The cost of living is rising.

Food prices were up there this year in spite of the COVID-19 pandemic's continuation.

I wonder how much of that is also due to this area once being a fruit (and vegie) bowl with a plethora of roadside stalls and shops selling produce in season, but now most of the productive land is in (or earmarked) for housing?

Supply and transport issues – especially bringing stuff in from overseas – has also been a factor during a pandemic which has stuck around.

It usually costs the two of us about \$250-\$300 weekly for food - which is about the New Zealand average. That can vary between \$220 to \$450 weekly depending on how well you eat.

I like plenty of fruit and vegetables, which can be more expensive in winter. I try to grow some of my own but find when it's abundant at home it's also cheap in the supermarkets and elsewhere.

If eating out expect to pay around \$20 a meal at an inexpensive restaurant or about \$100 for two people for a three-course meal at a midrange restaurant.

What I like about this area is that there are plenty of good eating places.

The food price index has varied this year, from 1.3% in January down to zero in March then rising to 1.1% in April and down again to 0.4% in May.

Statistics New Zealand says vegie costs rose 3.4% in May (particularly tomatoes, capsicum and lettuce which tend to be seasonal), with annual food prices increasing 1.8% since May 2020, annual food prices increasing for the past three years.

That's close to the 1.5% inflation rate, but you can expect that to increase too as the Reserve Bank of New Zealand is forecast to raise the official cash rate in August (previously expected this November) from a low 0.25% to nearer 1.5% by early 2024.

Borrowers are warned to prepare for mortgage increases as a result.

The Consumers Price Index has rocketed up, increasing by 1.3% in the quarter ended June 30 and pushing the annual inflation rate up 3.3% this year.

It generally puts the monthly cost for a family of four (excluding rent) at about \$4784 and a single person (excluding rent) at about \$1330.

It's likely your pay hasn't gone up for a while so some belt-tightening may be coming soon. Geoff Dobson, editor

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Highway just the ticket

Former Police Serious Crash Unit head Stu Kearns is critical of the Coatesville-Riverhead Highway's speed limit reduction to 60kmh/h and says the road has become "one of the biggest revenue collecting areas for the Government".

"If I was still in the police I would be ashamed to write a ticket on this road for speeds under 80km/h on a road that was traditionally a 100km/h stretch," Stu says.

"Riverhead has never in my 11 years of living here seen so many police staff on this road writing tickets as it is just like shooting ducks in a barrel."

Stu says road safety has been "and still is a passion of mine".

But he is critical of the speed reduction when he says the highway hasn't seen any marked increase in crashes to justify the change.

"This reduced speed limit has caused greater frustration and penalised good people traversing a road built for 80km/h to one of the biggest revenue collecting areas for the Government."

Stu backs up his claims by pointing to fixed speed camera figures on the highway, which he says were collected off the police website and statistics.

He says 3811 speeding tickets were issued from January to December 2018, providing \$340,390. The next year that climbed to 6218 tickets producing \$547,240, then last year soared to 37481 tickets Issued, bringing in \$3,828,820.

"It should be noted that on July 1, 2020, the speed limit went from 80km/h to 60km/h.

"The speed camera was not in operation for April, May and June 2020 and come July 2020 the first month of operation saw 8455 tickets issued (greater than the whole year of 2019 by 2237) and July's revenue alone was \$882,010 - almost the combined yearly totals of 2018 and 2019," Stu explains.

"This is pure revenue collecting with no consideration pertaining to road safety at all."

Stu says he's "highly critical of dumb roading decisions based on pencil pushers who have no idea".

He believes the agencies involved should "be taken to task over these revenue collecting numbers".

"Instead of allowing ridiculous speed limits to be imposed, start spending the increased fuel tax on making the roads better."

The former sergeant stepped down from the Police Serious Crash Unit in late 2010 after about 28 years of dealing with traffic.

Stuff reported in February this year that 36,000 speeding fines were issued on the highway in the six months since the 60km/h limit was imposed on parts of the route, saying it was among hundreds of roads on which Auckland Transport reduced speed limits to cut the number of deaths and serious injuries caused by crashes.

It says the offences brought in \$3.7 million, the money going into the Government Consolidated Fund and that about 8000 vehicles travelled the Coatesville-Riverhead Highway daily.

Most drivers booked by police were doing between 16km/h and 20km/h over the limit, while many recorded by speed cameras were exceeding the limit by 11-15km/h.

A police spokesperson says it's disappointing to see that the speed limit on the Coatesville-Riverhead Highway is being routinely



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ignored.

"The speed was reduced based on evidence and the need to reduce the risk of serious injury or death and so we really hope to see all road users follow the rules and slow down.

