Deputy Chief Fire Officer Steve Sparnon was a guest at the meeting of the Kumeu Rotary Club on Tuesday, May 24. Kumeu Rotary Club president Cam Crawford presented Steve with a cheque for \$3,250 which was made up of \$2,500 raised through Kumeu Art in the Garden and topped up by a donation from the Rotary Club. Steve told the gathering that the money would go toward either the purchase of a large van which would be used to transport fire personnel and equipment to fires and road accidents, or toward rescue equipment for the many motor accidents they attend....

A FRUIT WITH MANY HATS & MANY TALES

You may have noticed the odd bauble looking fruit dangling graciously on the ebony branches like Christmas decorations throughout autumn. The leaves on the trees are the colours of autumn and the fruits vary from a light yellow to a deep red-orange. Persimmons are a very sweet fruit, and come in many different varieties. They are growing in popularity due to the ease with which they grow. Persimmon trees grow swiftly in a range of soils including clay, and colonize off their root systems – ideal for helping recover habitat. They are one of the last trees to leaf out in the spring, and don't flower until well after the leaves have formed, bypassing the threat of blossom loss due to frosts. With countless uses, the Persimmon tree truly is an all-rounder! From the hard wood, an ebony; used as paneling in many Korean and Japanese temples. The wood was also used in making the highest quality golf clubs known as 'Woods' until the golf industry moved primarily to metal woods in the last years on the twentieth century. Interestingly, the first metal wood, manufactured by 'Taylor Made', were branded Pittsburgh Persimmons exported, compared to 2,460 tones in 2005 alone. The uses stretch right through to medicinal uses of the fruit. A little known fact about the Persimmon fruit is when eaten raw can induce diarrhea, but when cooked the fruit provides a cure for diarrhea.

BRUSHING FOR A HEALTHY HEART

Gum disease (periodontitis) has long had a correlation with physical health problems. Recent studies show that non-fatal strokes caused by gum disease is more frequent than non-fatal strokes caused by Diabetes Mellitus. Correlation with heart attacks is even higher in patients who are at a hereditary disposition. Smoking, a major contributing factor, impairs blood flow and healing. Patients with otherwise healthy teeth loose their teeth due to periodontitis which then impacts on their remaining teeth and gums. Early loss of back teeth cause TMJ (Jaw Joint) problems and loosening of the front teeth as the bite can no longer carry the load. Loss of teeth at an early age can impact on your health with the decrease in nutrients that you are able to get with limitations that dentures bring. Clenching and grinding habits can also contribute to gum disease by overloading the masticatory (chewing) system. Recession, mobility of teeth, and pocket depth of more than 3mm can indicate that you have periodontitis which in turn can lead to strokes, heart disease, and impaired peripheral circulation.

Making them become another great asset to this community we all live in. We train for these and many other reasons. Enjoy your training, you will more - if you know why you train.

WINTER TIPS FOR LANDLORDS

As the winter months are upon us, it is time for landlords to give some thought to their rental properties. As we all know here in Auckland the rain comes and goes and the wind blows – so how are your rentals coping? Is there leaves clogging the gutters? Have the chimneys been swept? How are the pathways, patios and decks – is there slippery moss degrading those surfaces? Are those wooden window frames showing signs of damage due to dampness and/or mould? If you said yes to one or more of the above questions, or you answered "I'm not sure", it is time for you to give your tenants a courtesy call and ensure the home is a healthy haven for the upcoming months. Clearing the gutters will prevent water overflow, doing this will prevent the water from getting into the home and damaging the ceiling and walls. The chimneys need to be swept annually at the beginning of the winter season to prevent fires and dangerous smoke inhalation due to clogged up chimneys, this will protect the health and safety of your tenant and your insurance cover. Removing mould from and treating of foot paths and decking will make the area safer from slips and spills and will also slow down re-growth. ZINC PREVENTS & TREATS THE COMMON COLD

