GRAND SLAM FOR WAIMAUKU BOWLERS

A rare double "grand slam" has given the Waimauku Bowling Club a much-needed fillip.

It's the first time in the club's 80-year history the feat has been achieved even once, let alone twice in one season.

Club president Colin Calder, 80, says it's the first time he recalls the achievement, and he's been there 30 years.

Colin won seven trophies and Fay Gulley, 82, won six to complete the remarkable double in the men's and women's events. They won the club handicap singles and pairs, championship singles and pairs, triples and fours, with Colin adding the veteran's singles title as well. Fay missed playing in the veteran's event as she was in hospital at the time.

The two received specially designed fern shaped trophies to keep in commemoration of their record setting attainment.

"It might never happen again," Colin says.

Both the Kumeu residents love the sport and say it keeps them fit and active.

"Bowls suits men and women," Colin says.

"As a sport it's one in which you use most of your body – you are walking a lot, swinging your arms, using your mental abilities and also your eyes and ears.

So we help the community by keeping people fit and healthy." Both say the social aspect is important too.

Colin took up bowls when he retired from market gardening. "I had a friend, Wally Hawkins, who played and he got me into bowling.

"I still had a farm to run but I'd always been into sport, such as rugby."

Colin became Waimauku's greenkeeper for about 20 years – in the days when it had two greens. Now it has just the one, appropriately named after Colin in January last year in recognition of his services.

The artificial "carpet green" by Tiger Turf has earned the praises of all who play on it after being installed nearly three years ago. Players from throughout the club's North Harbour region come to bowl on it.

Fay joined the club in 2005 after moving from the North Shore where she was in the Beach Haven Bowling Club and previously played netball. She was the Waimauku club's most improved women's player in 2017.

Her other sports interest is playing indoor bowls in the Kumeu Community Hall Monday nights.

"I love it," she says of her bowling. "It's a good outlet."

It's not just about staying active; the two enjoy the social side as well. Playing all year round, club bowlers have regular tournaments both internally and with other clubs, Monday roll-ups and Saturday sessions where anyone can join in and try the sport. Fridays the clubrooms and bar are open from 4pm-6pm, with light meals usually served.

There's often a trading table too, where newcomers can pick up a club uniform, shoes and other items cheap. So there's always plenty going on at the club.

But Colin wants to see new members join.

"We have about 45 in the club and we'd love to have younger ones – particularly husbands and wives – come and join us." With many new housing developments in the area, Colin hopes to see more people using the club's facilities.

"The younger generation brings in fresh ideas," he adds.



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School-aged players are not uncommon in the sport and there are many good players in their early years. In fact, much of the New Zealand bowls team comprises players under 30.

"I think people have got too busy," Colin saying, adding that situation applies to many clubs and service organisations now. People of all ages are welcome though.

The club has one member aged 95, Hilton Jameson, who has been playing for 60 years and is still a very good and competitive bowler, Colin says. He also recalls the famous Ivan Kostanich of Helensville playing great bowls well into his mid to late 80s.

The club has benefitted from the long-awaited roundabout at the State Highway 16-Muriwai Road intersection.

The roundabout at the once notorious intersection is working well and has improved the club's visibility and appearance from the road, Colin says. Plenty of parking is also available.

Joining the club isn't expensive. It costs about \$140 in annual fees and bowling items tend to be a one-off initial cost. "Social members pay less, and it costs \$2 to join in the roll-up," Colin says.

MISS UNIVERSE FINALIST SETTING AN EXAMPLE

Amber-Lee Friis is proving to others you don't need a privileged lifestyle to be a Miss Universe New Zealand finalist.

The 21-year-old Kumeu resident should know. Her parents broke up when she was just two-years-old and she shifted home 13 times before turning 15.

While she enjoyed her stay at Riverhead and Waimauku primary schools, a more central West Auckland school gave her a negative experience.



Pupils dubbed her 'Chimoan' because of her narrow eyes and tan skin – she's half Samoan but is probably of European/Dutch ancestry, with no Asian influence evident.

Kids would steal items out of her school bag, throw her books on the ground and do other mean things. Amber-lee was often left crying as a result.

Amber-Lee says she never made any close friends at school – "because I knew I would be moving again soon".

Life didn't improve as she got older.

"I was living in my car and showed up at my aunty and uncle's

and asked them if I could stay the night."

They persuaded Amber-Lee to remain and she got an advertising job and then a caravan to stay in for about two years.