"Even a handful of speeders is a substantial amount when you consider the carnage that even one speeder can cause on our roads.

"So from that perspective, this amount is worrying as many people are placed at risk because of this behaviour."

Charity women's clothing swap and sale

An annual charity women's clothing swap at the Kumeu Showgrounds on Saturday August 7 is raising funds and awareness for Parent Aid North West, a not-for-profit organisation providing free home help to parents with a new baby or pre-schooler.



Bex Holland of Huapai runs the clothing swap with her mum Kate Hattaway and says to swap you sort out your wardrobe and drop off your clothes/shoes/handbags/accessories, along with a \$20 donation (100% of which goes to Parent Aid North West).

"Then come along on the event day, pick up your wristband at the registration table and you can take away with you the same amount of items which you donated."

Swappers are welcome anytime between 10am and 4pm.

"If you want to take home more than your quota it is just \$5 an item, and you can pay via cash or eftpos at our exit desk," Bex says.

Those who haven't donated goods but who want to buy can attend from 1pm on August 7 and pay \$5 an item.

"From 3pm-4pm we clear the racks, and each item is \$1. This is so we can really help out those that need warm, quality clothing, but that may not be able to afford it currently," Bex explains.

"Grab a wristband from the registration table when you arrive, and then you can head in and shop to your heart's content.

"We always have gorgeous bags, coats, shoes, dresses, tops, jeans many of them including big brands."

Bex says the event relies heavily on sponsors, with inquiries or offers of help on the day welcome.



"And if anyone has clothing racks, shoe racks, coat hangers (especially the clip ones for pants and skirts), or jewellery stands that they would like to donate, we are always very grateful."

More than 6000 items have been donated this year, making it their biggest swap by far.

Left-over clothes will be donated to Koha Apparel, a 'pay as you can' clothing charity.

The first swap in 2016 comprised mainly family and friends.

"We decided to have it at home, but quickly realised we would have to expand for the next year to fit all the clothes into one room," Bex says.

"We raised \$1200 which went to Women's Refuge, and the leftover clothes we divided between Dress for Success and Women's Refuge.

"In our bigger and better venue in 2017 we raised \$1600 which went to Dress for Success, again with left over clothes going to Dress for Success and Women's Refuge.

"Fast forward to 2018, and the clothes donations we had were more than double the previous year. "So it was a quick scramble to acquire some more racks and coat hangers before the big day," Bex adds.

"We raised a whopping \$4135 for the Sophie Elliot Foundation - more than double the two previous years combined."

Left-over clothes that year were donated to Dress for Success and the Massey Community Church.

The biggest year for the clothing swap was 2019 - with more than 300 attendees, sponsors, food, clothes galore, and raising \$15,000 for the Mental Health Foundation.

"Our 2020 event was postponed twice due to COVID-19, but we were finally able to go ahead on our third date and we raised a fabulous \$10,000 for Parent Aid North West, while all our clothes left from 2020 were donated to a variety of charity op shops," Bex explains.

She says their kaupapa is to support the local community.

"Clothing is expensive, and we want to make quality clothing accessible to everyone and raise money and awareness for an amazing local charity."

Only quality clothes are accepted as donations and buying secondhand is sustainable and keeps textile waste out of landfills, she adds.

This year the clothing swap has moved to an even bigger venue -The Big Sheds at the Kumeu Showgrounds.

Coffee from Harcourts Coffee and Cone, crepes from Sweet As Crepes, and live music from Lauren Collins are provided, while the day includes two big raffles comprising products and vouchers from

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many Kumeu and Huapai businesses.

Brieana Thompson from Second Life Studio is helping with visitors' styling needs, and a team of volunteers in purple shirts will assist on the day.

Lions support community projects

Vintage shop profits have enabled Huapai-Kumeu Lions to recently make donations to the Kumeu Volunteer Fire Brigade for an auxiliary trailer and to a Riverhead School project.

Eric Cole is helping organise a Kumeu Brass and Kumeu Vintage Brass concert in support of Kindred Family Services (formerly Helensville Women and Family Centre and Kia Timata Ano Women's Refuge).



Both worked alongside each other in the field of social change in Auckland's NorthWest for a number of years. On July 1, 2020, the two became one and Kindred Family Services was created. The concert is on Sunday August 29 at 2pm in the Kumeu Community Centre. Adults \$5 and children free. People are encouraged to invite as many as they can in support of these vital services.

The Starship Foundation is raising funds for an expansion of the Starship Children's Hospital Paediatric Intensive Care Unit rooms.

Waimauku Scout Den

Fundraising is underway in earnest for a community project in Waimauku - establishing the Waimauku Scout Den on Blomfield Reserve just south of Glasgow Park.



