Greetings

It's been a COVID-19 disrupted year.

The latest round of alerts and associated restrictions appear to have set some projects, works and businesses back even further.

Lost economic activity has cost \$440 million for every week Auckland has been in level 3 and the rest of the country in level 2, according to an ASB Bank report.

That impact is being felt here too with many businesses struggling, although projects like the multi-million-dollar Kumeu Central (see Kumeu Courier March 2020 and this issue) are managing to keep going.

And events such as a meet the general election candidates' session moderated by Te Radar at St Chads Church in Huapai has been delayed until at least September 1.

The election has been pushed out to October 17 – although early voting can start from October 3.

Decisions have to be made whether many other local events can continue – including those planned for September and October.

Further help for businesses has come with the wage subsidy scheme extended for eight weeks, applications closing September 1.

Many learned after the first COVID-19 related restrictions how to adapt and cope, but it's still a hard crawl back for some, which is where supporting local businesses becomes important.

The film industry got an earlier \$230 million boost, mainly because movie demand increased with confined people watching streaming services like Netflix. The funding was expected to help with productions like the Avatar sequels and Amazon's The Lord of the Rings.

That kept things going, to some degree, in the West Auckland film industry.

And to make matters worse, Auckland is expected to continue with drought conditions this summer – see the Kumeu Courier August editorial on this.

Winter rain hasn't been sufficient to help fill dams like those in the Hunua Ranges which provide about 60% of town supply.

And unless you have plenty of tanks, those relying on rainfall only could find themselves short and needing to top up later. If water tables drop it might pay to keep watch on bore supplies as well.

Mind you, after being cooped up under COVID for much of this year I'm looking forward to getting out in some sunshine and seeing people. Geoff Dobson, editor

Help for mum with terminal cancer

The Northwest community is rallying to help mother-of-two Jasmin (Jaz) McArdle who has terminal brain cancer.

The Secret Garden Preschool in Huapai which Jasmin's eldest daughter Kit attends has raised more than \$40,000 so far.

And a Givealittle page established by Jasmin's

Australian-based family has gained nearly \$70,000 towards providing Jasmin and children with home care in Riverhead and pay medical bills so husband Joe can continue to work and provide support as well.

COVID-19 restrictions have meant Jasmin's family have been unable to come to New Zealand to help.

Jasmin only learned she had terminal brain cancer after suffering headaches following the emergency birth of her second child Teddy earlier this year.

A scan in June revealed she needed surgery for glioblastoma stage 4, an aggressive form of brain cancer.

Following the surgery, Jasmin learned her condition is terminal.

When The Secret Garden Preschool heard this, owner/operator Jodi Walker and teacher Vanessa Peterson immediately arranged with volunteers to organise auctions and other fundraising.



At least 100 people and businesses donated items for the online auctions, the response heartening for all involved, especially as Auckland returned to COVID-19 level 3 restrictions with many businesses struggling in the uncertain times.

Jasmin has been receiving chemotherapy and radiation treatment, visiting hospital regularly.

Givealittle page creator Jamie Barker says the support will help Jasmine and her family buy more time and help in caring for the family.

"Jaz is a bubbly, vivacious, generous and caring human. She's the life of the party and the one who always makes the effort to keep in touch and see how everyone is going."

"Jaz has now had two major surgeries in two months, her body has had an absolute battering. She should be ecstatically enjoying motherhood with her beautiful baby, instead she is facing all of this in isolation."

Jamie says Jasmin is doing well in the circumstances, with her positivity shining through, and that reducing stress is one of the key strategies all of her medical and holistic experts have demanded.

Jasmin has been given about 12 to 15 months.

Kindred Family Services formed

Two key social agencies are joining forces in the belief that by weaving their resources together they can better support the local community.

The Kia Tīmata Anō Women's Refuge and the Helensville Women and Family Centre have merged and will be known as Kindred Family Services.



Executive director Ana Christmas is excited by the new name which she says not only speaks to the sharing of values and mission at the heart of the two organisations, but also to the importance of



relationships and building trust.

"Our focus is on providing safe and nurturing experiences for people to grow and heal and 'Kindred' is a word that we can really make our own as we help people weave a new story for their own futures and the future of our community."

The new name and brand will be rolled out later in September.

Helensville Women and Family Centre clinical manager Nelene De Beer stays in that role under the newly merged organisation.

"The women's centre has been a huge part of the wider Helensville area for over a quarter of a century," she says.

"So, it'll take some time for people to get used to our new name, but what won't be changing are the amazing people who are part of our team and their commitment to helping people overcome life's challenges and becoming thriving members of their community."

Both organisations work with people and families in the wider Northwest Rodney and South

Kaipara areas, including Riverhead, Kumeu, Muriwai, Waimauku, Helensville and up to Glorit.

As Kindred Family Services they'll continue to offer subsidised counselling, Family Support, programmes such as Seasons for Growth which helps children experiencing grief, and support groups for both men and women experiencing violence.

Also continuing will be Kia Tīmata Anō's secure safe house which last year provided sanctuary and refuge for 14 women and 18 children.

"Our refuge is vitally important and always will be, but what we hope with this merger is that by helping more people with counselling, advocacy and other wrap-around supports we'll help people avoid the sorts of stresses that can lead to family violence in the first place," explains Ana.

In a climate where so many charities have to work hard for funding, the merger will mean the organisations have greater financial stability and can grow sustainably to help even more people.

The two organisations have worked alongside each other in various ways over the years, most recently as two of the key players in the formation of the Kai Collective, a foodbank set up during the first COVID-19 lockdown.



"The Kai Collective is a great example of how, in a time of crisis, we can find a way to harness the spirit and resources of our community and it's been such a privilege to see the very real and positive changes the food parcels are making for people who are doing it pretty hard right now because of COVID," the two say.

Tribute to Ross Dallow

More than 800 people farewelled former West Auckland police chief Ross Dallow at his "second home" in The Trusts Arena, Henderson.



Ross, who died aged 82, was respected for his athletics involvement, race relations work and his role as a local government politician and policeman.

His motto was "in sport, out of court" and he helped put many on the right path, his service heard.

Son and television personality Simon Dallow says an "honest" book about his dad, called 'Larrikin, Lawman, Legacy' is due out soon.