She would change buses three times to get to work in Albany, waking at 5am and returning home around 8.30pm. "I had no social life."

Her uncle and aunty provided some good advice, including goal setting. So Amber put her life on track and about two years ago started going to the gym to improve her fitness and tone.

"I never thought about beauty contests."

Then a woman contacted AmberLee to see if she was interested in the Miss Universe New Zealand pageant. Amber-Lee was suspicious at first, then learned the woman knew of her through her advertising work and she decided to take the chance.

"I realised 'wow, this is legit'.

"I'm now the only one in the pageant with tattoos and an ear stretcher," she laughs.

Girls don't need to come from a privileged background to enter such things, Amber-Lee says.

She went through a selection process with others, including a "stiletto camp" at Western Springs, followed by a "retreat" in Thailand, to gain entry to the 20 finalists.

On August 4, Amber-Lee will join them on stage at the Sky City theatre to select the final 10 and the top three.

She is nervous about it – "I've never done anything like this before"

The event will be broadcast live on Bravo and live-streamed to about 600,000 YouTube followers.

In the lead-up, Amber-Lee has been busy in what spare time she has doing fundraising for the pageant.

She says about half of what she raises will go to a charity of her choice. In this instance it's Variety – the Children's Charity, which gives disadvantaged Kiwi kids the childhood they deserve. That's something very close to Amber-Lee's heart.

She has helped take a few children to Rainbow's End and planned a 'Fit 4 Kids' event in the Whenuapai hall to promote fitness and well-being. Brochures are available to help children with fitness at home without the need for gym equipment.

Amber-Lee says her goal is to be a model, but she also wants to do more in graphic design. In the future she'd like a family too. Amber-Lee also visits a younger sister who has followed in her footsteps by taking up cheerleading.

"She's gone much further than I did at that stage and has represented New Zealand."

Amber-lee says a famous quote perhaps sums up her own sit-

"We are all in the gutter, but some of us are looking at the stars," Oscar Wilde wrote in his play Lady Windermere's Fan early on in his career.

It means everyone has their struggles but that some people remain positive despite their challenges and stay focused on their dreams and goals, eventually finding success in life.


HUAPAI MAN BUYS A TANK

Motorists won't be messing with Crown Xu on the roads.

He's just bought a tank – no, not a yank tank or dilapidated vehicle – a genuine ex-British Army tank.

Crown got the 1979 FV433 Abbot tank at an army supplies auction and he understands it saw service in the Gulf War.

The tank's road legal, with rubber pads in the tank's tracks to prevent road damage.



But don't worry drivers – Crown plans to use it mainly in parades like those on Anzac Day and school demonstrations, but especially for events involving the Special Operations Force Re-enactment club that he leads.

The camouflage-coloured tank arrived at Crown's home with a spare diesel engine and a spare gearbox, plus all the accessories and hardware associated with such a piece of military equipment.

Crown believes it's probably the second Abbot in the country, but the only one in its paint pattern.

He's got the required licence to drive it, but needs at least three more people with military backgrounds or engineering experience to help.

"It takes four people to operate the tank," Crown says.

Meanwhile, he's been grappling with a slight parking issue. It was temporarily parked outside his home (his garage was obviously insufficient) until secure storage was found.


"I don't think anyone would want to steal it," Crown laughs. He also owns an armoured personnel carrier.

Two military Hummers (Humvees) are coming, which will make a total of seven military vehicles owned by club members. Others include two six-wheeled trucks from Australia, two Land Rover vehicles and a military buggy which looks like something out of the movie Mad Max.

"It's very exciting," says Crown who established the club about three years ago.

The club has had displays at the Kumeu Show, the Museum of Transport and Technology, a Warbirds open day at Ardmore and even appeared in Christmas parades.

Interest and membership is growing – the club now has 26 members and hopes to get around 50-70 to put on top-notch shows.







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A couple of military trained German Shepherd dogs are also in the club.

Regular training sessions for members are held, usually on private farmland under former Special Air Services members' instruction. Crowns say the club will soon have its own training ground.

He expects shows featuring the Special Operations Forces club will feature this summer.

"Usually in winter the weather and ground is too wet for heavy military vehicles to be shown off properly," Crown says.

BIG CHANGES AT KUMEU-HUAPAI LAW CENTRE

The Kumeu district has changed considerably, and so too has the Kumeu-Huapai Law Centre.