While nearly \$80,000 has so far been raised, about \$150,000 is still needed to complete the project which will not just serve Scouts but the wider community too.

Regular fundraising is planned and underway by Lions and the Scout Group (see in this issue).

Kumeu Huapai Lions are being assisted by the Scout Group with a Book fair, with a share of proceeds going to the Scout den project.

Waimauku Lions have financially assisted with the re-roofing of the



den and have made a commitment to further assistance if required.

Vehicle access, carparking, septic system, water tanks and landscaping are some of the many items to be finished.

Once based at Riverpark Reserve off Bittern Place in Henderson, the den was the home of the Swanson-Lincoln Scout Group. It was constructed mainly by family members of the Scout Group and carries a much-loved history of fun and adventure for many youth and adult Scout Group members. There are youth from this group who have become long-term scouting leaders in the community.

Unfortunately, the Scout den was badly damaged by fire, for a third time. As a result, the 190 square metre building no longer qualified for insurance at that park. This meant the Swanson-Lincoln Scout Group could no longer occupy the building, and they merged with other local Scout groups. The den was then earmarked for removal from the park.

An opportunity arose for the Motutara-Waimauku Scout Group to secure the den after wanting a home for a long time. The local Scout Group also saw this as preserving the Scout den's legacy and beginning a new one.

Once the consents and a park lease were obtained, Craig Walker Building Removals assisted with the den's relocation to Waimauku. The group had to wait for dry conditions and COVID-19 restrictions to ease to move it to the four-hectare site.

Helping with rebuilding of the den at Waimauku, Motutara-Waimauku Scout Group Venturers leader Bryan Spinetto (pictured) says that with Waimauku's growth a bigger home for the increasing number of Scouts is needed.

Reroofing and relining of the den has been largely completed, with broken windows replaced, extra insulation added, fire damaged areas redone and strengthening completed for the higher wind zone area on the hill and more.

The kitchen, toilets, a garage and some storage still have to be added.

Bryan says much of the work has been done at cost or with voluntary assistance, many organisations contributing (refer to Tanya Franklin's article).

He hopes to see the project completed and operational by February next year.

Scout Group leader Brian Belton and wife Vanessa, who is assistant group leader, are heavily involved in the project and say the facilities, including the rest of the property, will have wider community use.

A reserve management plan is being developed for the "Blomfield block" with the Scout Group paying a peppercorn lease to the Auckland Council for the site.

Brian and Vanessa say other community organisations will be able



to use the facilities, particularly not-for-profit groups, fundraising events, workshops and more, but under the terms and conditions of use private parties such as 21sts won't be permitted.

Camping rights are included in the lease arrangement but restricted to about 12 weekends annually and for up to two nights at a time.

A bush block and the site's nature allow Scouts to do outdoor activities, including compass work, learning camping and other skills which are often restricted on more city-centred Scout sites.

It's also well off the main Muriwai Road so is considered safer and won't conflict with nearby Glasgow Park uses. www.givealittle. co.nz/cause/waimauku-scout-group-our-journey. Kumeu Community Action to submit on rule changes

By Graeme Hammonds. Last time, Kumeu Community Action wrote an article about the inability of local communities to have much influence over the decisions which greatly affect the place we live in.

The article pointed out the fact that individual communities' needs and preferences can be overruled by a decision of the central group of councillors.

This time we're focusing on two aspects of the Labour Government's intention to replace the Resource Management Act (RMA) and to review the Local Government Act.

Firstly, the RMA is to be replaced by three interlinking pieces of legislation.

The tentative pieces of legislation are: 1. The Natural Built Environment Act. 2. The Strategic Planning Act. 3. Climate Adoption Act.

We won't deal too much on these issues here except to say our group will keep a close eye on the process as it develops and make submissions when we are able. This will be later this year to a select committee.

Perhaps more importantly for all of us is the present review of the way Local Government Act is to work for 30 years into the future. This review has been instigated by Local Government Minister Nanaia Mahuta.

From a press release.

"Local Government Minister Nanaia Mahuta says an independent review of local government will explore how councils can maintain



and improve the wellbeing of New Zealanders in the communities they serve long into the future.

It will focus on how our system of local democracy needs to evolve over the next 30 years.

"Local government plays an important role in our democratic system, giving people a voice in the leadership of their communities and in the governance of services and publicly owned assets.

"Local councils are essential to maintaining and improving our wellbeing and we need to get the right settings for them to continue delivering their important mahi.

"They are now facing a wave of reforms that will significantly affect their traditional roles and functions. They have told us the timing is right to determine what our system of local democracy should look like to make sure it is fit for the future, and I agree."

"This also offers an important opportunity to explore how we can embody the Treaty partnership through the role and representation of iwi/Maori in local government.

