may be cold to the touch. Think about when you get cold: the first thing you notice is your extremities feeling cold, such as your hands and feet. For pets their extremities are their paws, tail and ears so these will start to feel cold first. If you notice your pet is getting cold then you need to try warm them up. Keep an eye out for signs of hypothermia. If you notice any of the following then your pet may be suffering from hypothermia: Pale gums & lips, depressed, reduced responsiveness, Slow pulse/low heart rate, collapsed/unconscious. APPLE CINNAMON MUFFINS

2 cups plain flour

- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp ground ginger
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 large egg
- 2 tbsp butter, melted and cooled
- 2 tbsp vegetable oil
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1 1/2 cups diced apple
- 3 tbsp coarse sugar
- 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon

Preheat oven to 180 degrees. Line a 12-cup muffin tin with paper liners. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, salt and spices. In a large bowl, whisk together brown sugar and egg. Whisk in melted butter, vegetable oil and vanilla. Working in two or three additions, alternately stir in flour mixture and buttermilk, ending with an addition of flour and mixing only until no streaks of flour remain visible in the batter. Stir in diced apple. Divide batter evenly into prepared muffin cups filling each to the top, or slightly over. In a small bowl, stir together coarse sugar and additional 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon. Sprinkle generously over muffins. Bake for 15-18 minutes, until a toothpick inserted into the centre of a muffin comes out clean

PORK AND MUSHROOM CHOW MEIN

Pork 300g Mushroom 300g 4 Choices Brand Egg noodles Bean Sprout 200g Spring Onion Minced garlic To Make: Marinate pork with 1/2 tablespoon soy sauce a slash of

tablespoon soy sauce, a slash of sesame oil and a dash of pepper. In a big bowl, soak dry noodles in hot boiling water for about



3-5 minutes, until loosened (do not over soak). Drain and put aside. In a saucepan, heat oil with minced garlic, sauté pork until it is nearly cooked and set aside. In the same saucepan, add oil and fry mushroom for 1 minute, add a little bit of water (1 tablespoon) and cover for 1 minute. Remove lid and add the pork back to the pan and fry with mushroom and 1 teaspoon oyster sauce for further 1 minute. Set aside. In the same saucepan, heat up oil and garlic, then fry bean sprouts to desired texture and set aside (as some people like it pretty raw). In the same saucepan again, heat up oil and stir in drained noodles, use a chopstick or kitchen tongs to loosen the noodles, add one tablespoon of soy sauce, one tablespoon of dark soy sauce (as its name suggests, this is used to make the noodles look more "dark"- the sauce itself is not too salty), a slash of sesame oil and keep stirring until noodles are evenly coloured. Assemble the noodles, pork and mushroom, bean sprout on a plate. Add some spring onion to





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enhance the colour contrast to the dark soy sauce. You can simply replace the pork with chicken, prawn or beef. Fresh mushroom can also be replaced by Shiitake mushroom.

THE ANNOYING PROBLEM OF HEAD LICE

The head louse is a tiny, wingless parasitic insect that lives among human hairs and feeds on tiny amounts of blood drawn from the scalp. Lice (the plural of louse) are a very common problem, especially for kids. They're contagious, annoying, and sometimes tough to get rid of. But while they're frustrating to deal with, lice aren't dangerous. They don't spread disease, although their bites can make a child's scalp itchy and irritated, and scratching can lead to infection. It's best to treat head lice quickly once they're found because they can spread easily from person to person. Signs of Head Lice - Although they're very small, lice can be seen by the naked eye. Here are things to look for: Lice eggs (called nits). These look like tiny yellow, tan, or brown dots before they hatch. Lice lay nits on hair shafts close to the scalp, where the temperature is perfect for keeping warm until they hatch. Nits look sort of like dandruff, only they can't be removed by brushing or shaking them off. Unless the infestation is heavy, it's more common to see nits in a child's hair than it is to see live lice crawling on the scalp. Lice eggs hatch within 1 to 2 weeks after they're laid. After hatching, the remaining shell looks white or clear and stays firmly attached to the hair shaft. This is when it's easiest to spot them, as the hair is growing longer and the egg shell is moving away from the scalp. Adult lice and nymphs (baby lice). The adult louse is no bigger than a sesame seed and is grayish-white or tan. Nymphs are smaller and become adult lice about 1 to 2 weeks after they hatch. Most lice feed on blood several times a day, but they can survive up to 2 days off the scalp. Scratching. With lice bites come itching and scratching. This is actually due to a reaction to the saliva of lice. However, the itching may not always start right away — that depends on how sensitive a child's skin is to the lice. It can sometimes take weeks for kids with lice to start scratching. They may complain, though, of things moving around on or tickling their heads. Small red bumps or sores from scratching. For some kids, the irritation is mild; for others, a more bothersome rash may develop. Excessive scratching can lead to a bacterial infection (this can cause swollen lymph glands and red, tender skin that might have crusting and oozing). If your doctor thinks this is the case, he or she may treat the infection with an oral antibiotic. You may be able to see the lice or nits by parting your child's hair into small sections and checking for lice and nits with a fine-tooth comb on the scalp, behind the ears, and around the nape of the neck (it's rare for them to be found on eyelashes or eyebrows). A magnifying glass and bright light may help. But it can be tough to find a nymph or adult louse — often, there aren't many of them and they move fast. Call your doctor if your child is constantly scratching his or her head or complains of an itchy scalp that won't go away. The doctor should be able to tell you if your child is infested with lice and needs to be treated. Not all kids have the classic