It's been at 250 Main Road (State Highway 16) for many years, though.

Russell Lawn bought the practice from former Helensville MP Dail Jones, QSO, in the late 1990s, with Dail staying on. Dail spent more than 13 years in Parliament with National and then New Zealand First.

Sadly, Russell died on January 2, 2018,

following a short illness, a shock not only to his wife and children but also his colleagues and clients.

In April 2018, Kumeu-Huapai Law Centre merged with Clear-Stone Legal, which also has offices on the Te Atatu Peninsula and has been operating for four years.

Debra Barron is the Principal of the firm, and Jane Barclay a Legal Executive.

Jane and Debra saw the opportunity with the merger to create a modern business with a model built around both the clients' needs and their own family needs.

Debra is a mum of two young boys and is married to Stacy, a carpenter who grew up at Muriwai Beach.

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SAFER COMMUNITIES

Sadly we attended another tragedy in Muriwai recently where a mother and father lost their lives whilst fishing at the beach. What was supposed to be a fun day fishing with three of their children, quickly turned to tragedy and it is a terrible reminder of how quick life can change.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank our wonderful community members, our Volunteer Firemen, Surf Life Savers, Park Rangers, First Responders and Ambulance staff, and members of public who were first on the scene and did everything they could to assist. These volunteers are our real hero's and all too often drop everything to assist with tragedies like these.

I would also like this to be a reminder of just how dangerous our beautiful beach can be.

If you are planning a trip to Muriwai, know your own abilities and limits, be responsible and don't take unnecessary risks. Conditions can change quickly and even the most experienced fishermen, surfers, and swimmers can get into trouble.

Swim only in designated swimming areas and between the flags, if you're not a confident swimmer, I'd advise not to swim there at all; it's just not worth the risk. If you decide to fish off the rocks, wear appropriate clothing and a life jacket. Wearing heavy layers of clothing, shoes, gumboots etc is not advised. If the weather conditions are bad avoid recreational activities at the beach.

We have so many visitors to Muriwai beach and some are genuinely unaware of the risks the beach can pose. If you are a local and you witness someone doing something or about to do something you feel is unsafe, don't be afraid to speak to them as long as it's safe for you to do so, and offer them some friendly advice. Your advice may just help prevent another tragedy.

Winter is certainly upon us now with rain, wind and cold weather so make sure you follow these fire-safety tips to help keep you and your family safe and warm.

Electric blankets: If your electric blanket or cord is showing any signs of wear, have it checked by a competent service person or have it replaced. Don't take the risk, always make sure that your electric blanket is switched off before getting into bed. Never use pins or sharp objects to secure the electric blanket to the bed and never tuck it in under the bed. If the blanket becomes soiled, sponge it lightly and allow to dry naturally on a flat surface. Do not dry-clean or use a washing machine or spin dryer. When putting your electric blanket away for summer, don't fold it – roll it.

Heaters & clothes dryers: After kitchen fires, fires involving heating and drying are the next most common reason the Fire Service is called out. Remember the heater-metre rule – always keep furniture, curtains, clothes and children at least one metre away from heaters and fireplaces. Don't store objects on top of your heating appliance. Never cover heating appliances. Don't overload clothes

dryers and clean the lint filter after each load cycle.

Fire stations welcome new members so if you live close to a fire station call in and say hi or go to fire-andemergency.nz/volunteering/with-us/ to find out more about being an emergency responder.



THE 5 C'S OF LENDING, WHAT DO LENDERS LOOK FOR?

When applying for a loan, it's important that you have a good understanding of where you sit in the big world of lending. Below are some of the areas that lenders look at.

Character - When banks evaluate character, they look at stability — e.g. how long you've lived at your current address, how long you've been in your current job, and whether you have a good record of paying your bills on time and in full. If you want a loan for your business, the lender may consider your experience and track record in your business and industry to evaluate how trustworthy you are to repay.

Capacity - Capacity refers to considering your other debts and expenses when determining your ability to repay the loan i.e. in the banks eyes, do you have enough income to pay back the loan? Not many people know, but some banks use 7% in their calculations, even though most rates currently sit in the 4% range.

Capital - Capital refers to your net worth — the value of your assets minus your liabilities. In simple terms, how much you own (for example, car, real estate, cash, and investments) minus how much you owe.

Collateral - Collateral refers to any asset of a borrower (for example, a home) that a lender has a right to take ownership of and use to pay the debt if the borrower is unable to make the loan payments as agreed.