If you take zinc regularly you can reduce your risk of catching a cold, and if you start taking zinc when the cold catches you, you will beat it quicker. A large review of 15 clinical studies totaling over 1300 people found that zinc supplements significantly reduce both symptoms and severity of illness. Zinc has been shown to support your immune system and may even be directly antiviral. Taking zinc within 24 hours of the start of symptoms was found to cut the risk of still having symptoms at day 7 of a cold by about half. And for prevention taking zinc for at least 5 months cut cold risk by a third. People who took zinc also had significantly lower rates of school absence, and prescription of antibiotics. A safe amount of Zinc to take as a maintenance dose through winter is 15mg daily. However it is very safe to take 15mg three times a day whilst you are fighting a cold/viral illness.

WHAT'S HAPPENING ON THE FARM THIS MONTH

With Harvest completed by the end of April and most of our wines finishing primary fermentation and those in the barrel going into secondary malolactic fermentation its time to say pheeeeyoo. In May we can catch our breath a bit, do some maintenance, or could you imagine it have a few days off. We start pruning in June so there is a few things we can do in preparation for this. My early morning job for most days this month is to drop to the ground the moveable tuck wires on two or three rows each day. The vine tendrils that have wrapped around these wires sometimes don't want to let go and need a good yank to become free. This is my gym workout. These wires were lifted up during spring and summer to contain the growing grape shoots and point them upwards so we can control how they grow. This makes it easier

to trim, leaf pluck and latter on harvest. By dropping these wires it gives an open face to the vine and when the shoots are pruned it is easier to pull them out. This make it easier to see what you are doing when selecting the fruiting canes to keep. The photo below shows this. Check out http://www.kerrfarmwine.co.nz/videos and you will find my training video on how to prune your vines. Next job is to check over your pruning gear, make sure secateurs are sharp and well oiled, makes big job a little easier. That's all for this month, next month I will let you know what we are up to.

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


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YIKES, I HAVE NO STORAGE!!

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AN ENTICING PROPOSAL FOR GROWTH

Pete Sinton, Chairman of the KHRRA has an enticing proposal to facilitate wider community focused initiatives. The proposed Community Charitable Trust would be a not-for-profit association to benefit the local community. The impartiality of the Trust and the breadth of its focus will allow autonomy in decision making and increased clout when seeking funding from larger institutions. The draft principles are being circulated to community groups. The aim is to have an entity which operates as a "community bank" run by seven trustees who will seek funding to assist community groups and projects. It will focus on a specified list of objectives, and its administration will remain independent of established community groups who may apply for specific grants. The area of the Trust's interest will include Kumeu, Huapai, Woodhill, Muriwai, Taupaki, Riverhead, and Brighams Creek. Key to success will be the calibre of trustees who are to be drawn from existing groups in the area, notably, Lions, Rotary, and the Ratepayers Association, as well as local business groups to recognise a broad community interest. All donations will be on a voluntary basis. To date, the cost of preparation has been privately funded by Pete Sinton and Warren Flaunty, and the work undertaken by Davenports in Henderson to ensure independence from other pre-existing enterprises. 

WHEN YOUR PET IS ILL, WHO YOU GONNA CALL?

When your pet is in trouble, some emergencies are easier to recognise than others. We all panic at the sight of gushing blood or an open gaping wound, but when things go wrong inside of the pet, it's often harder to know when to call the vet, and in these cases it is always better the sooner we here from you. Some of the more common life threatening scenarios are listed below – have a read...

