But all this comes at a price, with housing going everywhere and perhaps at the cost of productive agricultural and horticultural land.

To me, the Kumeu District is beginning to resemble Lincoln Road in Henderson – once vineyards and orchards like Kumeu-Huapai.

There's talk of adding about 3000 more homes in Riverhead, and with open slather allowed on three-storey dwellings in many areas it seems just a matter of time before we're wall-to-wall housing. More in this issue.

The dry start to this year and the Tongan volcano eruption are omens I can do without.

By now I hope it has rained - or our water tanks will be empty – and the ground is cracking, gardens evaporating and the road seal melting while the fire risk climbs.

That's prompting me to think that if 2021 was the hottest year on record then this one is shaping up worse.

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Pest Free Kumeu-Huapai

Imagine an Aotearoa where native species are safe from extinction and thriving alongside us, says Jeremy Dean who is helping organise a March meeting and encouraging locals to join Pest Free Kumeu-Huapai.

Trap-building workshops are also planned.

"We're now five years into the Predator Free 2050 goal to rid New Zealand of the most damaging introduced predators that threaten our nation's natural taonga, our economy and primary sector," Jeremy says.

"But in spite of Kumeu's reputation as bucolic countryside, we have no local groups dedicated to pest eradication in this area.

"Pest Free Kumeu-Huapai plans to change that with a three-year plan to use community involvement to rid the area of rats, stoats and possums."

Models for pest free groups exist all over the country, including Muriwai, Coatesville, Hobsonville, and Whenuapai.

"Our challenge as a community is to assemble our own group and drive a little change ourselves," Jeremy explains.

"This can be simply having a trap in your own backyard, helping maintain a trapline in a public space like the Kumeu River, participating in a trap building event, or helping with as much or as little time as you can afford to build a Pest Free Kumeu-Huapai group."

Jeremy says the first task is to seek people who want to get involved.

"If you've ever discovered your woodshed is host to a colony of rats,

or a tree in your garden has been stripped by a possum, then you have all the motivation you need to lend a hand," he says. "We're all busy and one of the guiding principles of the group is to be respectful of people's time.

"If we can combine just a little of the talent and enthusiasm of our community we will be able to do this."

Jeremy says one of the distinguishing characteristics of Predator Free 2050 is that it calls across the community from large government agencies to individuals organising in community groups to come up with creative ideas on how to achieve the goal. The model most groups follow is simply to build traps, distribute them and record the results.

"There is usually a small donation to take a trap home, which pays for another trap to be built and helps generate engagement in operating the trap," Jeremy adds.

"To support this activity we need people to help with sponsorship, communications, trap building, art (the traps deserve a groovy logo), tools, community connections and general enthusiasm for the pest free cause."

Jeremy says that as the group is new it can create what it likes.

"Personally, I'd like to see equal focus on pest plants and it may be that we create two groups - one with a focus on rats, stoats and possums, and a second group on gorse, wattle, moth plant, woolly nightshade and all the other nasties that are invading the area."

Details of the March launch will be released soon.

Kumeu hot rod show a hit

Thousands visited the 28th Repco Kumeu Classic Car and Hot Rod Festival at the Kumeu Showgrounds on January 14-16

The turnout of people and cars in three days of fine weather has delighted organisers Ken and Desma Galvin of Kumeu.

"Everyone seems happy to be doing something," says Ken, referring to the show being among the few such events to run nationally because of the COVID-19 pandemic.



Vaccination passes had to be shown at the gates and visitors were asked to follow the usual pandemic rules, although most displays were outdoors.

Ken was minding Dr John Elliott's 1970s Holden Torana racing car when the Kumeu Courier caught up with him for a guided tour of indoor displays.

The People's Choice award, best Chevrolet and best display prizes went to the late Bob Armstrong's 1956 Chev truck, while Ian Taylor's 1932 Ford Hi-Boy sedan was best Ford and second in the People's Choice category.

The best hot rod was a 1932 chopped coupe with a 390 Cadillac engine from Steve's Speedshop (Stephen and Sarah-Lees), and the best "other" prize went to Bryan and Heather Cartelle's 1936 Auburn 851 boat-tail speedster.

Others to feature at the indoor displays included Brian and Elizabeth Ogle's 1932 Ford coupe "The Blue '32", a 1956 Ford Coe 750 extimber truck with a barn-find 1973 XA GT Ford Falcon with a racing history on the back of it undergoing restoration, a 1966 Dodge Charger with Hemi engine, Ryan Sheldon's 1958 Plymouth Fury nitro "funny car" dragster and a "junior funny car" with all the extras and costs met provided for a lucky 7 to 9-year-old to see if they're keen on racing - the car checked out by Caleb Russell, 6, from Wellington.

Kurt Stockman from the Taupo Lakers Hot Rod Club and wife Leayne have been visiting the show for 27 years to join the swap meet and say it's one of the best events they've been to.

Colin Pearce of Glendene regularly attends, usually providing something new he's built.

While family member Kaitlyn Stillman of Glendene tried out his

half-size 1932 Ford "So-Cal" with a 110cc quad bike motor, Colin explained his latest build - a 1959 Chev made into a trailer and carrying a barbecue and a chiller. Last year, Colin showed a bike he made based on the "Men in Black 3" film's gyrobike.

"Ken and Desma do a wonderful job with this show," he adds.