A West Aucklander most of his life, Ross had a close association with the Northwest and hit his first hole-in-one at the Muriwai Golf Club that green long since claimed by the sea.

Born in 1937, Ross quickly found a niche in sport while at St Peter's College in Grafton.

He went on to become a sporting great in athletics, winning the New Zealand under-19 men's discus in 1956. Gold medal winning decathlete Roy Williams and former weightlifter and New Zealand Olympic selector Bruce Cameron outlined Ross's sporting achievements.

He coached athletics for more than 30 years and received the West

Auckland Legacy Award at the 2015 Sport Waitakere Excellence Awards for his role.

Athletics New Zealand paid tribute to his work in that field.

Bruce reckons Ross could have represented New Zealand at one or more Olympics but by then had embarked on a 36-year career with the police.

He was in Assistant Police Commissioner Gideon Tait's Task Force which worked to contain violence in central Auckland during the early to mid-1970s and was in the Red Squad during the Springbok tour protests but became appalled by some of the actions taken to quell protest, the service heard.

That helped influence his move into improving race relations in Auckland, particularly in communications with Maori and Pacific Island leaders.

Former Maori minister and assistant race relations conciliator Sir Pita Sharples who helped establish the Hoani Waititi Marae in Glen Eden and worked with Ross in race relations recalled several incidents in which they were involved.

Ross, who was honoured for his community and police work on many occasions, will leave the legacy of The Trusts Arena, which Simon says was Ross's "second home".

He led the Waitemata Amateur Athletic Club to develop its own indoor stadium, dubbed "the old red shed" before it was redeveloped into The Trusts Arena and the Douglas Track and Field facility.

His vision for a community facility resulted in many people passing through the stadium and becoming involved in sport.

Ross was also recognised for his police work in assisting with body recovery at Auckland University School of Medicine following the 1979 Erebus air crash disaster.

He later served on the Waitakere City Council, the Henderson-Massey Local Board and was a long-standing Waitakere Licensing Trust board member, chairing it for eight years.

Tributes have poured in both locally, nationally and internationally.

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Safer Communities

The Waitakere Volunteer Fire Brigade went back into operating in bubbles to be able to safely respond to incidents while Auckland was at Alert Level 3. This meant no training or social activities at the station, but we could respond in our bubbles to any calls for assistance.

The station has also been doing its part in saving water by switching over to the 50,000 litres of water supply we have stored for emergencies. These tanks are filled from the stations roof rain so at this time of the year we can fill the fire trucks up after each call out.

Chances are, you have got dozens of appliances scattered around your home. Each of these devices carries a fire safety risk.

Here are some tips for using appliances safely.

Appliance

• Turn off appliances at the wall when not in use. If practical, unplug them at the wall as well.

• Keep all electrical appliances away from

water.

• When buying second-hand appliances, ensure they have been tested by a licensed electrician or gas fitter, and have been certified as safe.

• Do not place fans, heaters, televisions, or other electrical equipment in areas without good airflow, as they may overheat.

• If you are worried about the condition of any appliances (like electric blankets, heaters, air conditioners or fans), have them checked by a qualified electrician.

Leads and cords

• Do not overload multi-boards. At most, plug in one appliance per wall or multiboard socket.

• Never plug an adaptor or multi-board into another adaptor or multi-board.

- Make sure leads and cords are in good condition and not frayed.
- Never put extension cords under carpets or mats and avoid using them while they are tightly coiled.
- Ensure furniture does not rest on top of



electrical leads.

 Remember that extension cords are not designed to be permanent replacements to your home's internal wiring.

Also, if you are having problems with your smoke alarms going off with steam from cooking or bathrooms then change them to Heat Alarms that are activated by heat from a fire.

A large part of Mark's promotions business is sourcing and providing apparel, but communities are finding the money just isn't there.

"I've been thinking a lot about how I can help not-for-profit organisations like schools and sports clubs.

"Often schools can't afford their sports apparel at the best of times, let alone during this rocky economic time. I've devised a system called SubHub, www.Subhub.nz, which finds corporate sponsorship to help with costs, often paying for entire team uniforms."

SubHub has kitted out Matua Ngaru School sports uniforms, with Waitakere Netball, Helensville Primary School, Huapai District School, Massey Rugby Club and many more pending.

"The kids absolutely love their new gear and even all the sponsorship names," Mark says.

"Off-the-rack uniforms often don't fit, as sometimes kids need bigger or smaller uniforms. We make sure to fit out everyone, so no one gets left out."

Mark says it's a very simple process. "I find the sponsors wanting to contribute to their community, I put them together with the teams who needs them. It's a win-win."

Mark has also developed another fundraising

option.

"Fundit (www.Fundit.nz) is a fundraising system I've devised. Put simply, if your club or organisation is in need of fundraising I provide a 'pop-up' shop facility online. It's super easy, you choose from a range of products we supply...from car wash kits to tee shirts and tea towels. (You use our art work or yours or the kids).

"All you have to do is choose the products and spread the word, we do the rest. I call it the no-sausage-sizzle system."

Another of Mark's ideas relates to Muriwai Beach. "We need Muriwai specific gifts and merchandise as local shops don't carry giftware or apparel anymore. So I've developed Muriwai.smashingit.nz, which is an online store.

"The range of products include apparel, hats, hoodie-towels, tea towels, sunglasses, fridge magnets, mugs, glasses, etc.

"With Father's Day (September 6), kids overseas, Christmas coming, etc, I think Muriwai merchandise will appeal to all Muriwaiians.

"I've put my products and designs in the shop but I'm keen to host other residents' products and ideas."