Some lenders may require a guarantee in

addition to collateral.

Conditions - Lenders consider several outside circumstances that may affect the borrower's financial situation and ability to repay, e.g. what's happening in the local economy. If the borrower is a business, the lender may evaluate the financial health of the borrower's industry, their local market, and competition.

Some lenders develop their own loan decision "scorecards" using aspects of the 5 C's and other factors.

PROPERTY MARKET REPORT

Three years ago we experienced annual property price increases of 20 percent, and this year the property prices in Auckland are down 2.2 per cent to March year

But let's put this into context. The number of properties sold under the \$750,000 price band experienced 4 percent more sales to March year end and the \$750,000 to \$2 million price band had 5 per cent fewer sales for the same period. New Zealand's total number of house sales fell almost 10 percent over this period and took longer to sell.

The number of houses sold fell to 7,768 in March down from 8,622 a year earlier, which was the biggest single sales month in 2017, with Auckland sales numbers

down 12 percent to 2,386. While activity has been slowing, prices remain resolute, with the house price index rising 4.2 percent in New Zealand. Excluding Auckland, the index climbed 7.2 percent, while Auckland property had a modest 1 percent increase.

House sale records were set elsewhere in New Zealand. Gisborne prices rose 17.9 percent year on year to reach \$330,000, the Hawke's Bay rose 11.7 percent to \$445,000 and Wellington prices rose 10 percent to \$583,000.

Auckland has also featured some way down on a global measure of house price rises. In April, The Guardian newspaper reported on the Knight Frank residential index: "London was ranked 101st with a 2 per cent gain while Auckland, dropped to 99th. Berlin topped the index with a 20.5 percent jump last year.

WHAT IS FRINGE BENEFIT TAX (FBT)?

Fringe benefit tax affects many business owners. A fringe benefit arises when an employer provides a non-cash benefit to an employee or their associates. With the exception of a wage/salary or residential accommodation, most benefits provided to employees (arising as a result of the employment) are classed as fringe benefits. Cash benefits (wage/salary/residential accommodation) given to employees are taxable to the employee and employers must deduct tax in the form of PAYE. On non-cash benefits that are classed as fringe benefits, the employer is liable for tax in the form of FBT. The major forms of taxable fringe benefits are motor vehicles made available for an employee's private use, goods/services provided to employees either free or subsidised, low-interest loans advanced to employees, and employer contributions made to sickness/ accident/death benefit funds, superannuation schemes (excluding KiwiSaver) and specified insurance policies.

BRIGHT LINE TEST AND THE FAMILY HOME

Most homeowners are aware that the family home is exempt from the bright line test. However, this does not mean one can sell the family home freely during the bright line test period (which is now 5 years). Firstly, it has always been

the law that if you purchase a house with the intention of reselling it, you are probably carrying out a taxable activity. Secondly, Inland Revenue policy (usually available from the Inland Revenue website) indicates that you may only claim the main home exemption twice over any two-year period.

Moreover, there are other issues arising such as whether you rent out part of the house or the minor dwelling. You risk losing the main home exemption if you do not use more than 50 % of the space in the main home for your living purposes. 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SELLING YOUR HOUSE




By Carmen Franich, Smith and Partners lawyers. Do you understand the Vendor Warranties & Undertakings clause?

In the standard agreement for Sale and Purchase, the clause for Vendor Warranties and Undertakings provides warranties from the vendor to the purchasers as to the state of the property and set actions that will take place as part of settlement.

For example, they provide that the vendor confirms that the chattels are in working order, any work done to the property meets government regulations and that the vendor has not provided undisclosed consent to third parties which may affect the property.

Vendors should read the vendor warranties very carefully to ensure that there are no outstanding issues that they are aware of, especially where they might have done work to the property. If there are any issues, a special condition can be included that will put the purchaser on notice and shift the burden. An example of this is a "as is, where is" clause which might relate to, say, an unpermitted garage.