symptoms of head lice and some can be symptom-free. Parents it is really important that you check your child's hair every week. For any more info on this phone Carla at Zash Hair 021 814 663.



BRONCHIOLITIS: KNOW THE SIGNS

When I arrive at the clinic in winter I am often met with the familiar sound of the cough. The cough can range from the chesty cough to the barking cough; it can affect the young and old alike. It can sometimes have a musical quality if associated with a wheeze. GPs up and down the country will be greeted by the cough when they arrive at work during the winter months; and will have the some-



times tricky task of determining the cause of this common symptom. Bronchiolitis is a very common condition that causes babies to cough. It is not the same as bronchitis (which affects older patients). Bronchiolitis commonly affects those under the age of one. As well as a cough, it can cause a wheeze, a runny or blocked nose and occasionally, shortness of breath. Bronchiolitis is the result of a virus, so antibiotics are rarely prescribed. The most common causal virus is Respiratory Syncytial Virus, or RSV. Some babies with this infection get quite sick; they stop feeding and can struggle hard with their breathing, which can be quite dangerous. If you think your baby has these symptoms, take them to a doctor urgently. This may be their regular GP, an after-hours doctor or a doctor in the emergency department. The treatment for bronchiolitis aims to keep the baby comfortable. In most cases saline drops can be used to help unblock the nose and paracetamol can help minor fevers. During this time it is important for the baby to be monitored.





In particular close monitoring of breathing, temperature and fluid intake is essential. Most babies will recover within a week but some babies may need to go to the hospital if they are struggling to breathe or not taking enough fluid. It should be noted that younger babies, babies with other medical conditions, and premature babies are often more prone to getting this infection. If your baby has a cough which does not seem to be settling, or indeed a cough associated with a wheeze and other symptoms, take them to their doctor for a check-up. If your baby has bronchiolitis, it is important for the diagnosis to be made early, so that the appropriate advice and support can be given. 

STYLES OF SHOES FOR DIFFERENT TOE SHAPES

So what do you toes say about you and the style of shoe you should be wearing? Have a wee look and then match yourself with the



picture below, which one are you? I've a Roman foot. So what does this mean in terms of the shoes you wear? The general rule of thumb is: With the Roman, Germanic and Celtic shapes, round toes are going to suit this shape better and reduce the risk of bunions. This shape does not appeal to everyone so you can also look at the square toe shape, where the end of the shoe ends in a square and not a point. With the Greek and Celtic shapes you need to fit your footwear for your longest toe. If you don't fit for the longer toe it will cause pressure which will result in pain and also your toes being pushed out of line over time. With the Egyptian shape, you can wear most styles, including the tapered styles. The final rule of thumb is you should be able to wiggle your toes when they are in your shoes!