Violet Ellen Jones, née Rapson. Died 1898

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On Sunday 13th September, weather permitting, the NZ Remembrance Army will be cleaning and restoring the 29 veteran graves in the All Saints Kaukapakapa cemetery. 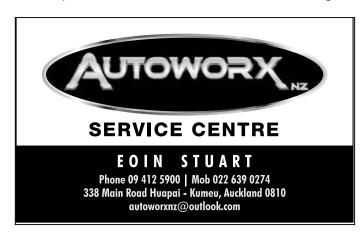

Abuse and technology red flags

It can be hard to know whether things in your relationship related to technology are normal or abusive. Sometimes as part of a pattern of abusive behaviour, someone may use technology to hurt, control and monitor their partner

If your partner/ person knows things about you that you haven't told them, if they have access to your phone or other device, if you find that email or text messages are marked as read when you haven't seen them, if your passwords are being reset when you haven't done this, or messages are disappearing when you haven't deleted them, it could be a sign that things are not right in the relationship. Getting your family trust fit for the new Trusts Act

The new Trusts Act comes into force at the end of January 2021. With it comes to the obligation on all trustees to provide some basic information to all potential beneficiaries of the trust. In some cases, this will mean parents are legally required to give information to their own children about the trust deed and the assets of the trust. However, in many cases trust deeds include more than just the children of the settlors as potential beneficiaries. It may include siblings of the settlors and de facto partners of the settlor's children all of whom could have remained blissfully unaware of their potential interest in trust assets up to that point. For this reason, it is often necessary to get legal advice about whether your trust deed is fit for purpose under the new act. That advice can include taking the necessary steps to confine the beneficiaries of the trust to children and grandchildren and removing the more remote beneficiaries before they become entitled to such information.

Property market report

Over the last 10 years Auckland house prices have increased by 6.3% annually.

The Auckland property market is so unique that when the Real Estate Institute of New Zealand (REINZ) publishes its market updates, it includes a figure for all of New Zealand - excluding the Auckland market.

The median house price in the Auckland region was \$848,000 (Sept 2019), \$208,000 (32.5%) more than the next most expensive region, which is Wellington. The reason that the Auckland property market out-performs the rest of the country is population growth. Auckland's population is expected to grow by over 30% in the next 20 years, whereas other towns and cities are static or in decline.

Auckland's residents are set to make up 40% of New Zealand's total population; it is the economic powerhouse of the country, and its economy is diversified. These are all factors that we associate with a property market that is geared for higher house prices. Auckland homeowners have done very well over time. Between Sept 2014 and Sept 2019, the median Auckland house price grew by \$228,000 (from \$620,000 to \$848,000). This is a 6.46% average annual increase. The interest earned on money invested with a recognised bank on a term deposit over two years is 1.6%

New Privacy Act comes into force in December 2020

The Privacy Bill becomes law on 1 December 2020 and replaces the current Privacy Act 1993 and updates the law whilst reflecting continually-evolving needs in a digital age. Personal information is held by many types of organisations (i.e. agencies such as, for example, businesses, doctors, banks, government departments) and technology has enabled large quantities of personal information to be stored, retrieved, used and disclosed. The new Act provides more protection of an individual's personal and sensitive information. The key changes relate to both agencies and



individuals and include: a) reporting data breaches - if an agency has a privacy breach posing a risk of serious harm to people,

the agency must notify the people affected and the Privacy Commissioner; b) compliance notices - the Privacy Commissioner can issue compliance notices to an agency requiring it to do or stop doing something to comply with privacy laws; c) decisions on access requests - if a complaint is made about being unable to access certain information, the Privacy Commissioner will make a decision on the complaint; d) strengthening overseas connections - at least one permitted category must be satisfied for an agency to disclose information to an overseas agency. In terms of cloud storage, this isn't considered a disclosure for the purposes of the privacy principles, but the disclosing agency is responsible for the cloud storage provider's compliance with the Act; e) new criminal offences - these include misleading an agency to obtain access to another person's information and the destruction of documents by an agency who has been asked to provide information by the person entitled to it. Fines has been raised to a maximum of \$10,000. Privacy laws are important and the recent Covid requirements where, for example, information was provided to a restaurant when dining out, have highlighted the importance of privacy laws. As individuals we entrust others with our private data and, as a result, the Act is now strengthened to increase compliance with privacy legislation. Trusts Act 2019

Continuing on our Trusts series, it is timely to just consider some of the common terms associated with trusts. As there are different types of trusts, we will refer in this editorial to the "Mum and Dad" discretionary family trust.

A trust is usually set up by a trust deed signed by the parties known as the Settlor and the Trustees.

The Settlor is the person who establishes the trust and transfers assets into the Trust. For older trust deeds, this may not be the case however. For the "Mum and Dad"

family trust, this is usually the Mum and Dad who set up the trust. It is also their family home which is transferred into the trust along with any other assets i.e. their holiday home, shares in a company etc usually in consultation with their financial adviser and/or accountant.

The Trustees are persons who manage the trust assets for the benefit of the beneficiaries. The Trustees have wide powers to act and their powers can be found in the trust deed. They are ultimately answerable to the beneficiaries of the Trust but have discretion to

The beneficiaries of the trust stand to benefit from the assets of the trust. This term is used to refer to discretionary beneficiaries, final beneficiaries, primary beneficiaries and secondary beneficiaries. Their definition and meaning can be found in the trust deed. Only the beneficiaries of the trust are able to benefit from the assets of the trust. As trusts evolve over time, most trust deeds have provisions to allow for the appointment and removal of beneficiaries.

Due to the upcoming changes in the Trusts Act, if you have a trust, it is timely to consider reviewing your trust and trust documentation. You will need to understand what your obligations are, whether you are a trustee or a beneficiary of the trust.

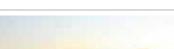

Rhododendrons at Awa Nursery

Be sure not to pile the mulch right up to

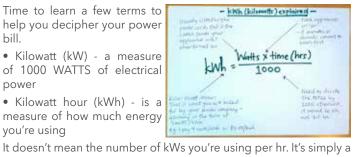

Time to learn a few terms to help you decipher your power bill.

• Kilowatt (kW) - a measure of 1000 WATTS of electrical power

• Kilowatt hour (kWh) - is a measure of how much energy you're using





unit of measurement that equals the amount of energy you would use if you kept a 1,000W appliance running for 1 hr.

A 100W light bulb would take 10 hours to rack up 1 kWh of energy. A 2,000W appliance would use 1kWh in just ½ hr.