Colin says he camps at the show and enjoys talking to people and showing his hobby creations.

Simi Khiani at the Auckland Rescue Helicopter Trust stall says keen interest has been shown in the Trust's work and that many took the chance to enter a fundraising raffle lucky draw for a 2022 Shelby GT-H worth more than \$100,000.

West Aucklanders Travis Dunsmore, Toby Duff and Elijah Harrison welcomed the chance to show their motorised chilly bins sporting four-stroke 50cc engines.

Kumeu's Crown Xu had his military collection on display, while various car clubs also had some of their vehicles on show.

The event also includes food, entertainment, the Jack Daniel's National BBQ Championship, a Motor X Spectacular and promotes the upcoming The Very Vintage Day Out.

Tribute to Don Hutchison

A service was held on January 5 for Kumeu Rugby Football and Sports Clublife member and former long-time Taupaki resident Donald (Don) Hutchison who died aged 75 at a Helensville rest home.

Don was a life-long St John Ambulance officer - affectionately dubbed a "zambuck" - after joining at a young age and serving nearly 40 years, during which time he held brigade events for Taupaki youngsters.

He was also actively involved in the Kumeu Masonic Lodge for many years, the former lodge building on Kumeu's Main Road now gone.




Through his business providing security systems (Hutchison Dynamic Products, importing and supplying locks and hospital alert systems) and his St John work, Don came to know many of the police and firefighters in the Northwest.

He was friendly with the local firefighters and would also race to fires, often to talk with them or help where he could.

A musician for much of his life, Don played the saxophone and clarinet (along with the piano like his mother who was a piano teacher in Taupaki, and various instruments) with other musicians, including at the Kumeu Show.

Some of his musician friends played a few of his favourite tunes as his service before he was piped out of the Morrison Funeral Home

Don performed at many birthday parties (including in the Taupaki Hall) over the years with his musician mates.

Don's daughter Michelle says he would also have enjoyed a Masonic ritual with leaves performed by Chas Holst.

She remembers he liked using terms such as "piece of cake", "okie dokie", and "someone had gone and put his knife and fork away" - a saying for when someone had died as Don took the chance to chat at the many funerals he attended.

Don had a great sense of humour, loved yarning - particularly talking with others - and would rush to help people whether on the rugby field or at an accident, family and friends remember.

Friend Dave Chisholm recalls Don was a good runner who was Massey Amateur Athletics and Harriers Club president when his young daughters attended and who took up rugby as a winger, then moved to the North Harbour Rugby Union after its formation in 1985.

He encouraged children into sports teams and family say he was always revving up his grandchildren to play rugby - "or anything".

Don was in the Henderson High School first 15 and later joined the Golden Oldies at the Kumeu Rugby Club's predecessor Western United.

"Don and I ended up on committees and had various roles," Dave says.

"Both of us became life members of the Kumeu Rugby Club on the same day."

Long-time resident and still serving on many local organisations, Derry Faulder remembers Don as "an integral part of the Taupaki district, particularly in his younger years, a familiar figure in his black and white St John regalia, attending rugby games with Western United - later to become Kumeu Rugby, where he served as president more than one term".

Derry says Don inherited his mother's music teacher skills and was involved with dance band groups in the local district in the 1980s and 1990s

Don moved from Taupaki to Helensville, then South Head for five years and Dargaville for a further five before returning to Helensville.



He is survived by wife Jill, daughters Jennifer and Michelle, and grandchildren Aidan, Trent, Wyatt and Eva.

Don was cremated and his ashes are held at Muriwai until a decision is made where to spread them.

Family say he enjoyed so many places that it's hard to choose.

JP service reopens at the Kumeu Library

The Justice of the Peace service desk at the Kumeu Library on Saturday between 10am and noon has now resumed.

There is no charge nor appointment needed for this service.

While operating under COVID traffic signal levels Red or Orange, clients will need to present their COVID Passport before entering the library for this service. JPs will be accredited and double vaccinated.

A JP can witness signatures on documents and certify copies of documents as true copies of originals or images viewable on a computer or smartphone screen. They also take declarations for documents requiring a Statutory Declaration and administer oaths or affirmations on court related documents requiring an affidavit.

Some of the documents commonly presented requiring Statutory Declarations relate to immigration matters such as sponsorship, bank documents, change of name, KiwiSaver withdrawals, insurance claims, rates rebate applications, and more. Certification of photos as being a true likeness are common, as is certifying that people receiving overseas pensions are still alive. They can also perform citizenship ceremonies if especially requested.

There are some things people needing a JP need to note. If they want a printed copy of an original to be certified, they must bring that original with them, or be able to show it on their smartphone screen.

For Affidavits or Statutory Declarations, the person making the declaration must be present. You can't do this for someone else. Bring your photo ID, for example a driver's licence or passport with you so the JP can confirm you are the person making the declaration. Make sure the form is fully filled out and avoid signing the form before you come - doing this in front of the JP.

At present under COVID safety requirements, JPs in the Northwest can provide some services at their homes. You must telephone first and make an appointment. They will also probably require double vaccination.

Names and addresses of JPs can be found in the local phone directory and on the website www.jpfed.org.nz or jpauckland.org. nz - search "find a JP". These sites will also provide listings of JPs who provide online JP services which may assist clients who are not double vaccinated, however, they will require a computing facility

and scanner for this.