"I have asked the review panel to consider what local government does, how it does it, and how it pays for it. From there, they will explore what local government's future looks like, including:

- · Roles, functions and partnerships
- · Representation and governance
- · Funding and financing.

"I am expecting them to report back to me on their findings in April 2023," Nanaia Mahuta says.

You can see by the tone of this press release that the Minister is asking for the review panel to get input from communities like ours. We will submit to this panel when appropriate and we will ask you to support these submissions.

The main focus for communities like ours must be to establish clear and transparent inputs into the decision process the local councils and boards use to make decisions on our behalf, as well as reintroducing a clause in the Purpose Statement of Local Government Act that enables specific decisions to be made by communities as well as having decisions made on our behalf.

We want you to be aware of the changes that are happening, and

PM launches SH16 bus improvements

Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern was expected to turn the first sod on July 27 to mark construction starting on the State Highway 16 Northwestern Bus Improvements to boost bus transport and reduce travel times over the next five years.

The joint project between Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency (NZTA) and Auckland Transport (AT) involves first stage changes to road and footpath layouts at the Lincoln Road and Te Atatu highway interchanges, including new bus stops, footpaths and pedestrian crossings.

Bus shoulders on the Northwestern Motorway (SH16) between Westgate and Newton Road will also be extended to make it more reliable to travel by bus along the motorway.

Construction work for this part of the project is due to start this month and be completed late 2022, the works designed to provide "a more reliable, resilient and better-connected bus service for the growing numbers of people who live and work in the Northwest".

The longer-term project includes a new bus station at Westgate to provide better connections and improved travel times further west. However, the detailed design and resource consenting process for this part of the project is expected to begin at the end of the year with construction scheduled to start in 2023.

The bus project is being funded in part by the Government through the COVID Response and Recovery Fund supplying \$50 million of the \$100 million projects to support this work.

Property market report

National house prices rose less than 1 per cent from May to June and sales volumes dropped 5 per cent. Real Estate Institute data showed May's median prices of \$817,500 rose marginally to \$820,000 in June, up just 0.3 per cent. Sales numbers fell from 7720 sales nationally in May to 7345 sales last month.

Auckland's median rose only 0.2 per cent, from \$1.14m to \$1.15m and sales volumes also fell 2.4 per cent from 2834 to 2766.

Rising house prices through the country are certainly one of the main drivers for the Reserve Bank's decision to increase the OCR.

Michael Gordon, Westpac's acting chief economist, said the current data "showed that the New Zealand housing market remains strong, but is cooling off relative to its white-hot pace at the start of this year. Sales were broadly flat, while prices rose at a slower pace than in previous months.

"We estimate that June sales are down about 1 per cent in seasonally adjusted terms. Sales are still running above pre-Covid levels, and indeed they were still higher than in June last year, which marked the start of the post-lockdown rebound in activity," Gordon said.

The return of loan-to-value restrictions and the recent tax changes have contributed to some cooling-off of demand for investment properties, although the evidence to date suggests that homebuyers have been quite willing to step into the gap created, he said.

"That could change once mortgage rates, in particular the one and two year fixed rates, start to rise from their lows, as the prospect of OCR increases loom, Gordon said.

"For some time, the Reserve Bank has been holding off on bringing out interest rate hikes to tackle the housing price increases, because the rest of the economy wasn't ready for higher interest rates. Now it is," Jones said.

"We'd expect mortgage rates to start rising in advance of this, flipping what has been a tail wind for house prices into a slight headwind. We'll get an update on the Reserve Bank's thinking," Jones noted.

Jen Baird, REINZ chief executive, said median prices increased by 28.7 per cent from \$637,000 in June 2020 to \$820,000 last month.

"Additionally, five out of 16 regions reached new record median prices, one region saw an equal record and 20 districts reached new record median highs," Baird said.

The median house price for Auckland rose 25% year on year to June 2021 to reach \$1,150,000.

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Selling a property when you're splitting up

When everything is a muddle and your feeling broken, please remember you're not alone and you are not the first person to feel what you're feeling. Copy all your shared documents, contracts, certificates, agreements, bank statements so that both parties have information. If you set the ground rules early it makes the more challenging aspects, like selling the family home a little easier. Certainly the more you can agree on the better the outcome and the less you will spend with your solicitor. Sometimes things can get confused and mixed up very quickly. If you can't settle disputes, try and work through an independent person that can arbitrate. Failure to arbitrate a solution will come at both a time and a financial cost to both parties as the dispute generally finds its way into the Family Court who can make a decision on the balance of fairness for both parties based on the facts. 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Healthy homes standards

On 1 July 2019 the healthy home standards became law. This introduced certain standards for heating, insulation, ventilation, draught stoppage, moisture ingress and drainage in rental properties. These standards are aimed at ensuring that rental properties are healthier and safer and have lower maintenance costs in general.