A 50W item could stay on for 20hrs before it used 1 kWh. Similar appliances can have very different wattages; 1kWh =

• Using a 10,000W electric shower for 6 mins

- Cooking in a 2,000W oven for ½ an hour
- An hour's ironing with a 1,000W iron or 45mins with a 1,500W iron
- Less than 1hr using a dishwasher (1,000-1,500W)
- Around 3hrs watching a plasma TV (280-450W)
- Keeping a fridge-freezer (200-400W) on for about 3hrs
- Keeping an electric blanket (130-200W) on all night
- Using a laptop (20-50W) all day
- Keeping a broadband router (7-10W) on for 5 days

Build New Choosing the right white for your walls

While it may seem far-fetched to some, there are many different types of white. Each variation can have a striking effect on your decor, so it's important that you choose the best shade to suit your interior design. From warm tones to stark styles, white has



a huge range of potential uses, and selecting the right white in your home can be difficult. With so many subtle shades and different temperatures to choose from, knowing which paint will best suit your walls takes an educated eye.

Fortunately, there are a few simple rules you can follow to ensure your rooms are painted the ideal shade of white. Here are four quick tips to help you choose the right white for each room in your home:

Know the mood - There is a fine line between introducing a white into the bedroom that conjures up an atmosphere of rest and relaxation or painting your walls a sterile and bright shade. A good place to start when selecting whites is the temperature. Imagine brighter tones are like an ice-cold glass of water - drinking this is likely to perk you up and give you energy. In contrast, a warmer white is much like a mug of tea - less stimulating but very comforting. Deciding what the room will be used for is perhaps the most important aspect of choosing the right shade of white. Depending on where you are painting, your white needs to reflect the purpose of the area.

Establish your style - When painting, you will likely have a particular style in mind. While white is a neutral tone, this colour can make or break your decor, so it's important to complement the chosen design with the right shade. For instance, a modern and abstract lounge is better supported by a cooler hue, while classic and country designs should be given warmer backdrops. It is therefore vital that you decide on your room's intended style before you select the paint for the walls.

Complement the ceiling - If going for a white-based decor, don't forget the ceiling. When your walls are painted in a neutral tone, the ceiling can become an integral part of the overall look and feel of a room. Leaving the classic colour on the ceiling can drastically alter how the whites look on your walls, so consider giving the ceiling a lick of paint while you are doing your walls. Ceilings are naturally darker than your walls, so using a lighter version of your wall colour is a good place to start to lighten the room and achieve a cohesive design.

Try, try, try again - It can be tricky to get colouring right the first time. Try a few Resene testpots on a large piece of A2 card leaving a border around the edge and then move from wall to wall at different times of the day and night to see what works best. clashing with your existing paintwork and it's tricky to imagine going lighter, it can be a good idea to paint one coat of white over the entire surface. This will give you a clean slate so you can choose your new colour without the old colour distracting you.

Tips to avoid dog bites

Here are a few tips and myth busters that you may NOT be aware of.

A wagging tail - many of us have been told that this is a sign that the dog is happy. Unfortunately this is NOT always true. Research has shown us the tail wagging only shows that the dog is engaging with something in its environment. They could be engaging in a positive or negative way. You need to look at the whole body not just the tail.



Rolling on its back - again many of us think this is because they want their belly

rubbed. Again NOT always true. They are actually telling us that they are scared and small so please don't hurt me.

Bringing you their toy - yes they are showing you their toy and may want you to play with them. But this is NOT always true and if you go to take the toy or pick up the ball they may try to snatch it back which could result in a bite. Remember that we all train our dogs to different commands so there may be certain rules that need to be followed or commands given when playing with that particular dog.

Always ask permission before you interact with any strange dog this means ask the owner if you can pat the dog. You do not know the dog; his likes or dislikes. You may be wearing a hat and the dog is scared of hats, carrying an umbrella or he may just not like strangers. If the owner says no, don't be offended, just move on and ask the next person if you can pat their dog. By asking permission you are also letting the dog know you are there so if you are allowed to pat him he won't get a fright.

Which brings us to the next point.....

Side and Back - remember where the bitey end of the dog is and



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stay away from the head and face. Only pat the dog on the side and back. This is especially important with children. If you have a child (or anyone) approaching a dog head on to pat it and the dog does not want to be touched and decides to have a bite, the child's face is right next to the dog's mouth. The majority of bites to children are on their head and face. If they are standing to the side of the dog to pat its back then if the dog doesn't like it he can move away. Worst case scenario he may bite the hand but the child's face is nowhere near the dog's.

Stand like a Tree - We regularly get people telling us how dogs run up to them and the first reaction if you are scared or don't like dogs is to run or turn you back and move away. We recommend you stand like a tree. Hold your elbows and look at your feet. Do not move. What you are trying to do is to be as boring as possible to the dog. Any sudden movements or running away make you more exciting. If you run, you may instigate play or prey drive.

Natural laxative liquorice and molasses balls

These tasty bite-sized treats are a great natural way to relieve constipation. Both liquorice root and molasses have a gentle laxative effect on the colon. These are easy to make and can be stored in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to a month.



Ingredients: 2 tablespoons liquorice root tea (100% dried liquorice herb), 2 tablespoons non-sulphured molasses, 1 teaspoon coconut, and approximately 4 tablespoons of additional coconut to roll the

balls in.

Method: Mix all of the ingredients together except for the additional coconut using a small bowl. You may need to add a little more coconut if the mixture is too wet or a little more molasses if the mixture is too dry. Take a small amount of the mixture, equivalent to about the size of a large blueberry, and push the mixture together between your fingers to form a ball, then roll the ball in coconut. Wash and dry your hands after every 4 or 5 balls as the mixture is quite sticky.

Directions: Chew 2 balls well, then wait at least two hours before having another 1 ball.

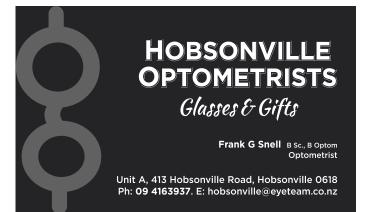

Bunions

Do you suffer from painful bunions? Or have pain in your big toe joint but not sure why? Can't figure out how to relieve your pain? Or daunted by surgery? We may be able to help you!



What are Bunions? Bunions, clinically referred to as Hallux Abducto Valgus, are defined by the movement of the big toe moving towards the smaller toes. The misaligned joint puts abnormal stress and load on the big toe joint which leads to an inflammation of the overlying bursa. A Bursa is a fibrous sac which sits between the bone and tendon and acts as a protective cushion. A bunion becomes painful when the bony deformity progresses in angulation and the

bursa becomes inflamed. This leads to swelling around the bunion, redness and pain.