There is also a regular JP service available each weekday 1pm-3pm at the Massey CAB in the Massey Library (Te Manawa) and at the Northwest Mall on Thursday 6pm-8pm and Saturday 10am-noon.

Red light stops Northwest events

The red-light traffic system introduced by the Government to help combat the spread of the Omicron COVID variant has prompted the cancellation of many Northwest events planned during coming weeks.

The country moved to red just before midnight on Sunday January 23, leading to many



festival and event cancellations nationwide - with more expected.

The Kumeu Courier February issue was due to go to print just as cancellations were beginning to be announced, so this issue may include some happenings that have now changed - check with organisers where appropriate.





The Auckland Folk Festival due at the Kumeu Showgounds during Auckland Anniversary Weekend (January 29-31) had already been cancelled due to uncertainty around COVID restrictions.

"We are not confident that a safe, fun and enjoyable festival will be deliverable at this point in time," festival organisers said late last year in explaining the cancellation.

A big blow to this area is the cancellation of the 100th Kumeu Show on March 12 and 13. The 100th event celebration will now be held in March next year.

COVID uncertainty forced the popular Kumeu Show to run on one day only last year, and Kumeu Agricultural and Horticultural Society event manager Lizelle Westman says risks remain around the Omicron variant and restrictions applying this year.

She says the show cannot safely operate under the red traffic light alert and rather than wait to see when the red-light restrictions might be lifted it was decided to cancel this year's show.

With little income from events now cancelled at the showgrounds, Lizelle says they will probably have to lease land and buildings to businesses, including for storage purposes.

A fundraising luncheon with former Prime Minister and previous show patron Sir John Key planned last year was cancelled because of COVID restrictions.

The Very Vintage Day Out on Saturday February 12 at the Kumeu Showgrounds has also been delayed.

A new date is being considered for the 10th anniversary of the retrostyle celebration of all things past - especially the 1950s.

The red-light restrictions mean the February 12 event can't proceed but organiser Nicole Galvin of Kumeu says the day's Miss Pin-up New Zealand pageant may be held that weekend in a Northwest community hall as an invite-only occasion subject to confirmation and with a live stream of the pageant likely.

The Very Vintage Day Out was first introduced to the Kumeu Showgrounds in April last year when rain curtailed some of the planned outdoor events.

It included dress-ups, a Very Vintage Photo Safari, old time transport and more.

NorthWest Country Family Festivals due to be held from Kaukapakapa to Huapai during the next three months are also expected to be postponed.

Decisions had yet to be made at time to going to print, with the free events for families including music, children's entertainment, food

trucks and more.

All were scheduled outdoors with the first outside the Helensville Hall on February 20, the next outside the Kaukapakapa Hall on February 27, another outside the Muriwai Surf Club on March 6, one at the Huapai Hub behind the Kumeu Library on March 27 and the last at Parakai Springs on April 3.

Riverhead School's 150th anniversary commemorations initially scheduled for March 19 and 20 have been postponed until November 5. No further details were available at time of going to print.

Market events, fairs and many other functions may also be impacted.

Much will depend on whether Omicron spreads as feared and how long the red-light restrictions last.

Veterans Affairs

The NZ Government has extended the eligibility for the NZ Operational Service Medal (NZOSM) to include members of the armed forces who served in Malaysia and Singapore, but were not required to deploy into combat theatres such as Borneo or Vietnam. About 4500 veterans who served in South East Asia from February 1959 to January 1974 are now able to be awarded a medal and the Kaipara RSA hopes that veterans and their families take this opportunity to have their service recognised in this way.

You or someone you know, including next of kin of deceased veterans, will need to apply via the NZDF website, www.nzdf.mil.nz/medal-and-service-records/medal-applications/.

About 7000 veterans of South East Asia combat theatres are already eligible for the NZOSM, any unclaimed medals can still be issued.

The President of the Kaipara RSA Rex Keane says Veterans and all exservice personnel should be registered with Veterans Affairs, even if they don't need welfare support at present.

- Also remember to check the local council rules, there are often total fire bans on beach areas

The new year is well underway, although things are a little different at Kumeu Library under the Orange Level of the Covid-19 Protection Framework. We are providing services for everyone, but to come inside our libraries, a 'My Vaccine Pass' is required for anyone aged 12 years three months and over. Please have your 'My Vaccine Pass' ready to present to the team when you visit. The vaccination pass requirement will be in place at least until the end of June 2022. We



are particularly mindful of helping protect the health and safety of our most vulnerable communities, of customers who cannot be vaccinated due to medical exemptions, and those under 12 years of age.

If you do not have a vaccination pass or are not yet comfortable visiting a library, we are still committed to assisting you. If you want to borrow books, audiobooks, magazines or DVDs, you can either choose your own via our online catalogue or the Auckland Libraries app and we will bring your holds to the door already checked out for you to take away, or you can ask us to select books for you to suit your reading needs. You can ask the staff member at the door of Kumeu Library (there will be a short wait for this service) or fill in the form on our website (www.aucklandlibraries.govt.nz), and we'll select five items just for you from our shelves. We'll add the books to your library account and you'll receive an email notification to collect them - be sure to have your library card number ready to order your Ready-to-Go Reads pack. Also, our eCollections and online resources are all available 24/7, and you can still access our free WiFi outside the library. You can also get virtual book-a-librarian help from our Te Māpuna Library Connect team on 09 377 0209 or fill out the contact us form on our website.