All private rentals must comply within 90 days of any new tenancy entered into after 1 July 2021 or any existing tenancy renewed after 1 July 2021. All rental homes must comply with the healthy home standards by 1 July 2024. All boarding houses must comply by 1 July 2021 and all houses rented by Kainga Ora (formerly Housing New Zealand) and registered Community Housing Providers must comply by 1 July 2023.

Plan b for home buyers: buying off plan

With house prices still skyrocketing, it seems that there is an upward trend for first home buyers to buy new builds off the plan. At the moment there are various developers selling apartments, terraced housing complexes and new subdivisions off plan.

The obvious benefit that makes off plan buying more attractive, is that these properties are sold through negotiation with the developer and not at auction. You have time to withdraw your KiwiSaver funds and may even qualify for a HomeStart Grant

of up to \$10,000 each on a new build property. Some developers offer good value for money and sometimes even throw in a furniture package and yes, everything will be modern and brand new once your home is built!

Potential drawbacks are the long wait and the market uncertainty. Will the property still have the value of the purchase price when it is finished? Sometimes what is marketed on websites and brochures

You also usually need to pay a 10% deposit now and fully commit to the purchase with an estimated completion of 1-3 years. If something changes in your personal circumstances between signing the contract and completion, you could end in in hot water and not getting a mortgage or even worse, you can end up losing your deposit!

We help our clients through this daunting process by doing a thorough review of the off-plan agreement to highlight the risk and to help navigate an overwhelming agreement which could easily be up to 80 pages.

Some ways to protect yourself in this process is to ensure the deposit is held by as stakeholder until both the Record of Title and Code of Compliance Certificate have been issued. If for any reason either of these are not available then after an agreed period of time a sunset clause provides for the purchaser to be able to cancel the contract and have the deposit refunded to them - this is particularly necessary if a developer or builder goes under half way through a development. Sometimes we see a sunset clause being available to both the developer and the purchaser - in all cases you want to try and get the sunset clause to only to be for the benefit of you as the purchaser.

Central's Tips August 2021



Plant potatoes to crop in time for Christmas dinner, and get the seed sowing underway (indoors). Do some herb garden maintenance, and sow mesclun for summer salad. Snails are wintering over, so go on the attack!

In the Edible Garden

- **Prepare a potato patch** Plant sprouted seed potatoes by digging a trench and cover lightly with soil. Every few weeks 'hill' up the soil, covering the foliage to leave only the last set of leaves
- Sowing seeds indoors or under cover is a great way to feel like you're starting the summer vegetables, even if it's still cold outside. Start tomato, capsicum, eggplant and zucchini seeds now
- Herb garden maintenance: lift and trim the roots of mint, then replant. Mint increases its root size very quickly in proportion to its foliage growth and will be invading the rest of the garden! Other herbs such as thyme and rosemary can be trimmed and tidied to make way for new growth
- Rosemary is a versatile herb for structure in the vegetable potager. Upright varieties make great hedges and prostrate types spill elegantly over the side of raised beds. Their blue flowers brighten winter gardens and keep the bees around
- Mesclun and rocket can be sown directly now, in preparation for mixed leaf summer salads
- **Snails** will be wintering over in old cabbage, kale and silver beet leaves. Cull them or use bird friendly bait to restrict their populations or all your new seedlings will disappear overnight

Planning ahead

Manage the colour of your hydrangea flowers, more pruning to do and a great time to plant hedges. Shop for trees and shrubs this month as possible shortages of varieties may loom and go looking in the garden for signs of new growth



The rest of the Garden

- Get the flower colour you want: hydrangea flower shades reflect the type of soil they are growing in: to be certain of blue flowers, spread aluminium sulphate (often sold as Hydrangea blueing tonic) around the bushes. For pink flowers, use lime around them instead. But remember, white flowers stay that way and white hydrangeas prefer do best in light shade
- It's also pruning time for hydrangeas and hibiscus.
 Thin out the dead wood and cut back to budding leaf nodes, making clean cuts
- Late August is a great time to **plant hedges** and perennial borders for the summer garden. Mulch after planting and, when planting perennials, remember the snail advice given above
- Clear areas in the garden where bulbs and deciduous plants are beginning to emerge through the soil – this exposes them to light and sun and encourages growth
- It's peak 'tree season' at the garden centres and nurseries. This year don't delay in making your choices

 most budding of fruit and ornamentals is done two years before the plants hit the marketplace and 2022 could see shortages of popular varieties as a result of the 2020 lockdown



Tree planting

Deciduous fruit and ornamental trees are traditionally planted when they are dormant. This reduces transplant shock and allows them to come into leaf and flower as they adjust to their new situation. Using Garden Mix or Nutrasoil in the planting hole adds fertilisers and compost to condition the existing soil. If you're digging into clay soil, add a handful of gypsum in the bottom of the hole to soften the clay pan and allow roots to penetrate. Mulching and staking will improve tree establishment as the season warms up and spring winds arrive.