A bunion has progressive stages and the associated symptoms can vary from person to person. In the early stages a bunion can be flexible and have no associated pain. However, over time the ligaments and tendons surrounding the big toe joint can shorten and lengthen accordingly. This eventually leads to a fixed positioning of the bunion and can have pain associated with it.

What Causes Bunions? Incorrectly fitting footwear can contribute to formation of bunions. Narrow shoes place increased pressure on the big toe joint which can lead to increased inflammation and pain of bunions.

Familial history has been shown to contribute to the development of bunions as foot type (shape and structure) is hereditary, and some foot types are more prone to bunions. Inflammatory conditions such as gout, rheumatoid arthritis and septic arthritis cause trauma to the joint and can result in the development of bunions. Biomechanical abnormalities such as excessive midfoot pronation and hypermobility can also lead to overloading the big toe joint and cause soft tissue stress and possibly joint damage.

What are my treatment options? Many people believe surgery is the only option for bunion treatment, however, depending on the stage and severity of your bunion there are many ways to reduce pain prior to opting for surgery. The sooner conservative measures are implemented, the better results are likely to be. Treatment revolves around creating stability for the big toe joint, this is achieved first through changes in footwear and orthotic devices, then through addressing weaknesses and tightness in the muscles of the foot through exercises. In some cases, foot mobilisation of the surrounding foot joints is indicated to help loosen and reduce pressure on the big toe joint.

position, sometimes we can re-orientate the broken pieces in the right position with an impression of your mouth. People often think that it's too far gone to be repaired if it's been glued but this isn't necessarily true.

Dentures that are constantly cracking or breaking may need to be reinforced with something stronger than the high-impact acrylic the dentures are constructed of. If you are wearing a full denture, you can do this by reinforcing the denture with a cobalt-chrome alloy: none of which is visible when you smile. When it comes to partial dentures that break frequently, these too can be made from cobalt chrome to allow greater strength and thinner feel.

Clear giveaways your child may have vision issues

Studies show that 80% of information presented at school during a child's learning is through visual means - therefor it is of the utmost importance that they are able to see clearly and comfortably. But determining vision problems with your child can be tricky, so we have

Straining/squinting: If your child is straining or squinting to see clearly, chances are there is some level of defocus or prescription in their eyes. Sitting close to the TV. Lack of interest in reading: When

eyes are not focusing correctly it requires a great deal of effort to focus on finer detail, for children this generally means they aren't able to concentrate on what they're reading, let alone enjoy it. Frequent headaches. Using a finger to guide, or often losing their place whilst reading. Covering one eye or turning their head to focus: if your child's eyes are conveying two different images, it gets very confusing for their brain, which will then struggle to produce one clear image. Closing one eye shuts out one of the conflicting images, which will in turn make their overall picture clearer. The appearance of a white reflection in their eyes, most noticeable in photos: it is perfectly normal for the reflective light in photographs to appear red. However, if you are noticing on more than one occasion that one of them appears white, or lighter in colour this could indicate a focusing or misalignment issue.

Forget Happy Feet....this is smart feet

Some clever people have created a smart insole that instantly turns any shoe into a portable gait-analysis laboratory.

The work could benefit clinicians by providing a new way to precisely measure walking function in patients with movement disorders or musculoskeletal injuries, in their living environments. The technology could also lead to significant advances for athletes, by helping them improve their running technique. A real time analysis in a real world environment!

Taking a single step might seem simple, but capturing reliable information about a person's gait in real-life environments remains a major challenge for clinicians. Gold-standard gait-analysis technologies, such as camera-based motion-capture systems and force plates, are expensive and can only be used inside laboratories, so they offer few insights into how people walk around in the real world. Emerging wearable technologies such as smart shoes, pods, and insoles can potentially overcome this limitation, but the existing products cannot provide accurate gait data.

However this smart insole can deliver real-time data on the length, speed, and power of a wearer's stride with better accuracy than existing foot-worn technologies -- and at a fraction of the cost of traditional laboratory equipment.

This smart insole uses accelerometers and gyroscopes to monitor its own movement and orientation in space, and an array of force



sensors to detect foot pressure, allowing it to capture 500 readings per second - around 5 times smarter and faster than present day analysis tools.

Outside the shoe those 500 measurements per second get fed into a Brainiac algorithm narrowed down to just a few key features and voila!, the perfect gait analysis is born giving an accurate representation of the wearers foot strike in real time.

This insole also works regardless of whether the wearer is walking or running, and generates accurate results without requiring calibration or customization for individual users. It even works with children as young as three years of age and elderly.

This previous level of gait analysis would cost upwards of \$1000 a session however this new smart sole is a tenth of the cost at \$100 for an off the shelf insole.

This unobtrusive, wearable gait monitor could help researchers optimise treatments for people with movement disorders, allow remote monitoring of vulnerable populations, or offer important insights into the safety and efficacy of new treatments that might affect gait and balance or give athletes the extra 1% in performance analysis which may be the difference between gold and silver at the Olympics.