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

VIREYAS — GROWING TIPS

Awa Nursery currently has some beautiful Vireyas and the colour display is very eye catching. The Vireya is such a popular plant that will reward you with regular displays of exotic blooms in an array of colours. We thought we would pop a few tips on the general maintenance of these beauties. Where to Plant: Vireyas need to be grown in a frost-free location, with good light, preferably



where they will receive full sunshine in the morning and dappled light in the afternoon. They will need very free draining soil as they dislike becoming water logged. Ideally when planting the Vireya, make the hole shallow and mound the soil up above the ground just enough to cover the root ball. These plants are easily grown in pots, having the advantage of portability. Pruning: When a plant is young, it is a good practice to pinch out the new growing tip as it emerges at the end of each branch. This encourages the plant to put out more growth, making it more compact and bushy. Feed the plant before pinching helps with this new growth. If your Vireya has become too leggy with many bare lower branches, this could be a result of too much shade, and it is worthwhile moving it to a sunnier site. This will often promote new growth on the stems. However, if a large

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plant needs reducing in size, cut one third of the branches back to the desired height, cutting just above a set of leaves, leaving a few leaves on each stem. It's all about the roses. Plant now to enable the plant to get the roots established before the summer months. Rose care is easier than you think—anyone can grow them successfully. For the best show of flowers and the healthiest plants, rose bushes should receive six to eight hours of sunlight daily. Roses also thrive when planted in well-drained soil that is rich in organic matter. Fertilise when planting with a controlled release fertiliser and



then every 4 weeks during the growing season. Watch for diseases like powdery mildew or black spot. We have a very good three in one bee friendly spray that is seaweed based. An insecticide, fungicide and fertiliser - three jobs in one. Water regularly in the drier months especially the first year. We have a lovely

PREVENT STAFF INJURIES WITH THIS 8 POINT CHECKLIST

Even if you are confident Williams that your organisation is compliant in terms of Health & Safety, remember that being compliant is measuring



just a moment in time. Use the following checklist to reconsider some of the ways that your staff could be injured in your workplace. See if you can score all 8 points.

- 1. Does Your Workplace Have An Accident Register?
- Q: Does your workplace have an Accident Register? [1 point]
- Q: Do you encourage the reporting of staff injuries? [1 point] Remember a basic rule of health and safety is that all accidents and incidents need to reported and recorded.
- 2. Does Your Workplace Have a Risk / Hazard Register?
- Q: Does your workplace have a Risk/Hazard Register? [1 point]
- Q: The Risk/Hazard Register should be available for all staff to read and access. Is yours? [1 point]

In most businesses, slips, trips and falls, carrying heavy loads, lifting and standing for long periods of times can all lead to injury.

Q: Do you have an item in your Risk/Hazard Register that deals with slips and trips? [1 point]

Controls may be cleaning up slips promptly or buffing the floors so that they are not over slippery. Diseases, such as mumps,

chicken pox, or the flu, are spread through the air when infected people cough, sneeze or speak and is a common risk for people working in a close proximity environment.

Q: If your workers work closely together, for example in retail or in an open office area, have you checked your Risk/Hazard Register to see if the above items are mentioned? [1 point]

If they are, then that is good. If not, ensure that they are added to the Register with an action or control to help minimise the possibility of catching the flu – especially at this time of the year. In the case of the flu an action would be that all staff wash their hands regularly.

Q: You can put signs on the mirrors in the washroom to remind staff about the need to wash their hands - a simple action to prevent spread. Do you have these signs in place? [1 point]

3. Are you protecting lone workers?

Remember that lone workers can sometimes be prone to confrontation, especially in retail, in construction and the service

Controls may be that such workers report the reason for the visit, destination and perhaps advise a third party prior to undertaking it.

Record the timeframe from start to end that someone is likely to be alone, ensuring they report back in upon return.

Just as important is that all the risks and hazards should be rated to record the likelihood of an occurrence and the consequence

This becomes the review point to follow up on minimising or eliminating identified hazards going forward.



Prune hydrangeas, plant hedges and borders and clear areas with planted bulbs to help them grow.



Plant Potatoes

Plant sprouted potatoes in a trench and lightly cover with soil, every few weeks hill up the soil about halfway up the stem to get a better potato crop.


IN THE VEGGIE PATCH

- **Plant sprouted seed potatoes** by digging a trench and cover lightly with soil. Every few weeks 'hill' up the soil as plants grow
- Sow tomato, capsicum and zucchini seeds indoors or under cover
- Lift mint and give the roots a trim, then replant.

 Mint increases its root size very quickly in proportion to its foliage growth
- Rosemary varieties can make a great hedge or border and its blue flowers brighten the winter vegetable garden.

LAWNS

- A gentle but effective early fertiliser for lawns is Garden Supreme
- Avoid mowing very wet lawns until they have dried out a little.

With it's pretty blue flowers and delicious taste get some rosemary into your garden!