Growing fruit trees

Now is the time of the year to plant fruit trees and at Awa Nursery we have plenty to choose from. Planting now ensures they have the rest of winter and all of spring to establish before their first summer. You will want to choose a sheltered, open



sunny spot for your fruit trees, with good drainage. Once you have chosen your tree or trees, (remember some trees need a pollinator) prepare your site well. Dig a hole that is slightly deeper than the root depth of your plant and partly fill with a good garden mix.





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Place some slow release fertiliser tablets in the bottom as well. Most of our fruit trees are recently potted, having come to us bare rooted. The soil in the bags will be loose and the roots of your fruit tree must be kept moist. Try not to disturb any new roots developing. Before back filling the hole, position the tree stake so you do not damage any roots. Firmly compact the soil, making sure your tree is no deeper than it was in the pot. Water well. Water is very important when growing new trees, and regular watering in dry periods over spring and summer is a must. Mulch your trees, which will conserve moisture, protect the roots, add nutrients and prevent the growth of weeds. Make sure you do not have to mulch too close to the trunk. Kanika Park Cat Retreat

You can't chat with your cat, but there are many ways to know how your cat feels.

Cats love to feel in control of their environment. When they do, they will mark their home using facial markings and leave "happy messages" (or pheromones). This happens when your cat rubs its face against furniture or nuzzles up against your legs.



Things that may disturb your cat's need of stability and impact your cat's behaviour. For instance, every time you move furniture, bring in new furniture, do a major housecleaning, renovate your house etc... This can remove the "happy messages" left by your cat

Other things that may affect your cat's happiness are access to food, heat, water, litter, attention and competition in the household with other cats, as well as visitors to the household.

Perhaps the biggest change that your cat can go though is moving home. Entering a new home with none of the "happy messages" on the walls will create a big stress for your cat.

At Kanika Park Cat Retreat your pussy cat will have its own room, with plenty of places to relax eg: on a cushion, in a bed, on a shelf or blanket.

Responsible cat ownership

Responsible cat ownership has not really been a thing in New Zealand, and is not mandated by government as it is in many parts of Australia. However increasing numbers of people are starting to keep cats differently, for a variety of reasons.

Leonardo is a 2 ½ year old ragdoll cat who lives with his family in Hobsonville Point. For the first 16 months of Leonardo's life, he stayed inside, and now only goes out a few daytime hours each day. His owner, Maylene, explains that her previous cat was injured either



by a car or in a fight with another cat (they never found out which) and what followed was ongoing health problems and "astronomical" vet bills.



While staying inside, Leonardo is entertained by a few toys and games with his owners. He goes out while Maylene is at home, then asks to come back in. "He really seems to like his mostly inside life". He has never been hurt, and a side benefit, Maylene says, is that she doesn't "have to deal with gross dead things" on her doorstep. If they move to a house with a suitable back garden, Leonardo's family would consider getting a cat proof fence. There are several available in New Zealand now, including small electric wires and clever spinning devices such as the Oscillot system (www.catfence. nz/about-oscillot/).

Other benefits of keeping cats safe and indoors in the daytime include fewer illnesses such as Feline AIDS which is surprisingly common in New Zealand and spread through bite wounds, happy neighbours, a longer-lived cat, and better protection for some of our vulnerable native birds.

dried hibiscus flowers, 7g dried lemon balm, 1 cup apple cider vinegar (or enough to cover your herbs), ¼ to 1/3 cup honey

Method: Add the dried herbs and apple cider vinegar to a clean jar with a plastic lid. Shake well and leave to steep for approximately 2 weeks, shaking daily. Strain the liquid from the herbs ensuring you wring out any liquid. Add the honey to taste.

Emotional situations that trigger overeating

If you're an overeater, different situations trigger emotions that send you to the fridge (or dairy) even though you're not hungry. Or, cause you to overeat when you've had enough.