FASCINATING FASCIA

Fascia is "A sheet or band of fibrous connective tissue enveloping, separating, or binding together muscles, organs and other soft structures of the body." Fascia creates a web-like body system of sheets, chords and bags that wrap, divide and permeate every single muscle, bone, nerve, blood vessel and organ every bit of you is encased in it. It's our richest sense organ, it possesses the ability to contract independently of the muscles it surrounds and it responds to stress without your conscious command. That's a big deal. It means that fascia is impacting your movements, for better or worse. Healthy fascia grants you freedom of movement and always returns to its normal state; unfortunately, it's very unlikely that your fascia maintains its optimal flexibility, shape or texture. CAPTURING LEADS

How do you attract new customers - leads - for your business? Assuming you have a website you need to provide people with multiple ways to contact you. When a person completes the form you need to decide who is going to receive the details - usually via email. You can also look at having them automatically added to your newsletter database. TAX TIPS: CLAIMING HOME OFFICE AND TRAVEL EXPENSES

Claiming business expenses against your income is an important way of saving money by lowering your tax bill. Home Office: If the home is used for work purposes then a proportion of expenses relating to the property are deductible. To claim home office expenses, a specific part of the house must be set aside for business, such as a separate room or part of a room used for the business and nothing else. The proportion of expenses claimable is based on the proportion



of area used for business versus the total size of the home. Typical home office expenses that can be claimed include interest/ rent, insurance, power and rates. Repairs and maintenance may be claimed if incurred in relation to that designated home office space. Combined Business and Private Travel: If travel is part business and part holiday – whether in New Zealand or overseas – the IRD look at the dominant purpose of the trip to determine deductibility of expenditure. If the trip is principally for business then the travel expenditure (airfares, accommodation etc) will be deductible, except for any expenses relating directly to the personal part of the holiday. Conversely if the trip is principally for personal pleasure the travel expenditure (airfares, ac-



commodation etc) will not be deductible, except for any costs directly incurred by business activities, e.g. taxi to a conference, meal with a supplier. 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GUTTED WITH UNPLANNED GROWTH?

On the eve of the Unitary Plan the recommendations being released at the end of July 2016 by the Commissioners, we will then understand what growth is proposed for our district. The Auckland Council has to make the decision by the 19th August 2016, to determine what is accepted or rejected by them. Any disagreement will be subject to appeals. We the Kumeu/Huapai Residents & Ratepayers Association (KHRRA) are firmly of the belief that there can be no cohesive and effective growth in the area until such time as the New Zealand Transport Agency confirms the direction and layout of SH16. At the moment the State highway runs through the middle of Kumeu and Huapai. Will that be the future plan and what will be the size of the roading? The uncertainty over the SH/Way 16 is certainly inhibiting all growth in the area, for example, how can Auckland Transport recommend or finalising their roading plans with no knowledge of what will happen with the State Highway? The KHRRA openly and unreservedly supports growth in the North West area, but that growth must be planned not ad hoc growth as we seem to be experiencing at the moment with the Special Housing Areas (SHAs). If an overall structure plan that involved roading and all necessary community services was looked at before any further development, then the result for the North West of Auckland would be a well-planned, well-structured and very liveable rural township. A structure plan for the district, which we are now told is being scheduled for 2018 - 2020 is unacceptable. The Rodney Board is involved with a centre plan for the commercial township only, which we believe is a total nonsense and a red herring, as the only plan relevant should be a total structure plan. The centre plan is simply a non-statutory document and is not legally binding. The KHRRA is the only watch dog negotiating on behalf of commercial and residential ratepayers in our immediate district. We as a group are underfunded and in desperate need of more financial members to take the fight on. Without community support and help, an effective campaign to monitor and challenge decisions cannot happen. KHRRA proposes to engage a Watch Dog facility to notify the Association of planned developments and changes in the area, so that an effective response can be given in appropriate timeframes. For example: had we known of the Oraha Road SHA in advance we may have been able to demand more infrastructure to accommodate the change prior to its implementation. Recently some members of the Rodney Local Board granted the Association \$7,500.00 primarily to enable the Association to look at and comment on roading issues, we would like to acknowledge Board members Thomas Grace, Greg Sayers, Beth Holbrooke, James Colville and Steve Garner in their support and getting this grant over the line. Warren Flaunty has been supportive of the KHRRA but couldn't attend the final meeting. This is the first monies that the Association has ever received from the Auckland Council or the previous Rodney District Council, but this