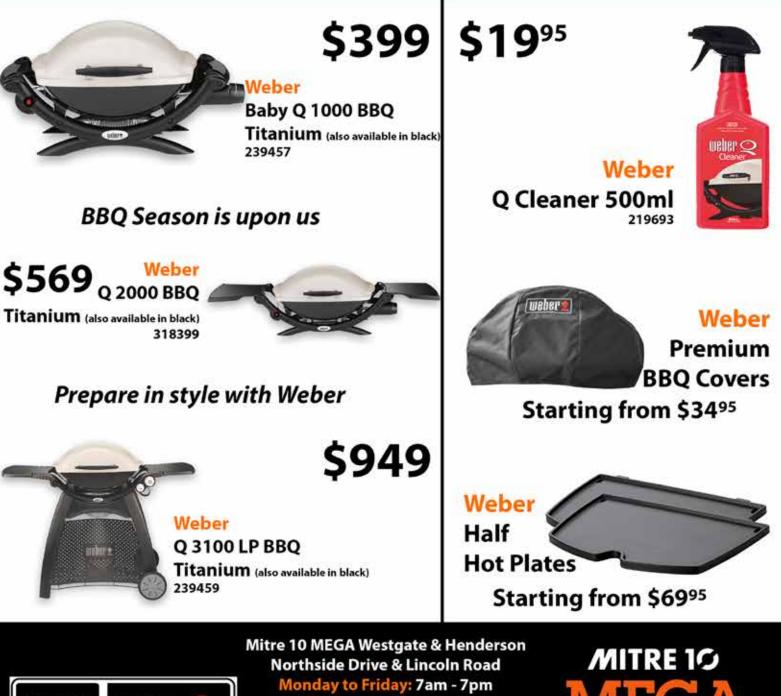

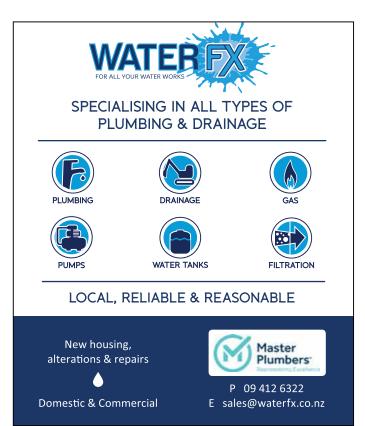
This year was all about enjoying the freedom that lockdown restricted.

Looking after our wildlife during winter

Country Bears philosophy emphasises nature as a vast and wonderful classroom, encouraging empathy and respect to all living things through relationships and connections to Papatūānuku (Mother Earth).

As the seasons change, our tamariki (children) are noticing differences in flora and fauna, and the absence of wildlife, particularly native birds, in our forest. Through conversations and an interest in finding out more, teachers and children embarked on a collaborative learning journey. We discovered that for



some wildlife, natural food sources are limited. Birds must maintain a specific body temperature and need extra energy to get them through the winter. To help our wildlife access the energy they need during these winter months, the provision of food and sugar water stations helps supplement food supply.

One of the childrens' (nga tamariki) favourite activities is to make bird feeders, using pinecones collected from our forest, coating them with peanut butter and then rolling them in a specialised bird seed. We use the Topflite Birdseed, which contains energy-rich seed, fruit and nectar, and is balanced with vitamins that are tailored to meet the nutrition requirements of different bird species. After securing the pinecones with twine, children hang them from trees and wait for the birds to come! Children get an added bonus by getting to lick the peanut butter off their fingers and hands! Yum!

Learning is a lifelong journey for everyone, and we were reminded of this as we gathered further information on appropriate nutritional supplements for birds. Forest & Bird recommend using nectar and fruit as a supplement for native birds and explain that seeds and grain are attractants for introduced birds, who out-compete our native feathered friends. Having instant access to reliable resources and information is advantageous, as it brings learning to life, and life to learning.

Learning is a lifelong endeavour, and as teachers, we are constantly



learning from others - some who may have expert knowledge about subjects, and also those who have a different perspective of the world, like children. They naturally invite us into their awesome world as they question, explain, and describe 'how and what things are'.

Our Elements of Life Programme enhances learning by inviting children to experience the rich diversity and wonder of an authentic outdoor environment. This is Country Bears Nature Learning. Our inquiry-based, emergent curriculum incorporates environmental practices and exploration through nature within the daily programme, which supports our vision of children becoming confident and competent by learning in and through nature.

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Local Board Update

Important information for tank water users.

Are you a tank water user?

There are three things to consider ahead of what is predicted to be another dry summer:

1/ Understand your usage. Fit a tank level indicator and monitor usage in the periods between significant rain events. You must know your

normal and then learn what steps you can take to reduce usage to make your storage capacity last longer.

2/ Consider additional storage capacity NOW. Adding additional capacity will reduce your requirement for water delivery during long periods without significant rainfall. However there will be no point in investing in additional storage capacity unless it is installed before the summer. There are often lead times for delivery of new tanks



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and installers need to be booked as well. If you are considering additional capacity act now...

3/ Lastly, don't leave it until the last minute to book a water delivery. Water carriers will be very busy this summer just as they were last year.

Helensville is currently unaffected by the water restrictions that apply to Watercare's metro network as it has its own independent supply. However last summer the huge demand from tank water suppliers meant that at times the Helensville filling station had its flow limited to ensure there was adequate pressure to fire hydrants. This slowed down deliveries making the demand situation worse. This situation will repeat itself this summer if there is another drought.

Some people have asked why Watercare doesn't make a guaranteed provision for rural tank users? The simple answer is because Watercares services and infrastructure are paid for by its urban customers. To hook up to the urban supply requires an infrastructure growth charge fee of thousands of dollars and then there is the ongoing annual fees and water charges. These are not paid for by rural tank water users though our general council rates, urban water supply is a user pays service. In order for Watercare to cater to rural users they would have to work out how much water was required. We would need to come into a charging regime and it would probably have to be an 'everyone in' service. Those on tank supply that manage OK through droughts are unlikely to be happy about this sort of arrangement.

Council is looking at how it can assist with rural supply by developing addition capacity from suitable private bores. If you have one of these and would be interested in discussing this with Council please contact me on the email address below and I can put you in touch with the right staff.

Emergency 20lt filling stations will be available this summer however the supplementary tanker service provided will not due to budget cuts. This is why we are urging people to think about their tank supply now, get in touch with your local tank supplier now, leaving it until the end of the year or mid-summer will be too late!

Zero waste

Auckland welcomes a \$10 million investment in new zero waste infrastructure.

Resource recovery diverts valuable materials from landfill for a second life.

Auckland Council welcomes the Ministry for the Environment





announcement of \$10.67 million for improvements to the Community Recycling Centres as part of the Resource Recovery Network across the Auckland region.

This \$10 million Central Government funding will fast track the effectiveness of Community Recycling Centres through developing fit for purpose infrastructure. It will expand employment by increasing the volume of materials and the number of related activities they can undertake to work towards zero waste.

Mayor Phil Goff said the \$10.67 million would be invested in capital projects across Auckland to make its resource recovery network more effective. "Sending stuff to landfill wastes valuable resources that can be recycled and reused; it also contributes to climate change by creating carbon emissions," he said.