To reduce overeating learn to cope with feelings in healthier, non-food related ways, on your own or with the help of family, friends or professional. Here are ways I deal with these situations:

Boredom: read a book, jump on trampolines, do something creative

Anger: movement helps the most so I dance in the lounge, I yell in the car with

the music loud or I journal the anger out - I don't hold back, just let it rip onto the paper

Stress: meditation, deep breathing, listening to a hypnosis track

Fear: deep breathing and facing the fears - speaking up when I'm afraid or saying no when I fear I'll be rejected if I don't say yes

Lonely: reach for connection - walk with a mate, catch up coffee, phone call

Self-Esteem: affirm I am enough no matter what, focus on the good in me, praise myself

Happiness: many people connect happy events to food as we learnt to celebrate with food - try finding other rewards like booking an activity or adventure. Connect and do things that bring happiness without food like dancing, swimming or singing out loud to my



favourite music.

Is my gut really leaky?

First and foremost the answer is no because 'leaky gut' doesn't really exist. Our gut is not a pipe that 'leaks'. It is actually more complicated than that and that is why the term is generally not recognised by medical practitioners.



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that our intestines let in food molecules, bugs and chemicals into our bloodstream that shouldn't be there because the system is currently 'broken'.

Our gut is one big tube (like a tunnel) and food travels through the tunnel. Along the tunnel there are gates, these are controlled by our cells and a protein called Zonulin is the 'gatekeeper'.

Certain foods increase Zonulin and allow the gates to open such as black pepper, capsaicin (from chilli), hops (used in beer) gluten, saturated fat (esp, coconut oil), too much omega 6 fatty acids in relation to omega 3 fatty acids, sugar and alcohol plus deficiencies in zinc, vitamin A and Vitamin D. Certain medications, stress (to allow in more nutrients) and inflammation will also mean that these gates open. This is a natural, normal process and is dynamic - the gates



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open and close all the time. The problem comes when you have a poor diet, chronic inflammation, unresolved food intolerances, and gut infections that can mean the gates don't close properly and that can drive inflammation elsewhere in the body because of the substances that get into the bloodstream that ordinarily wouldn't be allowed there. This has been associated with diabetes, cardiovascular conditions, allergy, autoimmunity and mental health disorders.

A diet rich in vegetables, whole foods, legumes, nuts and seeds, fermented foods & fish (i.e. the Mediterranean diet) can make a massive difference and allow the gut to heal itself.

Sleep: Not worth stressing about

Sleep is not just a state of rest, but includes several states which help us to restore physiological function, store memories, clear metabolites, and even tweak our model of the world and increase our understanding of the world. Sleep also helps us keep our circadian rhythm which



influences our metabolism. Despite the obvious importance of sleep, I never tell people that sleep is critical to health.

Stress, anxiety or worrying about sleep increases the levels of your stress hormones cortisol and adrenaline. Cortisol has the job of



getting you up and going in the mornings. Adrenaline has the job of giving you a jolt of energy to get you away from that tiger in the wild. It's not rocket science that stress-induced increases in cortisol and adrenaline are no good for sleep.

Don't Watch The Clock:

If you check the time when you wake up, then this can raise your stress levels. Depending on your clock, you may also get a dose of blue light which reduces sleep too. The retinal ganglion cells in the eye are not involved in vision, but detect the levels of ambient light, especially blue light, to influence the sleep - wake cycle.

A Helping Hand:

If your sleep gets out of balance for too long, you may need something to help you get back into your rhythm. Sometimes a relaxing Epsom salts bath with a hint of lavender oil will be enough. A cup of chamomile tea can also be helpful. Setting up good practices from early evening until bedtime is essential. This is often termed "sleep hygiene". We have a sleep hygiene information sheet to assist you (free of charge).

If you are over 55 years of age, we can prescribe you melatonin (your natural sleep hormone). Challenge and risk integral to children's development

Higher-fit preadolescent children exhibit better behavioural and attentional processes compared to lower-fit children, according to a study published in Neuropsychology.

At Country Bears we believe that children that have had the opportunity of engaging in as many different experiences and activities, gain benefits for their whole body, their wellbeing as well as an ability to grow with confidence in themselves.

Every Thursday at Country Bears, "Bike Day" brings a lot of excitement and fun to the children and teachers. First, thanks to everyone who has been in touch with positive feedback on the "shovel ready" protest that we held last month. I was grateful to Kumeu Courier for its coverage of the event.

A few people told me that it was the first protest type of event they'd ever attended, as a measure of how upset they're feeling about the lack of action and investment here in the northwest.

I had a "déjà vu" feeling recently when I was told by another group of people that they're also not usually the protesting kind. These separate but similar conversations took place at the "Groundswell" protest events of last week.

I joined various farmers and their supporters in Helensville and we travelled together in convoy to Orewa. At that same site we were joined by others who had made the equivalent trip from Wellsford. Across the country similar movements were taking place.

Again, these are not in the category of person who relishes making

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placards, chanting slogans, tooting horns and generally making a fuss.