THE REST OF THE GARDEN

- Prune hydrangeas and apply lime around the bush to encourage pink flowers, or Aluminium Sulphate for blue. If you are planting white flowered types avoid full sun - they look best in dappled shade
- Late August is a great time to plant hedges and perennial borders for the summer garden. Mulch after planting
- **Clear areas** in the garden where bulbs and deciduous plants are poking through the soil again exposes them to the sun to encourage growth.



Sow tomato, capsicum and zucchini seeds indoors or in a covered area

Now's the time to plant your spring produce like tomatoes, capsicums and zucchini. Put them into pots or containers and leave them somewhere warm to germinate, watering daily. They should sprout up within 2 weeks.

DOG SAFETY TIPS

With the ever growing number of home delivery services being provided by retailers and other grocery suppliers, staff will increasingly need to be aware of the risks associated with entering a private residence, or even some businesses, where there may be a dog present.

Over the past 10 years New Zealanders have reported over 123,000 bites at a cost of over \$40 million. Last year alone there were over 14,500 dog bites reported that required medical attention.



So how can we protect our workers? Education and training is the key. Does your staff understand why a dog may bite? Do they recognise the signs when a dog is nervous? Are they inadvertently behaving in a manner that may scare the dog or intimidate it thus causing a bite?

Here are some tips from The Dog Safe Workplace around miscommunications between humans and dogs that can help keep your staff safe:

A wagging tail – many of us have been told that this is a sign that the dog is happy. Unfortunately this is not always true. Research has shown us the tail wagging shows that the dog is engaging with something in its environment. They could be engaging in a positive or negative way. The Dog Safe Workplace has videos of aggressive dogs with their tails wagging.

Rolling on its back – again many of us think this is because they want their belly rubbed. Again not true. They are actually telling us that they are scared and small so please don't hurt me.

Bringing you their toy – yes they are showing you their toy and want you to play with them. Not always true. They may want you to play with them. Though this is not always the case and if you go to take the toy or pick up the ball they may try to snatch it back which could result in a bite. Also there may be certain rules that need to be followed or commands given when playing with that particular dog.

If you have staff entering properties with dogs it is your responsibility as the PCBU to ensure you are educating your staff to avoid known risks. Dogs on properties are a known risk, we cannot eliminate the risk but we can take steps to minimise the risk as much as possible.


Is your cat's vaccination still current? According to Veterinary Care NZ, due to cat's natural roaming habits often bring them into contact with other animals which increases their exposure to disease. Several diseases can be fatal especially for kittens. Fortunately vaccinations are available to prevent many cat diseases. It's highly recommend that cats are vaccinated against Feline Enteritis, the two viruses that cause Feline Respiratory Disease and Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV).



Feline Enteritis is highly contagious and causes vomiting, diarrhoea, fever and intense abdominal pain. 75% of kittens who get this virus die within one week.

Feline Respiratory Diseases also known as the cat flu, are highly contagious and easily spread in the air from cat to cat. They cause sneezing, coughing, discharges from the nose and eyes and ulcers in the mouth. The diseases can be fatal in young kittens and older cats.

Feline Immunodeficiency Virus. This virus causes a potentially fatal disease which interferes with the immune system of a cat. At the West Harbour Cattery, all cats boarding with us MUST be vaccinated yearly against cat flu and feline enteritis and the vaccination must not be given no later than 10 days prior to arrival. We insist to sight the current veterinary certificate when you drop off your cats. 2 cups self-raising flour 1 cup sugar 1/2 cup poppyseeds (one packet) Finely grated rind of 2 lemons 100g butter

2 large eggs

1 cup milk Topping:

Juice of 2 lemons

1/4 cup sugar

Measure flour, sugar and poppyseeds into a large bowl. Grate in lemon rind. Melt butter, add milk and eggs. Beat with a fork to combine. Tip liquid ingredients into dry and fold together until flour is dampened. Do not over mix. Spoon into 12 greased or oil sprayed muffin tray and bake at 200°C for 10-15 minutes. Topping:

While muffins cook, squeeze lemon juice and mix with sugar. As soon as muffins removed from tray, brush lemon sugar glaze over top of muffins. Cool on a wire rack.

IS PAIN CRAMPING YOUR STYLE?