"This investment will fast track the effectiveness of the Resource Recovery Network by building fit-for-purpose sites to enhance resource recovery activity towards a circular economy. It will also create around 50 jobs, much needed given the Covid-19 recession. It's about creating a sustainable environment and economy that takes account of the needs of future generations and not just our own," Phil Goff said.

Cashflow levers

A basic Facebook poll has shown that the biggest concern faced by businesses in my local area is the ability to pay expenses and debt repayments on time.

With cashflow being so important right now, I will be focusing on some levers you can use to improve your cashflow.

Payment of invoices by customers. The first rule: the quicker you invoice, the quicker you will get paid.

I had a plumber visit to fix a toilet. It took 7 working days to be invoiced for the job. If I had been invoiced within one working day, the plumber would have the cash in his bank account to be able to pay the staff member's wages the following week.

Other ways to get paid faster: have clear information on your invoice so that the customer knows what they are paying for, shorten your payment terms (3 days, 7 days, 30 days), put bad payers on cash in advance or cash on delivery, make it easy to pay (EFTPOS machine or equivalent, online credit card payment etc), include terms of trade on your invoice, follow up slow payers straight away, don't let it get to 60 days.

A few small tweaks will reduce the lag between doing the work and getting paid.

Reducing wastage - Another lever to create cash is having more profit left over after paying your direct costs, ie improving your gross



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profit.

There are many ways of doing this depending on your business. One area of focus is to reduce wastage.

Wastage comes in many forms: Unbillable time due to time waiting for materials, rework, training/inexperience, multiple visits, unclear instructions, interruptions etc. Unbillable materials due to rework, wrong materials, damage. Unbilled variations.

Find the causes of wastage in your business, and work with your team to plug the leak.

Increasing revenue - There are three ways to increase revenue: a higher price for what you are already selling, selling more products/ services to existing customers and attracting new customers.

Price - When was the last time you reviewed your prices? How do your prices compare to your competitors? Unless you have a high volume business (eg KMart) you do not want to compete on price, but instead the value of your product or service. Are you eroding your margin by offering discounts?

Existing customers - Do your customers know everything you have to offer? How many customers do you have on your database? When was the last time you communicated with them?

New customers - I will focus more on this in future articles, but think about who your target market is, and where they spend their time. How many ways and how often can you make yourself visible to your target market so that when they are ready to purchase they already know who you are.

Community charities struggling

Large numbers of community groups are struggling to meet basic operating costs including; power bills, PPE and water rates according to new figures.



New funding application data shows the average amount of funding sought by Auckland

charities to cover their current overheads is almost \$8,000. The figures also reveal that operating expenses were higher among community & wellbeing groups as well as environmental & arts charities.



Over 100 charities who have seen a significant increase in demand for their services, and are struggling to meet their operating costs as a result of COVID-19, will now receive a share of more than \$500,000 - thanks to a new emergency fund.

The diverse range of community organisations which operate in the Auckland region have applied for a grant from The Trusts Your West Support Fund to cover a wide range of expenses.

Trusts CEO Allan Pollard says the high volume of funding requests received in the past two weeks suggests many local charities are struggling to stay afloat.

"We know that the pandemic has had a significant impact on the normal income streams of community groups.

"These are organisations providing blankets, food and support services to the most vulnerable members of our community.

"What was particularly concerning to see was that many of these organisations have asked for help to cover their fundamental operating needs such as power, internet and rent.

"For many of these groups, this funding will be an essential lifeline to help them continue to support their community in a post-COVID environment," he says.

Pollard says the requests for support exceeded more than \$1.1million and cover a wide range of organisations including food charities, whanau-based support, elderly and youth support services, hospice as well as environmental and sporting groups.

Sayers says it

By Greg Sayers, Rodney Councillor. An independent review, initiated by the Mayor, of Auckland Council's five Council Controlled Organisations (CCOs) has highlighted a number of faults along with a lack of adequate management controls.

The damning report confirms inefficiencies with the CCO model, which was created in 2010, but also concludes the model remains the right one for Auckland providing better controls are implemented.



The five CCOs - Auckland Transport; Watercare, ATEED, Regional Facilities Auckland and Panuku Development Auckland - run 75 per cent of council services and account for 55 per cent of the council's operational budget.

While the CCOs must operate in a commercially efficient way, the report states they are still public bodies funded by Aucklanders and they needed to better balance looking after public interests.

It also stated CCOs are public sector entities, not private commercial companies, and their chief executives' remuneration should more appropriately reflect that.

The review looked at better alternatives including merging CCOs, or bringing some of their activities back within the council itself.

For example, Regional Facilities Auckland (RFA) was recommended to be merged with Auckland Tourism, Events and Economic Development (ATEED), saving almost \$7 million a year.

An idea originating from Wellsford sheep farmer Gordon Levett



received high praise about the public's inability to challenge CCO or council decisions. Instead a "People's Panel" of experienced mediators could be considered to hear and resolve complaints and disputes, short of court proceedings or a complaint to the Parliamentary Ombudsman. Other sectors have such proactive dispute resolution mechanisms.

I felt missing from the report was the original Royal Commission's recommendation to have an Independent Performance Auditor overseeing the Super City's effectiveness. Also missing was any recommendation to the appointment of a Clerk-of-Works to sign off the quality of council work before contractors get paid.

Unsurprisingly the council, especially its politicians, came in for some criticism for their failure to exert better oversight and control over the CCOs.

The report found that despite the many Auckland Council plans and strategies, there was almost no strategic direction given to the CCOs. In some crucial areas such as water and property there were no strategies at all.

In a nutshell, the findings concluded council's governance of, and liaison with, CCOs is not working as it should.

This included Auckland Transport not being collaborate enough with the council or local boards on transport strategy, and that its handling of smaller projects was far from satisfactory.

The reviewers found little evidence of a "council family", with silothinking appearing to prevail.

The report gave very clear direction for improvement by concluding

trust and confidence with the council and CCOs was low, and emphasis should be on achieving actual results, and moving away from "seemingly endless processes and procedures" which the public have to endure and fund. An excellent challenge for the city leaders to deliver upon.

Stop scams spreading

Scams, like pesky weeds, keep coming up in the nor-west.

The key is identifying them before they spread their havoc.

Citizens Advice Bureau Helensville has a national database which includes plenty of detailed information about scams, including from many official sources.