There are still restrictions around in-person events at Kumeu Library, and at present we are only able to hold adult events due to size constraints for social distancing in the children's area. But we have started making small steps into the online provision of children's services - follow us on Facebook (www.facebook.com/kumeulibrary) to see what we are up to.





Property market report

Rising interest rates, high deposit requirements, Loan to Income Rules and a new Credit Act are pushing home ownership further out of reach for purchasers.

Hopeful first home buyers had little to cheer about in December's home loan affordability figures.

The Real Estate Institute of New Zealand national lower quartile selling price declined by almost \$11,000 at the end of last year, dropping from \$670,000 in November to \$659,000 in December.

However that brought almost no relief to prospective first home buyers because the benefit of slightly lower prices at the bottom of the market was almost entirely eaten up by higher mortgage interest rates.

The average of the two year fixed rates offered by the major banks increased from 4.08% in November to 4.21% in December, marking the seventh successive month of mortgage rate increases since they bottomed out at 2.52% in May last year.

There may be little relief in sight for first home buyers struggling to afford a home of their own, because although housing prices are expected to soften over the next year, mortgage rates are expected to rise, which means any benefit of lower prices may be eaten up by rising mortgage interest rates.

The situation for first home buyers at the end of last year was compounded by the fact that although the national lower quartile price declined in December compared November, it actually increased in eight of the 12 REINZ sales regions, setting record highs in seven regions (Northland, Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Wellington, Canterbury, Otago and Southland), while the lower quartile price in Auckland was unchanged from November's record high.

The situation of first home buyers was starting to look quite grim for first home buyers on average incomes in most parts of the country at the end of last year, as the unaffordability issues that have plagued Auckland for many years spread to many other parts of the country.

Unfortunately home ownership is increasingly becoming the preserve of the highly paid or those who have access to capital from other sources.

But for most young people on average wages, saving for a home of their own is increasingly looking like the impossible dream.

Disclosure about trust assets to beneficiaries

Trustees now have a clear obligation to tell beneficiaries about the assets and investments contained within a trust. A further issue is the extent to which many trust deeds provide for not just the children of the settlor but more remote categories such as charities and the de facto partners of the settlors' children. These provisions were intended to ensure that there was a broad range of people or organisations who could benefit from the trust. Usually, however, those beneficiaries beyond close family will be oblivious to their mention in a trust deed. Against this, most modern trust deeds try and make sure that the only beneficiaries are the settlors' children and grandchildren.

For this reason, it is often necessary to get legal advice about whether your trust deed is fit for purpose under the new act. That advice can include taking the necessary steps to confine the beneficiaries of the trust to children and grandchildren and removing the more remote beneficiaries before they become entitled to such information. How to own a title of the family home (between spouses)

When purchasing a property and registering the title in your individual names you will need to decide how you would like your individual names to be registered on the title.

Joint tenants is most common and this is where two or more individuals own the property. On the death of one party, the property passes to the survivor/s, irrespective of any provisions in a Will. Spouses may wish to have this option, particularly if they have

a large mortgage together.

However if either party has a child, or children, from a previous relationship then joint tenants might not be the preferred option as it would mean children of a prior relationship might not inherit their parent's share in the property.

The alternative is tenants in common and this means you own a specified share in the property, in equal or unequal shares. You can leave your share in the property to the beneficiaries named in your Will

It is not uncommon to have blended families and special consideration should be given to the situation that could arise when one party dies. You might wish for your children to inherit your share of the property you jointly own with your spouse, but at the same time you don't want your spouse to have to sell the property or to take out a new loan to buy your children's interest in the property. A right to occupy the property for an agreed period of time might be a suitable option, or alternatively life insurance.

Careful consideration should be given to how you own the title of your family home, or any property, and follow this through in your estate planning. This is best done when you purchase the property but it is also possible to change the way your names are registered on the title later.

Will your home loan really be declined?

Will your home loan really be declined because of your Netflix subscription or buying too many coffees?

There have been a lot of articles recently about lending applications being declined for seemingly silly reasons like a one-off shopping trip, your Netflix subscription, or buying too many coffees each week. Are banks and other lenders really declining loans for these reasons?

Under the new rules, lenders are looking much more closely at your expenses and are now treating more spending as regular expenses rather than one offs - affecting the way they assess your ability to service a loan. They may, therefore, assess your regular expenses as being higher now than they did before.

What happens when you don't have a Will?

When someone dies without a Will, that person is said to have died "intestate" and the distribution of their assets will be determined by the law.

If the person has \$15,000 or more held by any one financial institution, or own any real estate, their family will have to apply to the Court for "Letters of Administration".

To get the estate administered, it will take much longer and cost a lot more than applying for "Probate" (when there is a Will). Applying for "Letters of Administration" generally takes between four to six months and costs twice as much than applying for "Probate". Sometimes much longer which means long delays in accessing any funds from the estate.

Central's Tips February 2022



The vegetable garden is in full swing, harvest frequently to keep plants producing, water morning and evening evening and keep an eye out for insect damage. Harvest the summer berries and thin out developing autumn fruit to ensure a better quality crop.