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is only a small amount of what will be needed on an annual basis for KHRRA to be your effective Watch Dog. The Association feels that it is important for the community to understand that we are the only effective lobby group at present and therefore worthy of more community support. As an example: we see the Business District Association (BID) as a totally ineffective organisation to represent growth issues in the North West. KHR-RA, not the BID have been asked for assistant from the Kumeu Village Owners Association in respect of the development of the old Maddren site. We make the point, so the community understands that the BID's mandate is more to support business promotion, they are funded by the Auckland Council from a targeted rate demand on commercial businesses from Brigham Creek to Kaukapakapa for this purpose. How can you help? How can you protect the growth in your area? - become a financial member of KHRRA without delay! Membership for a residential property is \$30-35 per year, for a commercial member the fee is \$100 per year, but if commercial members are able to pay more, they are encouraged to do so. PASSING ON OUR FEARS TO CHILDREN

Within both the indoor and outdoor environment at Country Bears, we have a lot of bugs, insects, animals and birds that are a part of our everyday experience. Skinks are a massive attraction here, and the children love picking them up and feeling their cool, soft skin (see Alex in the photo below holding a baby skink). We always encour-



age the child to put them back gently where they found them, so they can return to their family. As adults, we may have fears from flying in a plane, a large dog, heights or an animal/insect. If we exhibit these fears with our verbal and non-verbal cues, the children will pick up on these and take these fears on as if they were their own. As teachers, adults and parents, the best way to prevent children from taking on these fears or phobias, is for us adults to "acknowledge". This could look something like this: We see a large spider in the corner of the deck, building a web. We bring the children's attention to the spider and point out all the things that make up the spider; "wow, look how many legs the spider has" or "this spider has such a large body compared to its legs". Acknowledge what the spider is doing, and why. We don't have to be brave and touch or hold the spider, we just have to acknowledge its presence, and encourage the children to have respect for this beautiful spider. If children show respect and empathy to the smallest of insects, this then carries with them through to their relationships with peers and their community as they get older. MADDREN SITE APPROVED

The 10.65 hectare "Maddrens block" sale offer has raised concerns among ratepayer representatives now that the Kumeu Town Centre application is proceeding on a non-notified basis. The site is listed at 94-104 Main Rd (State Highway 16), tenders closing August 11. It offers 2.5ha in 16 "super lots" with consent for 172 dwellings. About 1.76ha in nine lots is also for retail,

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office, live/work sites and apartments. The combined residential component is 211 dwellings. Most buildings are likely to be two to three storeys, and options could include a mix of food and beverage outlets and "eclectic" retail "similar to a



Ponsonby Central", Bayleys Real Estate marketer James Hill says. But a memorandum of understanding signed between the Kumeu/Huapai Residents and Ratepayers Association and initial site owner Maddrens in 2012 seems to have been ignored in the process, association chairman Pete Sinton says. "Branton Developments purchased land from Maddrens and submitted a concept plan to the Auckland Council for approval and are now selling the whole proposal for another developer to proceed with. "The lack of community consultation and input is disappointing and not in terms of the agreement. It has shut the community out from having an input into Kumeu's largest development." HOW TO GET WHAT YOU WANT FASTER

This article is for anyone who has ever desired something but does never have it. This is for people who dream big yet seem to play small. Get ready to swallow your pride and look at yourself from another angle as 99% of our lives we are single handedly creating. Therefore, if you are not getting what you want, there is probably another factor at play. I work with focus and intention. I work directly with what is happening (or not happening) in life right now and what are the main feelings and thoughts attached to this. What we tend to focus on, we get more of and in the areas of life, we are not happy with, we are most likely well practised in exactly the kind of thinking that keeps us right where we are. BELIEFS. I tend to think that word doesn't resonate with a lot of us - but that's what we are talking about here. We can think of beliefs as being installed in us not from rational choice - but unconsciously, from our environment. Some of us want a business but believe that there will always be money problems. Some of us want a skinny body but believe that skinny people are awful or that they will be noticed too much. Some of us want to research an idea we have but are embarrassed about being judged. Some of us want to buy a house but believe it's 100% impossible. Some of us want more money but have been trained to believe its bad. When we want something but are not getting it, it means there is a louder, bigger belief we are living equal to. The first thing is to recognise is that these beliefs are not you. Just like a computer, we can upload new ideas and get rid of old ones. Look at every statement or belief you have written down. Most of it will likely be negative and not serving you. Your job now is to create new beliefs. The easy way to do this is to write a new statement that is the opposite.