Board secretary Rani Timoti says scams with sophisticated and professional presentations have been happening in the Helensville district, mainly through phone calls. "Local police say scams are covered under fraud and cases are investigated."

Reporting scams is the best defence, especially to organisations like NetSafe: www.netsafe.org.nz or for cyber security, Cert NZ: www. cert.govt.nz/about/contact-us/

NetSafe chief executive Martin Cocker says the simple message of 'If it seems too good to be true, it probably is' no longer reflects the

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reality of the online scam and fraud landscape.

"It would be more accurate to say: 'Even if it seems like a reasonable deal, stop and think is this real or a scam."

The Commission for Financial Capability warns of scamming tactics:

Phantom riches - "You'll make a lot of money from this opportunity."

Social consensus - "Everyone is doing it."

Scarcity - "Hurry, time is running out."

Comparison - "You're getting a really good deal."

Friendship - "Do this for me as your friend."

The organisation advises reporting the fraud, even if you are embarrassed, because you help prevent others being caught in the same trap.

Common online scams include: tech support, romance, cold calling, email phishing, investment opportunity and employment or workat-home and business email compromise.

Basic precautions include realising scammers want your personal details, ultimately to take your money and even steal your identity.

Know who you deal with- research the one (group, organisation, company) contacting you.

Delete suspicious texts, pop-up windows or emails.

Practice updating computer security- Visit: www.business.govt. nz/risks-and-operations/it-risk-and-avoiding-scams/protectingbusiness-data/ or business.govt.nz

Always stop and think instead of being pressured into making a quick decision.

Drugs and alcohol have an effect on your workers

No matter what changes to the law are made, drugs and alcohol impede a worker's ability to work, long after taking them.

The effects of being hungover from taking drugs or drinking alcohol becomes a major safety concern for all at the workplace. Fatigue, poor decision making, impaired vision, loss of hearing, loss of muscle coordination.

Add loss of alertness and attention to detail, and a recipe for harm or a serious injury is heightened, especially in high risk work - and driving.

It is important to note that both legal, and illegal drugs can have an influence on the ability to work safely.

Some prescription drugs warn about not using heavy machinery or driving for a specified period to avoid potential incidents. Such directives need to be adhered to.

To confirm that a person has an alcohol or drug issue needs careful and trained observation in order to avoid unsafe behaviour.

The respectful manner in which you approach your workers about such a sensitive matter needs to be addressed in advance so as to protect all parties' long-term positions and relationships.

Non action is just as dangerous.

Doing nothing may lead to a serious accident perhaps involving others.

While many organisations have in place a company policy and position on drugs and alcohol at work, and may carry out preemployment and possibly random drug testing, companies do not realise that they can carry out reasonable cause testing.

This is "reasonable" suspicion testing, also known as "cause" drug testing.

It is performed when management or supervisors have evidence, or reasonable cause, to suspect a worker of drug/alcohol use.

Evidence is based upon direct observation, either by a supervisor or another employee.

Signs that alcohol or drugs may be affecting a worker can include: sweating, weight loss, chills or shivering, physical deterioration and/or change in appearance, excessive talking, poor coordination and concentration, lack of energy and motivation, unpredictable

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behaviour, arguments and sudden outbursts, withdrawal from others, increased aggression, high anxiety, apparent stress, denial of issues, depression, paranoia, frequent absence from work, changes in attitude, poor time keeping or careless and frequent accidents.

In terms of health and safety it is important that unsafe behaviour in the workplace is addressed as soon as possible in order to prevent injury.

The most powerful tools you can use to ensure everyone knows what is expected, and the potential outcomes if ignored are: Management direction, open communication, reporting channels without ramification, education.

Let's face it, we all want to head home safely after work to our families, at the end of a day's work.

RMA: Repeal, replace, rejoice

By Chris Penk MP. Today's column is brought to you by the letters 'R', 'M' and 'A'.

There aren't many issues on which all mainstream political parties agree but the need to reform the Resource Management Act is surely one. Based on countless conversations with constituents these past three years, I'd say that the repeal and replacement of this particular piece of legislation would be almost universally popular.



Passed with good intentions in 1991, the RMA has evolved in ways that have seen its

processes become ever more complicated, cumbersome and costly. Its aim was to promote sustainable development by balancing environmental protection with socially acceptable outcomes, including economic growth. These are all very worthy ideals but the reality has been somewhat different on the ground.

Problems with the supply of land for housing have bedeviled successive governments, with frustration felt across the board. Central and local government alike - together with citizens young and old - have struggled to break free from the RMA's metaphorical red tape, all while genuinely needed infrastructure remains lacking.

Both of the major political parties have undertaken to move the nation beyond the RMA's grip on what's often described as "urban planning". Of course that term that fails to take into account the

A month ago, a 600-page review of the RMA was produced. Known as the Randerson Report, it recommended two new pieces of legislation be introduced: a Natural and Built Environments Act and a Strategic Planning Act.

These changes would effectively split the RMA in half to help recognise the need to reconcile strategic long-term perspectives with the need for immediacy in decision-making.

Given how many residents within the boundaries of the Helensville electorate have sought the help of my office in relation to RMA issues, I hope that everyone interested in the subject looks into the political parties' respective plans in this space, ahead of the election.

New vaping legislation

New vaping legislation creates conflict with lockdown restrictions & panicked smokers concerned about cessation efforts

Smokers may be at risk of having their efforts to quit smoking derailed as new Government legislation conflicts with current COVID-19 restrictions.



New legislation passed recently will significantly restrict the range of vaping products available to the public through dairies and service stations in the coming weeks. At the same time, specialty vaping stores are not considered an essential service provider during a Level 4 lockdown.

Nabhik Gupta, spokesperson for NZ owned Shosha the country's largest retailer of e-cigarettes says weeks under lockdown can place additional stress on smokers.

He says they had a surge in calls from panicked customers concerned about their access to retail supplies of vaping products and the potential impact on their efforts to quit smoking.

"We know that smokers can be highly susceptible to changes in their routines or increased anxiety and when you couple this with easier access to cigarettes than their alternatives, it is easy for their efforts to quit smoking to be derailed overnight.

"The new Smokefree Environments and Regulated Products Vaping Amendment Bill came into effect August. If we are at Level 4 smokers will have reduced access to alternative products."