Water regularly

It's been a hot, dry summer, make sure to water plants regularly in the morning and evening when it's cooler and conserve water by saving your grey water for watering.



The fruit and vegetable garden

- Thin out fruit developing in clusters on young citrus, apple, and pear trees. This ensures the final fruit are a good size and that healthy plant growth occurs as well
- Pick summer fruit: blueberries, raspberries, apricots and peaches regularly. If necessary, cover with bird netting
- **Get ready for autumn vegetables** directly sow beetroot, carrots and parsnip from now on
- Layer thick mulch around your fruit trees from citrus to apples, pears and plums, they need access to moisture in the soil for growing fruit. Same goes for feijoas, passionfruit and tamarillos
- Turn the compost heap and keep it moist
 - dry compost doesn't break down well
- Green looper caterpillars hatch quickly in the heat and start to decimate tomatoes, lettuces and any summer brassica plants. Control with an organic spray such as Bugtrol or Derris Dust to stop them ruining crops
- Place pea straw or plastic under pumpkins and melons, to avoid them rotting if they're sitting on damp ground

The ornamental garden

- Planning a late summer celebration? Modern roses should be cut back 8-10 weeks before the date. Deep watering, fertiliser and a layer of mulch is helpful to encourage growth and flowers
- Cut back the tired foliage of shrubs and perennials. Some, such as daisies and lavenders, will re-bloom in autumn. A liquid feed and they're on their way
- Seek out some different shrubs for the garden
- luculias for fragrant flowers, the native Hibiscus trionum for its unusual colour and abutilons (Chinese lantern bushes) with their bright flowers
- Rejuvenate tired pots and hanging baskets: remove annuals that are finished, tidy up and deadhead the rest and fill in the spaces with new plants. Liquid feed to get everything underway
- Mow lawns on a high setting to prevent stressing grass during the hotter months
- Now is a great time to take photos this will help you to recall what was good about your summer garden so that you can plan it all again in late winter!

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

Practising regenerative solutions in my garden

Gardening is a great way to relax and be with nature. It provides positive mental well-being and the growing over the seasons builds wisdom about our beautiful earth. As a climate activist, I promote the growing of veggies but also native planting where you can. We live in Waitakere Township on a rural section and this



article is dedicated to the 7 years of learning on our section.

Chook Management - Our family have had chooks for 14 years. While they drive me nuts when they escape and scratch through my veggie garden, they are also a beautiful part of my circular garden. They eat my weeds and their poo goes into my soil bacteria or compost heap.

Soil Bacteria - Fertiliser - The Weedy Garden on Youtube is one of my favourite gardeners to watch. David Trood is a prize-winning photographer who uses his videography talents to product the most beautifully crafted videos around permaculture. Episode 6 is devoted the making of Soil Bacteria. Not only is this fun to make

but cost effective and reducing the need for commercial fertilisers in your garden.

Weed Matting - Cardboard and mulch are best for weed suppression. It's simple, just put a couple of layers of cardboard down on the weedy area and heap the mulch in top. Leave for 6 months and you will have lush soil underneath.

Wildflowers & Lavender - Propagating lavender and rosemary is about the easiest thing in the world to do. Lavender loves company and doesn't do well when you plant on its own so plant in a large pot with lots of sprigs together.

Doing all the above inspires me to learn more and more about regenerative practices. I am not keen on talk without action and gardening allows me to put my beliefs into practice. It's healthy in terms of fitness and diet, and it is cost effective and hugely beneficial for our environment.

Warning on karaka berries and their seeds

Karaka trees (Corynocarpus laevigatus) are native to New Zealand and are prevalent in many parks and forest areas. The berry kernels, however, contain virulent poisons that are yet to be fully described in terms of their individual effects on dogs and humans.

Most warnings online will show only photos of the berries, brightly coloured and hard to miss. In reality, it is hardly ever these bright yellow/orange/green berries (labelled 1 and 2) that you will see on the ground, but the rotting or decaying outer husks (labelled 3 and



4). These can sometimes be partially covered in some remaining

orange flesh, but more often than not they look very dry and seemingly dead.

The powerful neurotoxins are in fact contained in the inner kernel/seed, shown here (label 5) inside the soft outer husk, and at label 6, removed from the husk. Even when the outer husks seem dry and old, the toxin will still remain strong. The outer husk is very thin and can easily be chewed through by a small dog.

If your dog ingests ANY part of a karaka berry, fleshy fruit, husk or seed, take them to a Veterinarian immediately and without delay. If taken soon enough, the dog can be made to vomit and hopefully the effects reduced.

Hopefully these images will help dog owners to identify the husks on the ground, as well as the fleshy fruit that most people associate with toxicity. Lauren Prior, lecturer at the School of Environmental and Animal Sciences at Unitec.

Dog safety

Covid was very messy for everyone and unfortunately, the charity 'Kids Safe with Dogs' could not afford to keep running. So as one of the founders of the charity we decided to purchase the IP and we are now looking at putting a package together for Early Childhood Education Centres.

We at the Dog Safe Workplace have been involved in educating our communities about dog safety since 2014.

Prior to COVID Kids Safe with Dogs instructors visited primary and intermediate schools to pass on this knowledge. Now, after talking to various parents and early childhood centres we realised that there is a large group of children that are missing out on learning how to stay safe when they interact with dogs.