Written by Dr Irene van den Berg, Kumeu Vet Service, 68 Access Road, Kumeu, Ph 09 412 9016 Just a couple of hours ago you fed your big dog Rex his dinner, he wolfed it down, but now he's looking bloated and isn't himself and he's doing a weird retching thing... He was completely fine a few hours ago. Occasionally, a dog's stomach can suddenly dilate and twist on itself. These dogs are usually large or giant breeds and it can happen at any age. Because the bloated stomach compresses all the major blood vessels these dogs are in serious trouble! You keep noticing Marvin the fat family cat in his litter tray but he can't seem to pass anything and is vocalising. He is also licking at his bits, can't settle and doesn't want to eat. Urinary crystals may have completely blocked the outflow tract of his bladder. Crystals are reasonably common and often cause discomfort but if the bladder can't empty at all for too long the build up of toxins becomes life threatening. Lulu is an unspayed dog. She has been drinking a lot the past couple of days and now there's a funny smell around her back end and she's quieter than normal. Lulu probably has a pyometra (literally a uterus full of pus). One in three unspayed female dogs will develop this at some point. The pus forms as a result of the nasty E. coli bug and the toxins leak into the dog's bloodstream making her very sick. Obviously our four legged friends are masters at getting into all sorts of trouble – and the list of emergency scenarios is long. Remember that Kumeu Vets always has a vet on call and we'd always rather hear from you than not if you are worried.

The fruit has rich yet subtle flavours and contain high levels of dietary fibre, phenolic compounds, potassium, magnesium, calcium, iron and manganese. They are rich in vitamin C and beta carotene, regular consumption of the fruit is believed to reduce the risk of atherosclerosis heart attacks. The fruit keeps longer in room temperature than when chilled in the fridge, which differentiates them from other fruit. The export of Persimmons from New Zealand have dramatically increased since the 1980's.

'HOT HONEY APPLE PIE

3 Golden Delicious apples, peeled and cored (about 750g)

4 Granny Smith apples, peeled and cored (about 750g)

½ cup honey, try varying the variety, like thyme for example and enjoy the subtle differences

1/4 cup unsalted butter, cut into small pieces

2 tablespoons instant tapioca

1/3 cup light brown sugar

½ teaspoon ground ginger or cinnamon

¼ teaspoon salt

Flour, for dusting

Enough sweet short crust dough for 2 9-inch pie crusts

- 1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Slice Golden Delicious apples and 3 Granny Smith apples into sixths.
- 2. In a large skillet over medium-high heat, bring ¼ cup honey to a boil. Let simmer about 2 minutes, until honey is caramelized. Arrange half the apples in a single layer in skillet. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons butter over apples. Cook apples, turning, until well caramelized on all sides (but not cooked through), about 10 minutes. Scrape apples and honey mixture into a bowl. Add tapioca and toss to combine. Repeat cooking process with remaining honey, butter and sliced apples. Add second batch of apples to bowl; combine.
- 3. Thinly slice remaining Granny Smith apple and add it to bowl. Stir in sugar, ginger and salt.
- 4. On a lightly floured surface, roll out both crusts to 12-inch circles. Place one crust in 9-inch pie plate. Scrape apple filling into crust and top with remaining crust. Pinch edges to seal. With a knife, slice 4 vents in top of crust. Place pie on a foil-lined, rimmed baking sheet.
- 5. Bake for 15 minutes; reduce heat to 350 degrees and continue baking until crust is dark golden and apples are tender when pricked with a fork, about 45 minutes more. Let cool for 30 minutes before slicing. Yield: One 9-inch pie, 8 servings.

HOT AMERICAN FAVOURITE THIS WINTER

Browsing the New Yorker I periodically find Americans expressing faith in the singular American character of apple pie. Due to a rather awkward moment in a now notorious film, this perception has retained some sway. However the humble apple pie can be traced with relative ease back to Medieval Europe. In an England not yet reliant on cane sugar the natural sweetness of the apples, honey, or the deeper flavour of dried fruit were relied on to naturally sweeten the filling. Later the fabulous French Tatin sisters developed the skillet based Tarte Tatin, and the beautiful perfumed smell of cinnamon wafting through history's traditional Dutch apple pies immediately make me want to bake. Yes, making pastry by hand is a little messy, but not once you are used to it. Or cheat a little, and Google a food processor version – just don't over-mix it. More importantly, a pie is an extremely forgiving dish. You can alter the filling, substituting pears, peaches, or adding berries when they are in season - our local orchards always have a stunning selection of seasonal fruit available to inspire you. Pies cool complaisantly in their pans, steaming quietly one the bench as you get on with dinner. They require no icing, and can be reheated without upsetting the texture.