Still not very strong, but we saw his legs and upper body made slight twitching movements when COGY actually moved forward on a slight downward slope. For Miro and his mother, keeping Miro fit is vital. He needs help transferring himself to toilet etc. If his legs are too weak, his mother cannot hold him by herself and their freedom would be very limited. They want to introduce COGY into their lives and not only for strengthening Miro's legs. COGY activity is one of very few activities Miro can enjoy. I love his smile when he moves on COGY. use your legs to lift the load. Stand as close to the carousel as possible. Next important thing to remember is to get up and move during the flight. Joints and muscles get stiff and tight with prolonged sitting on the plane. It is a good idea to get up and stretch at least every couple of hours, for example, when going to the toilet. 

TIBIAL STRESS SYNDROME

AKA...shin splints - every runner's worst nightmare. Tibial stress syndrome is an overuse or repetitive overload injury of the front/back/side of the shin bone. More commonly known as shin splints. Incidence - 10-15 % of runners. Females have a higher incidence rate when compared to males. Risk factors -



History of previous lower leg injuries, Improper running technique/form, Low running cadence, Training errors- i.e. too much too soon or for too long. Causes - Muscular imbalances around the hip, knee and ankle, inappropriate footwear, too much load. Symptoms - pain localised to the inside of the lower shin, made worse by running initially but when the area warms up it tends to improve. Once the exercise is ceased the pain returns and is usually higher in intensity. It can also be aggravated by jumping or high intensity ballistic type exercises. Treatment - Activity modification initially-bike/swim/cross trainer/walking, Load management - reduce the milage, Physiotherapy modalities addressing muscle imbalance and core activation. Running technique retraining (if appropriate). Possible complications - If not addressed appropriately then recurrence can be high and progression on to a tibial stress fracture is possible. This is very, very bad and can mean using elbow crutches and non-weight bearing for up to 6 weeks. What should you do next? If you are feeling pain, discomfort and/or stiffness in your calf, shin or lower leg region then I recommend you get in contact with us at the clinic and we will be able to help you moving forward with your rehabilitation. WHOSE RESPONSIBILITY IS YOUR HEALTH?



PHELAN'S LOCAL BOARD UPDATE

Much of what Council does is defined by central government decisions that drive and regulate the services and infrastructure











we deliver.

In June the government released its National Policy Statement on transport which signalled a pivot towards road safety and public transport.

This decision shaped Council's Regional Land Transport Plan because to achieve maximum government subsidies for its projects it needs to align with the transport agencies direction.

The change in government direction and subsequent change in focus of Auckland Transport and NZTA, the government agency responsible for State Highways, has worked in Rodney's favour. Auckland Transport's independence from political interference means it works on prioritising its budget on areas of need.

Rodney has the highest road death and serious injury statistics in Auckland, these have got worse over the last few years. This was behind the government's decision in 2017 to approve the Safe Roads Alliance's \$70 million project which will transform SH16 from Brigham Creek to Waimauku. NZTA also has a programme of safety improvements along SH16 to Wellsford.

Auckland Transport has allocated more money to Rural Road Safety improvements and a significant increase in the road sealing budget. This will see welcome improvements to our roads. Public transport is a major beneficiary of the new direction, we don't have much of it in Rodney but demand will grow as traffic inevitably worsens on the motorways. The proposal for light rail to Kumeu could be described as being in 'gestation'. It's a partially funded idea not a reality. AT's studies show a busway along SH16 like the North Shore's would be quicker and cheaper to build. Rail to Huapai seems to have disappeared off the radar of the government who will ultimately be paying the biggest share of upgrades to make it work. All of these things have vague start dates past council and general election cycles that make them subject to political change.

The Local Board is well aware that scale of transport infrastructure needed across Auckland and the billions of dollars required to build it mean any solution for the North West could be a decade away and residents are clear they don't want to wait that long.

We have an increased discretionary transport budget to \$1 million pa and with the targeted rate there is now a 'Rodney Transport Fund' of \$56 million which gives the Local Board an unprecedented budget that is purely for the benefit of Rodney. Obviously, we want to leverage this money to attract government subsidies and have started work with AT planning a park'n'ride for Kumeu and bus services that will link Huapai and Riverhead to the CBD and Albany, there is also work being done on a service linking Helensville and Kaukapakapa to Silverdale. Your Local Board has quietly worked behind the scenes on evidence-based solutions to our issues. This requires a lot of effort and is not the easy route, but we believe that it is the one that will best serve Rodney. Our goal is to cement in long term gains for our region; this requires a collaborative approach that builds trust and confidence in the Local Board as a partner with councillors and the Mayor (regardless of who that is) who ultimately







make the decisions about how funds are allocated across Auckland.