Each year we see thousands of New Zealanders bitten and starting to teach children about dog safety from a very young age does make the difference. To solve this, we have made a few changes to the programme, and we will be offering a Centre Run package. This means that every early childhood education centre will be able to teach all the children in their care about "The Three Golden Rules" for interacting with dogs. Herbal Shortbread recipe

Based on the shortbread recipe from the 1986 version of The Edmonds Cookbook, the possibilities for shortbread flavour creations are endless by adding herbs (fresh or dried), spices, nuts, seeds, peppermint candy canes or other boiled lollies.



Recipe ingredients: 225g butter, 125g icing sugar, 125g cornflour, 220g flour.

Variations: 1) Elderflower: 7g of dried and ground elderflowers. 2) Rose & Blackcurrant: 3g of dried and ground roses (calyxes removed) and 5g of blackcurrant powder. 3) Hibiscus & Orange: 6g dried and ground hibiscus flowers (hibiscus sabdariffa) and 1 teaspoon of fresh orange zest. 4) Spearmint: 3g of dried and ground spearmint. These are really lovely plain, but also very tasty sandwiched together with spearmint icing using fresh or dried spearmint or spearmint essence. 5) Pistachio & Lime: 35g chopped pistachio nuts and 1 teaspoon of fresh lime zest (these are great iced with white chocolate and sprinkled with fresh lime zest). 6) Gin Flavours: 6g Juniper berries dried and ground, 1g Angelica root dried and ground, 1 teaspoon fresh lemon zest. Roll in caster sugar before baking.

METHOD: Cream the butter and icing sugar until light and creamy. Add the cornflour, flour and any fresh or dried herbs, spices etc. and mix until well combined. Use your hands to shape the dough into a round or square sausage. Cut into 1cm slices or thinner if

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desired. Roll or coat in any coatings if using, such as caster sugar, hundreds and thousands, crushed peppermint candy canes etc. or press patterns into them using a fork or other patterned tool.

Bake at 150C for approximately 25-30 minutes. Remove from oven and transfer to a wire rack to cool.

Shortbread can be iced or glazed or sandwiched together with flavoured butter cream icing or simply enjoyed plain. It makes a great accompaniment for desserts and can be used as the base for individual cheesecakes, served as an ice cream sandwich, or crumbled over a dish to add a crunchy component. The biscuits can be stored for a month or so at room temperature if not iced or frozen for up to six months.

Seasonal allergies linked to gut health







The role of a teacher

Country Bears philosophy emphasises play as crucial to all aspects of learning for children. It is the teacher's role to see through the eyes of a child. For example, when a child approaches a teacher with a worm or spider in their little hands, it might be the very first one that they have found all by themselves. You can just imagine how proud and excited this child could be, so it's important for us teachers to respond in such a way that honours their experience. Teachers can be great actors for the sake of the child, even though teachers may be



squeamish inside when a child walks up to us with a cockroach or spider, we can pretend that it's the most amazing thing we have seen!

Do you remember what it was like to play as a child when you were younger? It's like what it was for some of us, growing up in the 80's, when we could go out and play all day, and we had to come home when the street lights came on. There were no adults to supervise us or to help us negotiate conflict, we somehow managed to just resolve and get through it.

We need to place trust with the children, as when the children 'feel' that they are not being watched or listened to, the children just seem to explode with wonderful and amazing play and conversations that just melt the hearts of us teachers.

We understand that in an Early Childhood setting, supervision is very important for safety, but we can still give the children the perception that no adults are around, giving them the sense of freedom. Even by placing our back to children, or just sitting behind the fort or fence, they think we are unable to hear or see them, so their play can change. It is in these experiences that teachers can really appreciate the uniqueness of each child.



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A beautiful quote from a four-year-old boy when asked what play is, he replied: "Play is when adults stop telling me what to do". Again, it is up to the experience of a teacher to know when to watch with wonder as to how the play might unfold or to know when to intervene. It has been said that when a child is interrupted with their play, it takes about 20 minutes for them to regain that level of focus and concentration. Teachers here at Country Bears know each and every child, so this level of knowledge helps the teachers to know when a child or a group of children may need the assistance of a teacher. It is through experiences that challenge children, where the learning happens, as they negotiate their way around their peers needs, thoughts and opinions.

Happy New Year! I hope 2022 is off to great start for you, wherever you find yourself. It's certainly been a well-deserved break for many. For those of you who have continued to provide essential services through the holiday break, I personally thank you for your service - we just couldn't be without you.

As your local MP, I want to highlight the importance of thorough policy making that ensures government legislation does not lead to unintended consequences for those living in our area.

Unfortunately, the recent traffic-light legislation was dashed through parliament at lightning speed late last year. And so it's proving a prime example of law-making that has caused more confusion than clarity, in some areas at least, and created as many problems as solutions.

In another example, my electorate office and I have recently been contacted by numerous constituents about the Automobile Association requiring that anyone who sits their practical driver licence test must be double vaccinated against Covid-19. To be clear: negative Covid-19 tests are not being accepted.

The unintended consequence of this could well be that unvaccinated teenagers end up driving on our roads without the appropriate licence, which of course only creates more risk for other road users.

One alternative approach could be that if it's good enough for unvaccinated individuals to board a flight with a negative Covid-19 test, then it's good enough for our young people to sit their driver licence test that way, perhaps while wearing a mask. That's got to be better having unlicensed youngsters risking their own lives and others' on our roads.