Most people are too busy most of the time living their lives to be highly engaged with politics, which is fair enough and in fact much more healthy than the alternative.

Farmers and friends turned out in numbers, however, to make clear their displeasure at a number of changes that affect their ability to provide for themselves and their fellow Kiwis. I should probably add "the world", as New Zealand primary producers feed many overseas. The fact that Kiwi farmers manage to produce in a more environmentally friendly way than their foreign counterparts shows clearly that we should support them for the sake of the planet, as well as patriotism.

Without getting into the detail of the particular policies, I think it's worth recalling that Wellington shouldn't bite the hand that literally feeds us all.

To be clear, I support our rural communities to keep producing the food and fibre that we need to sustain us, especially when so many are working hard to do that in an environmentally responsible way.

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Phelan's Local Board update

The past year has had its share of challenges and uncertainty with the grip COVID-19 has had on the world, and the different ways that has impacted us all.

Auckland Council was hit hard financially, and implemented an Emergency Budget to respond to its financial shortfall. Tough choices had to be made, and ultimately activities that should have progressed during the year had to be deferred.

No-one was immune from that reality, and in Rodney we simply couldn't achieve the level of activity we would have achieved in previous years. But when we reflect on the achievements of the year, I am still extremely heartened by what we've delivered as a local board, as well as the larger, multi-year projects we've started or progressed. Our local parks and community facilities, and protecting and enhancing our environment are at the heart of the work of the local board, and much progress has been achieved. A snapshot, but by no means the entire picture, of the achievements of the past year include:

• Delivering another successful year with the Rodney Healthy Harbours and Waterways Fund, which provides match-funding for landowners, community groups and iwi, with the aim of enhancing waterways through riparian planting and fencing. The fund was once again fully subscribed.

• We have delivered on the Rodney Transport Targeted Rate Program, and early next year Auckland Transport will take over the Wellsford to Warkworth, and Riverhead / Coatesville bus services, and we have increased the Helensville to Silverdale service to hourly to try and increase users. Construction starts soon on a number of footpaths from Wellsford to Riverhead. None of these things would have happened without us taking control of our issues and bringing forward investment by decades.

• A successful trial of the Forestry Ambassadors Programme - a new initiative which works with forestry block owners to provide materials and education on best practice to reduce sediment run-off into local waterways, and engages industry and stakeholders to help ensure sustainable harvests and reduce incidents of pollution. This programme received much positive feedback from stakeholders, and will continue into the coming year.

• Key renewal work was completed, including the renewal of the Kumeu Library which was in need of watertightness work.

• We continued our investment in town centres. In Helensville our focus has been on improving the streetscape, with improvements to street furniture and the planting of native trees along Commercial



Road. This work will continue in the new financial year from July

• A series of site assessments were completed in Green Road Park which have informed our programme of work for the coming year as we work towards the goal of opening the park to the public.

• We funded activation work in the Huapai Hub, develop community initiatives that bring people together, and create spaces that are vibrant and enjoyable for residents. This project will be finished in the coming year.

• We renewed the playground in Merlot Heights, Huapai, with work underway to renew and install many more playgrounds across the Rodney Local Board area, including Huapai and Riverhead.

• We also completed the renewal of the sports fields, toilets and changing rooms at Rautawhiri Park.

Local board funding has also supported significant environmental work to be carried out throughout the year, with a total of 40 community group-led projects, and eight school-led projects working with us to support environmental outcomes in local parks across Rodney.

We are grateful to our community volunteers who have continued to strive for progress during a challenging year. This includes community members who give their time to organise events and activities that bring people together. A number of our annual community events that the local board supports had to be rescheduled or re-invented to withstand the potential impacts of COVID-19. This included a number of the annual Christmas Parades that bring together the people of our towns and villages.

Our volunteers are a testament to our community, and demonstrate our ability to withstand challenges and achieve strong outcomes when we work together. These partnerships are greatly valued by the local board.

As we end the year, Auckland Council has confirmed its Recovery Budget for the coming year. It will continue to be challenging for some time, but we look forward to the year ahead, and to continue building on what we are achieving in Rodney.

I pledged at the beginning of the term to push for resolution of the Local Government Commission recommendations. The Local Board now has all its business meetings in Rodney and I anticipate this year we will be in a position to announce a base for the Local Board in Rodney along with dedicated meeting spaces, and vastly improved engagement with Auckland Transport.

It's worth reminding people about what we do and don't do. We don't decide the level of rates or have any control over things like transport budgets beyond our targeted rate, these are the responsibility of Councillors. Our primary role is to manage and develop local parks and community facilities and plan for the future at a very local level. Phelan Pirrie - Rodney Local Board Chair.