AUCKLAND'S TOP SUPERMARKET CHECKERS

but we need to know generally what the position is and the proposed build time.

From this base, the Association can start a 'Framework Plan' for the District.

Unless NZTA deliver a speeded up roading solution, the community will have to endure slow traffic to Auckland in the morning and return in the afternoon.

The S.H/Way 16 isn't coping with the traffic now, it will only get worse based on our projections.

Turning to other development pressures, the 'Countryside Living' zone is now being subdivided into 1 hectare blocks. Whilst this will provide the low density rural house sites, it is still contributes to growth in housing and traffic.

Transferable titles and the Council rules associated with subdivision are not completely understood. That is why the Association is giving the August meeting to a discussion on the process of obtaining and using transferable titles.

COUNCILLOR'S CORNER

By Rodney councillor Greg Sayers. Last month nine Auckland councillors, including myself, signed a highly publicised letter criticising the leadership style of Auckland Mayor Phil Goff, a style labelled secretive and non-inclusive.

This was followed by further accusations which included the existence of a corrosive culture within the Auckland Council.

I keep asking the tough questions about reining in the council's overspending, getting financial transparency and fighting rate increases. That creates a powerful political tension and I always anticipated some political push back by the mayor and those heavily aligned with him wanting to introduce new taxes.

Ratepayers deserve the best return on their rates. Sometimes the flame has to be held to the council's feet in order to get Rodney what its ratepayers fairly deserve.

My job is to fight for Rodney's voice to be heard and for our rates to be spent back in Rodney.

The result has been that Rodney emerged as one of the real winners in the latest budget released by the council. Although this is a good start, Rodney still needs a lot more spent due to years of under-investment.

Over the next 10 years, Auckland Council and government have approved spending \$12 billion across Auckland on transport issues. Much of this is earmarked for the major Auckland CBD projects. However, Rodney did win over \$1.3 billion of it. That's a massive win for Rodney. An excellent start.

A significant win was wresting money as part of a \$20 million budget to finally look at where a bypass road to alleviate Kumeu's traffic congestion will be built. This money is approved and the work is already underway. The public will be able to see

the plans and comment on them in a few months. Furthermore, another \$104 million is to be spent on safety improvements between Brigham's Creek Road and Waimauku, which helps all out local townships.

What's missing, however, is investment for greater equality into our smaller townships, a rail service to help out with the traffic until the bypass road is built, and a drive for quality maintenance of our roads. I will keep fighting for this.

Of the \$1.3 billion package, only about 8% of it will be funded from the regional fuel tax. The rest is funded from rates, development contributions and government subsidies.

Overwhelmingly, Rodney's residents did not support the regional fuel tax. Rates, fees, government subsidies and development contributions already exist and should fund all of Rodney's desperately needed projects.

Across all of Auckland rates will increase on average by 2.5% this year, except for Rodney where they will go up 8.4% thanks to the imposed Rodney local tax, with fuel taxes on top. I vigorously argued and consistently voted against these increases. Our least resilient residents will bear the greatest burden of these costs.

JP'S GET TOGETHER WITH THEIR LOCAL MP

Justices of the Peace serving the Northwest area and their partners met with Local Member of Parliament, Chris Penk at a successful social evening held at the Riverhead Bowling Club on Saturday 14 July. Recognising the voluntary nature and valued services of its local JP's, local businesses generously contributed towards the evening.

MP Chris Penk warmly acknowledged the important contribution of the local Justices of the Peace. He spoke of his formal role in interviewing prospective JP's, assessing their suitability and how many are needed in areas of the Northwest, before making recommendations to the Ministry of Justice. There was also a lively discussion about local issues, particularly infrastructure and transportation.



Increasingly with the advent of JP Service desks at Citizens Advice Bureau, libraries, and shopping malls, people get assistance from a JP there without the need for prior contact and appointment. Its JP's are at the Kumeu library on Saturday mornings 10am to 12 noon., They also assist with the JP service in the concourse at the Northwest Mall (Thursday evening 6pm-8pm and Saturday morning 10am to 12 noon) and Massey Library CAB (weekdays 1pm-3pm). A JP service is also available in Helensville CAB on Tuesday 10am-12noon, Wednesday 12.30pm-3pm and at the Plunket rooms on Saturday 10am-12 noon.













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
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