As this example of unintended consequences from sketchy policy development shows, we simply cannot afford to rush our democratic law-making processes this year as we saw all too often in 2021.

I'm really looking forward to being back in Parliament soon to represent my favourite electorate, as your local MP, getting stuck into challenging the government on key issues. Until then, I will continue to be out and about in the electorate of course.

Tough year forecast by Kumeu Community Action

As 2022 gets going, there are still many uncertainties that face us in the Northwest and throughout New Zealand.



The fight against a seriously harmful mutating corona virus continues, fighting misinformation about the virus and its control will continue, interest rates are set to rise, inflation is taking off, loans are being

scrutinised to a much greater level, the cost and supply of materials and imports is increasing at a dramatic rate with fuel prices possibly topping \$3 at the pump this year.

These are worldwide issues, but they do affect us in the Northwest as these pressures will likely have consequences on the delivery time of large scale infrastructural work scheduled to go ahead and the work we would like to see added to the NZ Transport Agency/ Auckland Transport schedule.

Along with this, an extreme housing shortage is motivating central government, left and right, to likely bypass parts of Auckland's Unitary Plan to run rough-shod over the deep frustration of the local community.

Residents have been screaming out for many years about the infrastructure we should have had five to 10 years ago. At this point, Waka Kotahi NZTA will work on the Huapai to Waimauku safety upgrades to SH16 this year, with the Brigham Creek to Kumeu section of SH16 not starting for two or three years.

The SH16 bypass (Alternate Route) is always 10 years away and has no funding. The updated Structure Plan for Huapai-Kumeu will not start till 2025, so not much is guiding the future development in the township at present, although the flooding of most of the lower areas of Kumeu and Huapai in late August 2021 will no doubt affect the thinking of planners.

The August flooding showed several glaring deficiencies in our community's ability to cope with large scale weather events. As a result, a plan is being developed that will allow a faster and more targeted response.



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In February, Auckland Council community resilience staff will be working with Rodney Local Board members and locals to start developing this plan.

Healthy Waters (Auckland Council) has done a report on the August 2021 flooding event and said that they will be reporting the findings to our community early in 2022. We will advise locals of the timing of this meeting when it is confirmed.

They have also said that they will implement a more robust early flood warning system.

Phelan's Local Board update

We're about to enter Auckland Council's Annual Budget consultation process and this brings the often passionate debate about what the level of rates should be set at.

Because this is an election year you can expect the debate to be slightly sharper and that means the sort of short, snappy, headline grabbing, where complex issues are condensed down to one line of text and difficult decisions are presented as simple binary ones.

Remember Boris's Brexit Bus? It proclaimed that the UK was sending 350 million pounds to the EU each week and this could be used to fund their health system, the NHS. This was a great political stunt. Unfortunately, it wasn't entirely correct or what has happened post Brexit.

We have a similar annual debate about rates. Some say they could be zero percent, some say they need to be higher. Many politicians make firm political promises about what level of rates they will or won't support and these promises are often made without knowing the financial position the council will be in when the decisions need to be made. This is against a backdrop of no ratepayer being happy to have annual increases for a variety or perfectly legitimate reasons. And so we find ourselves in a challenging situation. By now everyone



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will know that council faces significant challenges with its budget due to Covid19. But in a way our current situation may be one that was going to happen anyway. For years council staff have quietly pointing out to politicians that there needs to be more money invested in repairs, maintenance and renewals of our existing assets from roads to community halls & libraries. We can only go on sweating assets for so long before we start seeing serious issues with some of our key infrastructure.

We also have been cutting spending to keep with the Covid19 driven constraints on our budgets and this is proposed to continue for the coming year. This means there are now less staff in key areas such as compliance, planning and consenting. The effects of this can now be seen and this is not a great outcome for our community. While council must constantly be looking to work more efficiently and giving value for money to ratepayers, increasingly elusive cost savings are a drop in the bucket to what's needed.

Add to this our rapidly growing population which is tipped to hit 2,000,000 residents in about eight years. We are not investing enough each year in new facilities, parks and transport infrastructure to meet the demand. Every time council has approved a Regional Land Transport Plan the list of unfunded projects has increased, it is now many billions of dollars.

Putting off spending in these areas of our core business comes at a cost. Not only are the assets we have slowly worsening, some need to be totally replaced and to meet the needs of more residents, likely expanded and improved. Construction costs have been steadily rising, and as they say, it's never cheaper to do this now, and that is very true for the sorts of capital investments we need to make in Auckland.

As seductive as the low or zero rates message may be, there will, inevitably, be a reckoning. Councillors and Local Boards have been warned for years about the risks and consequences of delaying the hard decisions around the required level rates and investment. We will all ultimately end up having to pay for this either with significant rates increases or through general taxes to government if they need to come in and bail out Council.

Development concerns continue

On December 22 Allan McLean, who is on the Riverhead Ratepayers, sent me plans and details of the Riverhead development.

He advised that the information is public knowledge, so some of the information is known to the community, especially the NZ Transport Agency details on the road upgrading from Brigham Creek to



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The zoning maps (included) are as per the Unitary Plan decisions. You will note that the zoning maps show the 'Future Urban' land is all west of the Riverhead-Coatesville Highway.

The landowners sheet shows the following developer orientated ownership pattern:

- 1. Matlin Group about 10ha it's planning a substantial 'Retirement/ AgeCare' facility south in the south/west of the block Planning is underway. Burnette O'Connor a Warkworth planner, has confirmed they are 'well advanced' with a concept for the 10ha block.
- 2. Neil Housing has 13ha approximately adjacent to the Matlin block. This is about 1400 house sites.
- 3. Fletcher Residential has about 20ha, shown in dark green. The areas are split but it is expected that adjacent blocks will be acquired by Fletchers (estimate 1600 dwelling sites) to make their development viable.

After discussions with Burnette and Allan, the following is known:

- (a) The three landowners are collectively working together to produce a 'structure plan' for the area to co-ordinate development.
- (b) The costs are being borne by the landowners so they will produce a plan that potentially has a development bias towards the developers.
- (c) O'Connor has confirmed that the Auckland Council forward planning staff are not involved and the council has no funds to support a 'structure plan'.
- (d) Contact with the local community has been done but some of the developers have done so without council staff being on board.
- (e) The 'Structure Plan' is well advanced with issues of traffic, sewerage disposal, roading layout density being looked at from the development point of view.
- (f) A Scheme Change is to be done for the whole Riverhead area after the 'Structure Plan' is complete.
- (g) There is a general indication that the 'Structure Plan' will take all of 2022 to complete.

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Please call 021 267 2856 Jennie OR send your CV and cover letter to info@ hus.nz Please note that applicants must have legal identity to work in New (h) It is likely that the Scheme Change will follow and be used under the Labour Government fast track legislation where there is no community involvement.

From my perspective, now that the above is public knowledge, I have the following concerns:

- 1. The council planning staff are not being involved representing the wider public interest in the planning of the 'Future Urban' area for Riverhead.
- 2. If about 3000 dwellings are anticipated in Riverhead then the resulting increase is traffic on the Riverhead Road will have an adverse impact on the SH16 and motorway end. That work is of wider interest to the Kumeu and Taupaki areas.
- 3. The increase in housing density for Riverhead should be decided by and in conjunction with the local community.
- 4. There is, given the Labour Government declared intention to legislate so that there can be an increase in density in the 'Urban Zone' without community involvement, the possibility that the Minister can, and I believe will, approve a 'Structure Plan' without the need for a formal notification.
- 5. The current Riverhead changes are following a similar pattern to the Huapai Triangle and Oraha Road Special Housing Areas (SHA) under the National Government (Nick Smith). The result of that process resulted in limited SHA community involvement with no substantial change to the density or layout.
- 6. The Auckland Council is not leading the changes in the community by outlining its vision for the Riverhead area, that is its legal responsibility.
- 7. Managing "change" and handling growth need all of the community's input and acceptance.

Sayers Says It

It's been a rough ride for TROUBLESOME TRENDS: AUCKLAND COUNCIL Auckland.

As we regroup as a city in 2022 it is time to act responsibly.

Yet the Auckland Council will continue to swell into a

bloated, cash sucking, employee-thickened, debt-laden beast.

Under the Goff administration the rates grab has accelerated at pace. Auckland Council is now harvesting over \$5.3 billion a year from Aucklanders. This is not demonstrating kindness post lockdown.



This intake increase has been achieved through a combination of general rate increases of over 16% per annum in the Kumeu/ Huapai region, significantly increased council fees, a fuel tax, and the introduction of an extensive number of targeted rates.

Auckland Council is sitting on \$16 billion of total liabilities, including the council's borrowings along with its interest rate hedging, which is an increase in debt of \$5 billion under Goff.

Furthermore, despite all the spending, Auckland still has gridlock, unaffordable housing, empty 'ghost buses', and most roads no better than they were pre-amalgamation.

There are now more than 12,000 staff at the Auckland Council. Since the Super City was created the payroll bill has more than doubled and is running just shy of \$1 billion a year. One in every four staff members earns more than \$100,000 per annum. Middle management overkill in my book.

A scythe needs to be taken to peel the council back to core business. It has taken on too many projects and agendas that are actually the domain of central Government - from climate change, business development, to promoting various social agendas.

Such a cost cutting exercise must simultaneously not harm the customer's interactions with the council but instead greatly enhance them by driving for customer service excellence - including the removal of red tape, greater public transparency over spending, further empowering local boards, and an unswerving commitment for delivering core council services.

My instructions are that the Auckland Council's CEO, who is earning

\$630,000 and has an army of staff, should prepare an alternative budget for Aucklanders - reflecting the council better delivering on core council services and axing of the nice-to-haves. However, the mayor and the majority of councillors oppose me on this.

Instead, Mayor Phil Goff is proposing a 6% overall average rates increase for this year. This has to be openly challenged as a broken promise. Last year he guaranteed Aucklanders rates would not increase by more than 3.5%, following last year's 'one-off 5% emergency' rates increase.

Part of the 6% rates increase is a proposed 2.5% climate change tax. This is on top of the council's existing budget of \$152 million which is for tackling climate change. Surely this money should be directed into flood prevention measures in places like Kumeu and Parakai, the building of seawalls, or proactive council planning to alleviate stormwater runoff from all the new housing.

So let's call this new climate tax what it really is - a disguised rates hike designed to fill Auckland Council's financial hole after Covid.

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
